

THE VILLAGE SIGN As you will all know by now the sum raised for this project was £742.72. Well done. everyone. Mr Atterbury (local historian) has confirmed that the proposed design is correct and that the shields are part of the village's past history. It is hoped that very soon, when we can find a competent artist. we will be able to publicise the format in more detail. **FINANCING** You may not be aware that there exists a Village Hall Fund currently worth about £ 5,070. The Fund originally began lite as the Welcome Home Fund in 1946 but since about 1950 little or nothing has been added to it except for normal hank interest. Subject to the approval of all you little Bromleyites at the next Public Assembly on 12th April, 2001 we propose to change the title of this fund to the Little Bromley Amenities Fund which will give us more flexibility for use on village projects. To oversee the correct running of this proposed new venture we need two volunteer trustees (preferably under 50) in addition to the two appointed by the Council. The next meeting of Little Bromley Parish Council will he held on 18th January at 7.30pm in the Methodist Chapel.

A MILLENNIAL GIFT

Torrential rain having suddenly given out to sunshine, a timely rainbow appeared at noon on 9th December to grace a happy ceremony at the top of the tower of St. George's Church, when members of the Great Bromley Millennium Committee presented a magnificent £1,100 for the. benefit of St. George's Repair Fund. All contributions to the Repair Fund are welcome, but gifts like this one, from local people and organisations, are doubly so. Not only do they help towards ensuring that a great building which has seen so many changes over so many centuries can remain in constant use for as many more. but local goodwill has the very important practical effect of encouraging larger charitable bodies to open their purses.

The first phase of the work, comprising mainly the repair of the two most westerly bays of the roof, has now at last been completed. The decay of the ends of the hammer-beams, where they rest on the main walls of the nave, was found to be worse than had been feared, so special measures had to be devised for the purpose of restoring their structural soundness. It is thought that similar measures will need to be adopted when we come to the second and much more substantial phase of work, and I am afraid it seems unavoidable that the latter will cause much inconvenience - possibly even to the extent of necessitating a temporary break in the use of the church for normal parish worship. The need to collect more money means that there is likely to be a considerable delay before the rest of the work can begin, but in the meantime we are in discussion with the architects about ensuring that the period of any disruption is reduced to a minimum. Anyone who would like to have more detailed information should please get in touch with me on 230790.

Thanks again to the Millennium Committee and to all who have supported them. I take this opportunity of mentioning that on the evening of Thursday. 15th march. the ever-popular Eastern Angles will be coming to the Village Hall once again to present a play called "Crossroad Blues" by James Vollmar. GREAT BROMLEY and NAYLAND, SUFFOLK Part 3

Because of a tragic shock. John Mannock also became a Benedictine monk on 7th March, 1700, and was known as Anselm. He had resided at Giffords Hall and was supposed to have caused the death of his young brother. One story says that the boy was dropped from a window. Another story says he was killed by a cannon ball fired in a battle for Douai. John was a chaplain in Warwickshire for fifty years followed by fifteen years spent at Kelvedon. He was a prolific writer and included among his works is A Poor man's Catechism. He died in 1764 aged 84. The Mannock family's connection with Great Bromley ended in the late 18th Century . *John Appleby*

GT. BROMLEY VILLAGE HALL CHARITY TRUSTEES

The Management Committee met on 21st November under the Chairmanship of Peter Wenden with all members except one present. Most of the meeting, after the initial introductions, was spent discussing aspects of the Millennium Lounge. We received some guidance and good advice from Rob Cary on floor covering suitable for the room which will he followed up with carpet samples and costing. Next we turned our attention to chairs and tables. Martin Frostick had researched the subject well and came up with several possibilities which gave the Committee a feel for the range available. This was narrowed to upholstered stackable chairs and small folding tables. Martin said that a local company had some on display and he would check them for their comfort: also he would contact a company representative for samples to try. For the windows, most people were in favour of vertical strip blinds and samples together with costing are to be obtained. It was decided that the lounge would he available as part of a whole hall hiring, with just the main hall, or as a separate area depending on the requirements of the hirer. An official opening of the facility is being planned for early in 2001 but meanwhile fund raising for the hall must continue. A Line Dance initially earmarked for February will now take place on Friday 9th March 2001 starting at 8.15pm. May I on behalf of the Committee wish everyone a very happy and prosperous year 2001. KITCHEN CORNER

TURKEY POPOVERS

This is a nice way to use up leftover cold meat - you could use chicken or other meats equally well. Makes 12 - 18

2 eggs 4 oz flour $\frac{1}{2}$ pt milk 2 0z dripping or butter 8 oz diced cooked turkey meat

4oz diced stuffing; (cooked) Cranberry sauce (optional)

Make a batter with flour eggs and milk. Grease deep bun tins with turkey dripping, or butter and put a little knob in each hollow. Put in hot oven 200C/400F for five minutes. Stir the diced meat and stuffing into the batter, and when the tins are hot spoon in the batter about two thirds full. Bake 15-20 minutes till puffed and golden brown. Serve them with a little cranberry sauce in the. centre of each if liked. Good as a snack. or serve with salad as a first course. *Jill Frostick*



From The Rectory

Dear Parishioner,

I've been asked to write about the practical arrangements in the churchyard. Churchyards, like churches, do not come under local planning authority. Instead a separate system is operated under a person called a chancellor. Regulations (full copies of which are available) are given for this area which myself and the church council have to keep to. This can be very different to other non church burial grounds such as in Ardleigh or



Colchester. It is important that when making a decision about where you or a loved one are to be buried, you know that you have a choice and that you are aware of any regulations concerning the place.

Anyone who lives in the church parish of the Bromleys can be buried in the churchyard at Great Bromley. Little Bromley is now only for residents there. Thu Chancellor permits a range of memorials and head stones to he placed on graves. Permission has to be granted to erect any stone and I simply see that the memorial fits in with the regulations. I have no choice in these things! If you wish to have something that falls outside of the regulations there is a process of application and appeal.

Flower container to be built into the headstone. Flowers are an important part of how we grieve and respect our loved ones. For this reason artificial flowers should not be used. Sadly they are often stolen or simply blown and damaged by the weather and to arrive at a grave and find expensive flowers damaged or missing can be distressing. Ordinary flowers have a natural time span and so I seem to be part of the whole healing process.

The church council has a responsibility to keep the churchyard tidy and the grass cut. Graves with plants on or where the grass had died because something has been placed on them are difficult to maintain which again can be distressing. Here in the Bromleys we are blessed with two beautiful areas for our loved ones to be buried and for us to use as places of peace and quiet. The wardens and I are happy to talk more about how we can continue to keep this so. On another practical matter the congregation is growing! More people in church on a Sunday morning and in and around during the week is a wonderful sign of the growing confidence in our churches - yes it's happening up at Ardleigh as well! Growth brings different needs and problems with it and the time has come for us to be looking at the way forward. My primary role in this, and indeed my primary role full stop, is too ensure that God is worshipped on a daily basis here in the Church of England that means public morning and evening prayer and the celebration of the Eucharist.

Choices have to be made about our Sunday worship which are a natural progression from the uniting of Ardleigh and the Bromleys a number of years ago. There seems to be three alternatives being voiced. All involve keeping the 8:00 AM and 6:30 PM celebrations as they are: though they in turn will become more important as growth continues. All involve keeping both churches open and alive for generations and generations to come. Staying as we are is option one. Bringing the 9:30 AM forward and moving the 11:00 AM back, option two. Having one celebration of the Eucharist at 10:30 AM, alternating between Saint Mary's Ardleigh and Saint George's is option 3. You may be able to tell me more! I can see positives and negatives in all three. So we are having a time of consultation about the way forward.

On January 20th there will be a meeting in Saint Mary's hall Ardleigh to discuss this further then the parish councils will meet. The whole exercise is coming as a result of strength and growth which is exciting if not a little daunting too. Lots of talking and listening between the congregations is already going on which is a way forward in itself. All I ask is that you join in. Those of you who worship in other places, please remember us in your prayers. Thank you. *Father Nicholas*

THE ECUADOR CYCLING CHALLENGE ON BEHALF OF MACMILLAN CANCER RELIEF A good friend commented that I must be either mad or very fit to take up a challenge to cycle 350 miles across Ecuador, and at the moment I think it's the former. When my son, Jamie, first suggested that I join him on this extraordinary trip, it didn't even cross my mind to entertain the idea. But the seed of thought was planted and the idea just would not go away. Although it will be one of the most physically and mentally demanding things I have ever done, the statistic that four in ten people are now likely to be affected by cancer at some stage in their lives prompted my decision to take part. I wanted to contribute by doing something perhaps a little insane, but that will hopefully get noticed, and will definitely increase the awareness of Macmillan's ongoing, invaluable and excellent work.

Between 13 and 25 October, 2001, Jamie and I will be joining around 70 people journeying across Ecuador, the centre of the earth, for a gruelling ride through one of the world's most breathtaking landscapes. Over the course of 13 days we will travel through every type of terrain and discover why Ecuador is known as the land that has four seasons in one day. From the hot and humid jungle we'll climb through the Andes to a height of 327m before descending through the spectacular banana plantations to the welcome shores of the Pacific coast. It promises to be a tough, adventurous challenge, and one that we are tremendously excited about.

Jamie and I have to raise a minimum of £2,500 each, of which nearly 70% benefits Macmillan Cancer Relief directly, the remainder funding experienced guides, a medical team and taxis up the steep bits! A nice warming winter dish for the cold weather

SHROPSHIRE FIDGET PIE

Pastry: 5 oz SR flour, 4 oz butter, 3 oz. mashed potato, salt

Rub the butter into the flour, add salt to taste, then mashed potato. Blend with a fork, leave an hour till cold.

Filling: 1 lb potatoes, peeled and sliced thinly, ½ lb apples, peeled and sliced thinly ½ lb Streaky bacon, 1 tablsp soft brown sugar, ¼ pt stock or water, seasoning.

Place the potatoes, apples and bacon in a greased pie dish. Sprinkle with sugar and seasoning and add the stock. Roll out the pastry and place over the pie dish (use a pie funnel). Bake in a hot oven 400F/200C for $1\frac{1}{4} - 1\frac{1}{2}$ hours.



GREAT BROMLEY'S ROAD REPAIRS in the 16th Century

Margery Hardinge's will of 14th October, 1585, shows that the Elizabethan Surveyors of the Highways were doing their job. She left 20 shillings "To the making and amending of the highway between Scode Cross and my gate in Great Bromley". That was not all. "To the poor people there, 13s 4d" Joan's family also benefitted. "To Joan, my daughter, 40s 0d, 1 featherbed, 1 brass pot, 1 kettle, and 6 pieces of pewter. To Gregory, my son, my tenement called Horsepittes with 8 acres of land belonging in Stanway. The residue of my goods to him. I make him my executor." Witnesses were William Church and Joan Holland. The will was proved 17 January, 1569. John Appleby

WOMEN'S INSTITUTE

Fr Nicolas Spicer was our first Speaker of the New Year, who came to tell us about his career and experience as a priest. As a young person, he was encouraged always with his parents' support to join in church activities and became a member of the choir- After obtaining a degree at Lampeter University he lived in Coventry Cathedral for a year running courses for youngsters amongst other duties. Incidentally, there were links with Dresden and America together with ten major religions within a square mile of the Cathedral. Next he went to Chester to have his suitability assessed and upon passing went on to Murfield, Yorkshire for two years to learn pastoral work elocution, speech training together with an interview with the Principal at the start of the 2nd year.

Fr Nicolas then moved to Westbury-on-Trym. Bristol where he was ordained as Curate and stayed for three years. His next move was to Willesden Green, North London as part of a team of one Vicar and four Curates, an area with children and patents from very different backgrounds and religions, many of which learnt much from each other.

After four years, Fr Nicolas moved to Hammersmith Hospital as a full time Chaplain to work alongside a part time Rabbi, a Muslim Teacher and a Polish Minister. His role was to treat each patient equally, to make sure traditionally produced meals were supplied (Kosher food came each day from Wrexham) and to attend the premature baby unit. There is even a Hospital School for children who need a long stay for treatment. He worked there for a further four years before finding himself looking after Ardleigh and the Bromleys. When asked, at the end of his talk, if he found coming amongst us a very different experience, he answered by saying "people are people wherever you are"

CHILDREN'S CORNER

Shrove Tuesday falls on 27th February. The usual batter to make pancakes is: 125g plain flour, pinch of salt,1 egg, 225ml milk or milk and water.

Instead of lemon juice and sugar, try out some different ideas for fillings such as Chocolate sauce or ice cream or Banana and chocolate buttons. However why not try

GINGER AND BANANA PANCAKES - Add 1 level teasp powdered ginger with flour and cook pancakes in the usual way. To make filling mash 1 banana per person with cream and add some small pieces of preserved ginger.

LAYERED PANCAKES - Instead of rolling the pancakes, use a filling (for instance whipped cream and jam) to layer the pancakes one on top of the other. The layered pancakes are served cut in wedges, like a cake. A mixture of drained canned fruit (such as peaches, apricots, strawberries and raspberries) and whipped cream, makes another delicious filling.

Dear Parishioner,

As I write this I am witnessing on the television incredible pictures from India of the Kumb Mela, the Hindu festival. With an estimated attendance over the month of maybe 70 million people it has been nick named the greatest show on earth. There are obviously some people taking part who catch the camera's eye, and are fanatics in a way that our Western minds find disturbing, and difficult to understand. That said, the vast majority are ordinary folk like you and me, taking part to celebrate their lives and pray for blessings. It is a great gathering of humanity and so worthy of note.

All this as Christians are beginning to embark again on the season of Lent. Taking from the Bible the account of Jesus spending time on his own in the wilderness and being tempted to use his divine powers for his own ends, so Christians use the six weeks before Easter as a time of self-examination and spiritual growth. Underpinning the whole experience is the command to love God and love neighbour as oneself. All that a Christian does should be measured against this, and Lent is a particular time for each individual to take stock and seek to grow in knowledge of God and self, and so be more able to love neighbour. Jesus was able to resist temptation and do what he believed to be the will of God, even offering himself up to death. because he was confident that he was loved by God. That gave him a self love which in turn developed into inner and outer strength.

For the Christian there is an equal three fold call to love, and times such as Lent enable one to look at how life is lived and try to get the balance right. If I am a great worker for others and yet are not at ease with my own company, then I am lacking. Even love and service of God can be diminished if I'm not a very pleasant person to spend time with. From this stems the idea of giving things up - always a popular image, but less so remembering the second part is that any money saved should be passed onto a charity so that others gain from my abstinence. Denying or stretching or challenging oneself enables one to deepen in self knowledge, but it is hollow if it doesn't have a positive effect on others as well. Lent is nothing without Easter, "dust to dust 0 man" is empty without the faith and hope of the Resurrection. Mere works will fade away, it is our lives and expressions of love that will last. This is the greatest show on earth, may it be one of blessings for us all. *Fr Nicolas*.

KITCHEN CORNER

CHOCOLATE STEAMED PUDDING

This one is really rich and light!

5 oz SR flour, 4 oz plain chocolate, 4 oz margarine, 4 oz caster sugar, 2 eggs

Melt the grated chocolate in 1 tblsp hot water. Cream margarine, beat in chocolate and sugar, then eggs and flour alternately beating well. Turn into a buttered basin and steam for 2 hours. Serve with cream, custard or preferably chocolate sauce.

Sauce: 2 oz chocolate, ½ pt water, 1 tblsp sugar, 2 teasp comflour

Boil chocolate, sugar and water, add slaked Cornflour and cook a few minutes. Add vanilla to flavour. *Jill Frostick*

FROM THE RECTOR

Dear Parishioner, Falling in love is one of life's great experiences, though looking back on teenage angst I often feel a relief that it is past! During the initial stages one's whole world revolves around the person, it's all one can think or talk about, nothing else is important. Eventually, sometimes painfully, often pleasantly, reality kicks in and one has to get a perspective on the matter. This has to happen for the love to grow or to die. Discipline has to be shown! Discipline is not a popular word, but my dictionary gives a positive meaning to the word "training imposed for the improvement of physical powers, self-control". Lent is the traditional time for Christians to exert discipline and to do so in the framework of love; love of God, of neighbour and of self. Perfection, a heavenly hope here on earth, is only achieved by getting the balance of all three right. I can do many things but if I have not love I'm merely a clanging gong (1 Corinthians 13). If I do not have self love, my love for God, in whose image I am created, is diminished.

So Lent is a time for training in the Christian life- As part of this year's programme there will be talks on Christian Discipline every Sunday 5.15pm in S Mary's Hall. A variety of speakers will introduce topics such as Simplicity, Prayer, Solitude, Worship and Reconciliation. You are most welcome to attend and it is hoped that there will be a lively time of questions and discussion afterwards. During the following week groups will be meeting throughout the parishes to look deeper into each topic. These groups are open to anyone who is seeking to develop their Christian living.

My love has to be disciplined to allow it to flourish and spread from me to my brothers and sisters and to God, from whence it originally came. These Christian Disciplines are useful tools for me, tried and tested as they have been down the centuries. I hope they may be for you as well, and that this Lent will see a deepening and growing of Christian love in this place. May God bless you, *Fr Nicolas*.

STAY OFF FOOTPATHS UNTIL FOOT AND MOUTH HAS GONE.

Walkers and riders should stay off public rights of way until the Foot and Mouth Disease outbreak is over. All footpaths, bridleways and byways in the county have been temporarily closed by Essex County Council using emergency powers granted by the Government to help prevent the virus spreading. Metalled footpaths on housing estates are excluded from the ban and landowners can grant access to their land. Courts are likely to take a dim view of people who ignore the ban and a fine of up to £5,000 can be imposed. Farmers' livelihoods are at risk and everyone can play their part to protect farm animals and wildlife. 1952 FOOT AND MOUTH IN BROMLEY

The apparently limitless spread of the recent outbreak of foot and mouth disease reminds me of local cases nearly fifty years ago.

Stanley Webb's Gold Cup flock of pedigree Suffolk sheep, and his herds of cattle and pigs were destroyed in early April 1952; these based near Horsley Cross. A few days later, shepherd Sam Hurst was folding his Suffolk flock for Herbert Hayward of Badley Hall, Gt Bromley. There were 180 ewes, 40 young ewes, and 250 lambs who were on a field next to Moor Barn Road, part of Bluegates Farm, now farmed by David Salmon.

Sam noticed two young ewes (hoggets) off colour. There had been various cases in the Tendring District since the previous autumn, and all exports to North America had been stopped since then. It was thought the infection had travelled across the channel from France, perhaps carried by starlings. The police were told (it is a notifiable disease) and a Ministry of Agriculture vet arrived early next day, Monday 7th April. By then there were another ten cases. They had blisters on the feet, and in the mouth, and had raised temperatures. Some were kneeling, some lying down, obviously ill, and breathing quickly.

These facts the vet reported by telephone, and the disease was confirmed, without waiting for a blood test. He made exhaustive enquiries into possible contacts, and prohibited the movement of stock on Badley Hall, and neighbouring farms. The flock was valued, and two further vets, two slaughtermen, one police sergeant and a constable arrived. The affected animals (by now 18) were killed. A mechanical excavator came in the evening, as did the slaughtering contractor for the Ministry of Food, which was separate then. Next day gangs of slaughtermen from Romford and Leiston turned up and makeshift arrangements were made for butchering under field conditions. The remaining sheep in the same fold as those already affected were killed, and buried in lime. The others were individually examined, shot, skinned and dressed and taken away in a shuttle service of five meat vans to appear on the ration away from the countryside. It was another two years before rationing ended and even animal feed was on coupons at the time. The farm foreman, Charles Wenden, and tractor drive Ernie (Bunny) Austin were carting away offal to be buried. Shepherd's lad, Fred Jarvis, helped Sam to pen the sheep for slaughter. On Wednesday it was all over, and the clearing up began. A small gang of European workers set to with the farm staff on the field. All the fleeces were soaked in strong soda solution, followed by the hurdles, stakes, wire netting, troughs, hayracks etc. The shepherd's hut was fumigated, with the clothes of everyone who had been in contact with the infection. The excavator, tractor and trailer were disinfected, as had been all vehicles coming and going, including the horse drawn water butt with which made many journeys over the half mile or so from the farm. This continued through Easter, and finally finished on Tuesday, 15th April, eight days from the start. The sheep feed for the rest of the summer was already growing, and on 1st May we were allowed to restock with commercial sheep and lambs, supplied by dealer, Bill Strang of Stacies Farm, Little Bromley. After a fortnight's holiday, Sam Hurst was back at work. This brief account of an infection caused by a different stain of the virus, at a different time, may seem to make light of a traumatic event. It didn't seem very trivial at the time. R K Hayward

She was born at Loftus close to Saltburn by the Sea and the North York Moors National Park, educated at the Colchester County High School and went on to become a professional cook. With her late husband, Derek, and their-two sets of twins, they came to live in our village in 1968 from Colchester. She became involved in many village activities, such as a Trustee on the Village Hall Management Committee, a Parish Councillor, a hard-working member of the Women's Institute serving on the committee for many years and as President for a three year term. For several years commencing in 1977, the Silver Jubilee year, she organised village carnival days. She supported the Tendring Show and won many prizes for her beautiful knitting, needlework and cookery. Jean worked for several years with the Charles Palmer Trust at Hamilton Lodge and supported Seven Rivers Cheshire Home and the Parish Church when required. The apple pies she provided for the Harvest Festival celebrations were always popular and for the last umpteen years, also organised a Christmas Sale for the joint benefit of the Village Hall and the Church or the Women's Institute alternatively. In the run up to the new millennium, Jean was a member of the Millennium Committee raising funds to assist with the provision of the Millennium Lounge a new room recently added at the Village Hall. Jean will be greatly missed in the village by her many friends and our sympathy is extended to her family in their sad loss and grieving.

STUDENTS + ESSEX LEG

I had a phone call from the organiser of Students + Essex Leg to say despite the Foot and Mouth they still hope to walk to Walsingham. THE CONSTABLE FAMILY

John Constable's family lived in Essex at Boxted, Dedham, Little Bromley, Bures and then Flatford. John's forebear, also John, born 1638, was a yeoman at Boxted and moved to Little Bromley. He died in 1701. He married twice. His first wife was Hannah and his second Mary Gardner, a widow. He married Mary in 1695. Hannah bore him four sons and two daughters. There was no family by Mary. John's sons were - John of Langham, Daniel of Little Horkesley, Hugh of Mount Bures and buried there 19 May, 1715, aged 48, a miller, and Benjamin of Bures, yeoman. Hugh married Ann Taylor of Earls Colne at Langham in 1695.

John Constable, the artist, was the great grandson of Hugh and Ann Taylor and was born at East Bergholt, 11 June, 1776. He died 31 March, 1837 and was buried in Hampstead churchyard. What a gift it would be if a painting of Little Bromley by the John Constable was one day found. *John Appleby*

Kitchen Corner

Something different for Easter! This cake is light, moist and delicious. The poppy seeds are available in health food shops or good grocers.

Ingredients for **BLUE POPPY SEED CAKE**

- 4 oz (110g) blue Poppy seeds
- 8 fl oz (225 ml) milk
- 8 oz (225 g) butter or margarine
- 8 oz (225 g) light raw cane sugar
- 3 eggs separated
- 8 oz (225 g) plain wheatmeal flour
- 1 ¼ teasp baking powder

Oven temp. gas 4, 350F, 180C Greased, lined 8" cake tin

Bring the poppy seeds to the boil in the milk, remove from heat and leave in covered pan to soak 25 minutes. Cream butter and sugar till light and fluffy, add egg yolks one at a time and beat thoroughly. Mix flour and baking powder and fold into the mixture, then stir in the milk and poppy seeds. Whisk whites stiff and fold in. Spoon into prepared tin and bake 1 hour till firm - test with a skewer. Stand 10 minutes before turning on to a cooling rack. Happy Easter! - *Jill Frostick*

PARISH COUNCIL NEWS

A meeting of the Great Bromley Parish Council was held on 15th January.

Tree Planting Scheme Trees have now been planted in Mary Lane North to replace dead and damaged trees.

Stone Road Some of the potholes have been repaired but further repairs will be necessary in the future.

Flooding The recent heavy rainfall and subsequent flooding has been exacerbated by the poor condition of some of the roadside ditches. In a letter to the Parish Council, Essex County Council Highways Department has stated that landowners are responsible for maintenance of roadside ditches and that surface water runs freely downstream across their property. The County Council is continuing to work with the Environment Agency and Tendring District Council looking at drainage in the Bromley and Ardleigh areas and taking action where necessary.

Cross road near the Old Courthouse Inn Following concerns from residents about the number of accidents and near misses at the crossroads, Council has agreed to investigate the feasibility of extending the 40 mph speed limit to cover the crossroad junction. A letter will be sent to the Essex County Council, Highways Department, accordingly.

Planning Applications The following planning application has been considered by the Council and their comments forwarded to the District Council.

The Thatch Cottage, Brook Street internal alterations No objections to this application. **Barn adjacent to Portlands, Harwich Road** Conversion of barn to dwelling house, replacement of outbuildings and erection of cart lodge. Amended plans. No objections to this application. The next meeting of Great Bromley Parish Council will be held on 19th April in the Village Hall at 7.30 pm.

SPRINGHILL CLOSE The land bordered by Brook Street, Mary Lane North, Springhill Close and Bromley Brook was bought last November, for a price stated to be £3,500, by Derek Rowe and Allan Richards of 6 High Street, Rayleigh, Essex. The Rona Partnership, Chartered Surveyors, operate from the same address. The Parish Council, therefore, wrote to Tendring District's Head of Planning for clarification of the land's status for planning purposes. He replied as follows: The site is identified in the Adopted Local Plan as an important open space and is protected from development by Policy TRI. When consent was granted for the development of Springhill Close the area was shown as an open area. A later application to develop the site was refused planning permission on the grounds of a loss of Open space and the amenity value to the dwellings in Springhill Close and the village as a whole. Regarding ownership of Springhill Close, Messrs Rona and Richards may well own the land but it forms part of the highway maintained by Essex County Council. James Heaney

WOMEN'S INSTITUTE

Dear Parishioner,

During Lent Christians attempt to deepen their awareness of God's love for them, and respond to this in love for their brothers and sisters and God himself. A Lenten charity provides a focus for this, and this year we are supporting S John's Eye Hospital in Jerusalem. The hospital is a charitable foundation that provides eye care in a country where the norm is private health plans and many simply cannot afford or relate to such things. Donations are asked if it is felt a person can make one, but no one is turned away. The routine work is on glaucoma and cataracts, but sometimes people present with injuries as a result of accidents, or having being caught up in the city's troubles. Increasingly Palestinian children are being born with eye conditions that can be corrected if their parents can get them to the hospital. Recently a project has been set up to train local people to become nurses and practitioners and so move away from a reliance on foreign staff. Focusing on Jerusalem and her people in thought and prayer, is a very good way of entering into the experiences of Jesus and his followers and what that shows us of God's love. In a highly politicised time an innocent man is killed and his followers, most of whom had abandoned him, experience his coming back to life which transforms their lives. God does not hold human failings or folly against us when an attitude of sorrow and determination to try again is shown. Fasting - going without - is a way of identifying with others who are less fortunate. Some of the parish children (and a few adults!) have decided to go without a soft toy

and pass it onto the hospital. To have something to cuddle when you arrive in a strange sanitised building, unable to see properly, is a priceless gift. Most of the children have nothing at all and so are allowed to take the toy home. An endless supply is needed! Alms giving converting Lenten savings for others is a simple practical way of expressing love. The hospital is trying to fit each bed with its own light. At the moment if one person needs to be woken in the night for treatment or help everyone is disturbed by the whole room being illuminated! My Christian faith is as nothing if it does not flow from me towards others and back to God in love. May God bless us as we pray, fast and give to celebrate this love, here and in Jerusalem. 

ARDLEIGH SURGERY LAUNCHES NEW WEBSITE

Ardleigh surgery has launched a website at www.ardleighsurgery.nhs.uk. The site is for the use of patients and potential patients. It provides information about the services provided at the surgery, the latest news about events at the surgery, together with some health educational material. Currently there is a page about diabetes and another page about travel health vaccinations, reminding patients not to leave it too late to obtain their travel jabs. Other pages give useful contact numbers, audit results and maps showing the practice area and directions to the surgery. There is also a page that will enable patients to make repeat prescription requests to the surgery via the internet. Ardleigh surgery is one of the few practices in the area to have its own website, which we believe will be a useful means to communicate with the increasing number of patients with access to the internet.

ARDLEIGH SURGERY APPEAL for an AUTOMATIC ELECTRONIC DEFIBRILLATOR

Local businesses and patients are invited to make donations to the Ardleigh Surgery appeal towards the £3000 cost of purchasing an Automatic electronic Defibrillator. Electronic defibrillation is the only effective treatment for cardiac arrest with ventricular fibrillation. This is often the consequence of a heart attack or serious injury through trauma. electrocution or drowning. It is the most common cause of death in sudden, serious collapse. Full recovery by resuscitation in the USA is 30% and in the UK, only 3%! This is thought to be directly related to the availability of automatic defibrillators. The likelihood of recovery from ventricular fibrillation is related to the time taken to receive electronic defibrillation. For each minute that elapses following collapse with ventricular fibrillation, the chance of survival goes down by 10%. Therefore, a quick response is potentially life saving. In the USA, Automatic Electronic Defibrillators are widely available, not only in medical premises, but also in large stores and public buildings. Automatic Defibrillators are now being introduced for public access in the UK. cg, Liverpool Street station has a number of AEDs strategically placed, which can be operated by trained station staff. This example, will hopefully. become commonplace in future. We are hoping that by purchasing an Automatic Defibrillator we can help those near to the surgery by being able to respond sooner than an ambulance equipped with an AED (usual response time being 20 minutes). The advice follows three reports of burglary by men claiming to be roofers in a 2-day period in the Braintree area. You can protect yourself against criminal doorstep callers by simply shutting the door if an unexpected workman calls. Genuine companies won't mind if you take your time to make a decision, says Cllr David Westcott. Cabinet member for trading standards at Essex County Council. Householders can report anything suspicious to trading standards on 01245 341888 or dial 999. WATCH OUT FOR STORM COWBOYS

Householders hit by storm damage should watch out for cowboy workmen, warns Essex Trading Standards. With legitimate builders, plumbers, carpenters and other craftsmen working at full stretch, Trading Standards is concerned that dishonest traders will take advantage of the situation to rip off vulnerable consumers. Cowboys have already left a trail of poor workmanship and high bills in parts of the South East. Officers recommend that residents do not deal with a trader if a mobile telephone number is the only contact detail given. Trading Standards advise people to speak to their insurance companies before engaging anyone to carry out repair work and to approach businesses approved by the insurers. In the case of flood damage. electricity and gas companies will make free inspections to advise on safety work.

THE REVD ALFRED DAVIES COPE, MA

Mr Cope died at the Little House, Dedham on 28 December, 1931. He was 87. He was Rector of Little Bromley from 1902 to 1925 and was buried there 1 January, 1932. Alfred Cope was a musical man among other abilities. He inherited his musical talent from his grandfather, The Revd Dr Richard Cope who not only set some of Wesley's hymns to music but composed chants for the Psalms as well as hymn tunes. Alfred did the same and at his funeral his composition "Psalms of glory, raiment bright" was sung with gusto.

In 1867 Alfred was a master at a school in Springfield run by the Revd (later Canon) Dr F J Manning who was Rector of St Leonard's Church, Colchester, 1874- 1886. Being a fine scholar and linguist Mr Cope became the headmaster of Andover Grammar School, 1874-1880. He was ordained in 1873 and first went to a Warwickshire parish before becoming a University don and later an Army coach. He was captain of the Wadham College, Oxford, boat and a keen cricketer. He was also a good horseman and played golf until he was 75. Among his published works were "An Essay on a recently discovered Fragment of Juvenal" and "A Translation of The Frogs of Aristophanes" both much appreciated by classical scholars. Mr Cope was survived by his widow (nee Marion Olivia Brock) and his eldest son and a daughter. He was much beloved in Little Bromley. Have you seen the "Wadham" window in his memory? He also commissioned the King Charles and Archbishop laud windows in Little Bromley's chancel as a memorial and thanksgiving to those from the parish who died in The Great War. *John Appleby*

Gardener's Corner for May

HOSTAS: Clumps of Hostas which are now showing their shoots can be divided to get more plants. Dig down the side of the clumps and cut off a piece of the plant, make sure you have two or three shoots on the piece you have cut off. ANNUALS: Plant out half-hardy annuals this month. Sow seeds of Canterbury Bells, Foxgloves, Sweet Williams and Wallflowers. When the plants are big enough to handle plant them in their permanent positions. ROSES: As the season is still a bit cold last minute pruning of unwanted growth can still be carried out. BULBS: If bulbs are in the way of other planting they can be lifted and either heeled in a corner of the garden or dried off for next year. GLADIOLI: Plant this month 4 - 6 inches deep - a little sand at the bottom of each hole will help the drainage. - *Frank Griffiths*

KITCHEN CORNER

CHICKEN PROVENCAL

For each person allow 1 chicken drumstick and 1 rasher of Streaky bacon.

Other ingredients: small tin of tomatoes, l tblsp tomato puree, l large onion, l clove garlic, l oz butter, l oz flour, ½ pt chicken stock/wine mixed, seasoning parsley or thyme.

Lay a Sprig of chosen herb on each drumstick and tie the bacon round with string. Saute the joints till golden in butter or oil. Remove joints from pan,add chopped onion and soften, add tomatoes. stir in flour and other ingredients. Replace the joints and simmer 30-40 minutes. Remove the strings and serve with sauce poured over. Sprinkle with chopped parsley. This is good served with spinach and new potatoes. *Jill Frostick*

Last year a record 12 million was raised (including the tax reclaim) funding many projects.

Torina Begun lives in a village in Bangladesh where few people have access to modern health facilities. Torina is a Traditional Birth Attendant (TBA) trained by an organisation supported by Christian Aid. Torina first benefited from Christian Aid after the 1987 floods destroyed her home and later when she joined a savings and loan scheme. Being able to borrow money from the scheme has allowed her to rebuild her family home, buy a field and set up a rickshaw business - her husband runs one of the rickshaws! Having gained so much from her involvement she has decided to give something back to her own community by becoming TBA. 

THE CHURCH OF ENGLAND USED TO BE KNOWN AS THE TORY PARTY AT PRAYER ! I doubt whether this was ever true, but obviously many thought it was! Members of the media are forever trying to get Church leaders to criticise or endorse a party or a policy as it makes headlines and is a good stick to beat the politicians with. There are those who feel the Church should keep well out of politics but I don't agree. Party politics yes, but to think that being a Christian is to be apolitical is to be naive. It is not my job to suggest to anyone who to vote for and I do not do so. Committed Christians are rightly to be found in all the main political parties. The Churches have always taught their members that it is a moral duty to vote. Democracy is something many people in our world would treasure and so Christians should not withhold their vote out of indifference, apathy or cynicism. To follow Christ always demands a personal commitment. This is something that can never be wholly private. because the commandment to love God and our neighbour go hand in hand.

A vote then should be used wisely and prayerfully. A General Election is not a single issue referendum, but by discovering a candidate's views on fundamental issues can be very revealing to his or her overall values and priorities. Christianity teaches that everyone is made in the image and likeness of God and has a dignity that does not depend upon age, race, gender, wealth or any other attribute. Christians are also dependent upon, and responsible for others, so if self-interest means neglect of neighbour then each are diminished. There is much to be thankful for in this beautiful world of ours, may it continue so through wise stewardship and careful consideration towards ourselves and our brothers and sisters. SPRING HAS SPRUNG FOR DOORSTEP CRIMINALS

Watch out if a stranger knocks on your door. Spring has sprung for doorstep criminals and the number of complaints to Trading Standards about cowboy workmen offering to carry out household improvements, gardening work or drive resurfacing has increased in recent weeks. There has also been a spate of calls from bogus water and energy company officials. The problems caused by these types of callers range from shoddy work and inconvenience to burglary, theft, and deception. These visitors appear to be genuine, charming, well dressed and confident. They can be young, old, male or female.

- Remember to ask to see callers' identity cards. Check with the organisation your caller claims to represent to make sure they are genuine.
- Think twice before buying block paving, gardening work, household repairs or tarmac from doorstep callers they could be trying to cheat you. Legitimate businesses will always give you time to think about using their services.
- Keep an eye on your elderly neighbours. They are popular targets for bogus callers.
- Tell someone if you have seen something worrying. Have a word with your local neighbourhood watch co-ordinator or the police if you think there is someone suspicious in the area.
- Call the Police on 999 if a doorstep caller threatens you.

KITCHEN CORNER

June is the month for elderflowers, and they can be used to flavour many delicious summer desserts and drinks. It is best to gather them when dry and just opened. Here is a dessert to try. **Elderflower Bararois** Serves 8

2 heads of elderflowers, 3-4 pint creamy milk, 4 eggs, separated, 4 $^{1\!/}_{2}$ oz caster sugar 1 sachet powdered gelatine 5 fl oz double cream

Bring elderflowers and milk slowly to the boil, remove from heat, cover and infuse 10 minutes. Whisk the egg yolks with 3oz of the sugar in a large bowl till thick and pale coloured. Boil milk again then strain. Pour slowly onto egg mix, whisking all the time. Place the bowl over hot water and stir till the custard thickens to coat the back of a spoon. Sprinkle gelatine onto 4 tablesp hot water and stir till dissolved. Stir into the custard. Whisk egg whites, add rest of sugar and whisk till stiff, then fold into the custard. Leave in the fridge till nearly set then fold in the whipped cream. Spoon the mixture into a rinsed 2½ pt mould, cover with oiled greaseproof paper and leave to set in fridge. Loosen edges and turn out onto a plate after dipping into hot water. Serve with fresh soft fruits. *Jill Frostick*

MAKE A

HOT AIR BALLOON


You will need:

strong thread glue

- pieces of coloured paper
- a hair dryer .

- a plastic cup
- a large plastic bag .
- a needle 4

- scissors
- Turn the plastic bag inside out. Put a 1. dab of glue on each bottom corner of the bag (fig 1)
- Turn it back the right way and leave the 2. glue to dry.
- Using a needle and strong thread, 3. carefully sew running stitches all round the open end of the bag (Fig 2)
- When you have sewn all round the bag, pull the thread to gather the bag into a balloon shape (Fig 3).
- Carefully cut the top off a plastic cup so 5 it is about 6cm deep (Fig 4). Stick coloured paper shapes on to the cup to decorate it.
- Using a pencil, make four evenly spaced 6 marks inside the cup, 1cm in from the top (Fig 5).
- Cut four pieces of thread 20cm long. 7 Thread a needle with one of the pieces and tie a knot in the end.
- Starting at one of the pencil marks on the cup, bring the needle through the cup from the outside, up through the open end of the balloon and back down through the inside of the cup (Fig 6). Make a knot in the end.
- Do the same with the three remaining pieces of thread, starting at the other pencil marks in the cup. Make sure the threads end up the same length.
- Hold the nozzle of a hair dryer to the 8. opening of the balloon (Fig 7). Turn it on. as the balloon fills up with hot air, it will rise up, just like a real balloon.

Most months John Appleby-writes something about the village that he has researched from such places as public records and old Parish Councils minutes, in his position involving responsibility for our village archives. Recently Susan Reilly sent me some photographs of people and incidents that happened in the 50-70s. For those of you who do not know who Susan is, she is the daughter of a previous rector of St. George's Church, the Rev. Ransome. There must be lots of photographs like these scattered around the village which need preserving for future generations, for other archivists to look to. With this in mind I thought that it would be a good idea to start a scrapbook which would include photographs and newspaper cuttings. We would reproduce any photographs that villagers had using the scanner most computers come with nowadays so that the originals could be returned. The scrapbooks would be kept for all to view in the Church (subject to Diocesan approval) in a "bookcase". However, there is always a sting in the tale. This would all cost money. I wrote to the Parish Council for a grant but this was rejected. However I have now been made aware that there may be persons who would be prepared to pledge some money for this project. Once we have achieved the target figure of £500 I will start the ball rolling and call in the promises. I will run the finances from a reserved account; both John Appleby and Leonie Henderson have volunteered to be involved in setting up the project. If you think that this is a worthwhile project then please contact me with your pledge. Finally we have received some criticism that we do not regularly announce in the Messenger the deaths of local people. We would like to have a section each month on 'Births, Deaths, Christenings and Marriages'. The Rector of Great Bromley was summoned to appear before the Archdeacon's court held at Ingatestone in 1592 because he had been reported for an offence. The churchwardens were to blame! It was reported that "He dyd not weare the surplice orderlie".

It was then put in his defence that "he weareth it for the most part, and when he weareth not the surplice, the same is kept from him, and not offered by the churchwardens" Other incumbents were also before the Archdeacon. There is no doubt that there were objections to wearing the surplice. It was called a "whorish smock and a Babylonish garment", and John Sharp from Hatfield Peverel parish called the minister "the fo(o)le" and the surplice "a foole's cote" which he asked "yf he would have it to keep him warm". GREAT BROMLEY PARISH COUNCIL

The Annual General Meeting of the Parish Council was held on 17 May 2001. Mr Fairley took the chair in the absence of the Chairman. Major Heaney. Major Heaney was elected as Chairman of the Parish Council for a further year. Major Heaney had stated earlier that he would be pleased to serve a further term of office if nominated. Cllr. S. Baines was appointed Vice-chairman. Representatives to the following committees:-

Hare Green Recreation Ground - Cllr.C. Phillips

Footpaths - Cllr. A. Sievewright.

Tendring in Bloom - Maj. .1. Heaney.

Village Hall -Cllr. Lt. Col. Frostick

Tendring District Assoc. of Local Councils - Maj. J. Heaney.

Cllr. S Rampling volunteered to be the Tree Warden for the coming year.

Cllr. P Richardson kindly volunteered to be the internal auditor.

The **ANNUAL PARISH ASSEMBLY** was held on 17 May 2001 following the Annual General Meeting.

REPORT FROM THE ACTING CHAIRMAN OF THE PARISH COUNCIL.

Mr Fairley said that in the last 12 months there were 12 full council meetings and consideration was given to 51 planning applications at the planning meetings. During the past year a hard standing area and footpath had been laid on Church Meadow and recycling bins for glass and paper are in position here. These are all well used. New football nets have been purchased for the Hare Green Recreation Ground. The feasibility of installing a basketball court on Hare Green was investigated but the response from the parishioners was so poor that the Council was unable to justify the expenditure of approximately £6,000.

In the last year, the Friendship Club organised a petition to complain about the poor state of the grass verges in the village. A reply to this petition was made in the Bromley Messenger stating that the County Council cuts the grass verges. The Parish Council is unable to undertake this grass cutting. In a further complaint from the Friendship Club regarding the state of the plot of land to the front Springhill Close. The Parish Council informed them that this land belongs to the Rona Partnership of Rayleigh.

Heavy rainfall over the last few months has caused many flooding problems in the village. The Parish Council has been liaising with both the County Council and the District Council about this.

REPORT FROM THE COUNTY COUNCILLOR - MR K HAWKINS.

As Mr Hawkins was unable to attend the meeting. his written report was read out. Budget. The County Council has raised its Council Tax bill by 7.9% to make up some of the reserves which were depleted last year. Education. Essex County Council has received a good Ofsted report in its role as Local Education Authority. Some areas of improvement were highlighted regarding children in care. Teacher shortages have caused many problems mainly in the west and south of the county. Steps will be taken to improve this situation. Environment, Planning and Transport. There is a lot of concern regarding the satiety of mobile phone masts. County policy is that new installations should be avoided on county land unless required for emergencies or other council communications. Recycling trials carried out in parts of Essex appear to show that a combination of comprehensive kerbside collection and public education can achieve high recycling rates. Social Services. There are severe pressures facing Social Services in dealing with the increasing number of elderly people in Essex. All but 12 residential homes in the county are being leased or sold. Lime Court in Dovercourt is the only County Council owned home in Tendring being retained. Modernisation. The County Council has introduced a new modernised structure. The new structure consists of a Cabinet style body with scrutinising panels of members. Mr Hawkins reported that he serves on the Education and Environmental Services Select Committee.

REPORT FROM THE DISTRICT COUNCILLOR - M R G JESSOP

In the absence of the District Councillor his written report was read out. During the year Mr Jessop reported that he has dealt with I5 requests for assistance ranging from such matters as council rent and housing, roadside advertising, planning matters, eviction of gypsy roadside encampments and seven complaints regarding the recent flooding. Success with the flooding complaints has been limited because of the different statutory bodies involved with none accepting responsibility for comprehensive remedy. The new Local Government Act introduced by the government last year has now become law and will be fully Operational in October. Tendring will be governed by a Cabinet with a leader and nine appointed councillors each of whom will hold separate portfolios:- Revenues, Finance, Environment, Housing, Leisure & Community, Regeneration, Resources, Technical Services and Planning.

REPORT FROM THE COUNCIL MEMBER ON HARE GREEN RECREATION GROUND.

Mr Phillips said that the playing field is in good condition. Last year the grass cutting contractor was changed and since then there has been 100% improvement in the condition of the ground. The playing field has always been very wet and Council intends to have land drains laid when conditions allow. The one noticeboard on the playing field was recently vandalised but this has now been repaired. Litter is not a problem. A notice will be placed in the Parish Magazine in September to remind children that new football nets are available for use.

REPORT FROM THE COUNCIL MEMBER ON THE VILLAGE HALL.

Mr Fairley reported that the Hall continues to be well used. The Millennium Committee raised $\pounds4,215$ and a lottery grant $\pounds5,000$ was obtained towards the cost of the new Millennium Lounge which has now been completed. It is intended to decorate the outside of the hall and improve the car park this coming year.

PARISH COUNCIL ACCOUNTS.

Mr Richardson, Internal Auditor, reported that the precept was raised in 2000/2001 to £12,000. The previous year we spent £11,000 on Church Meadow and the aim is to increase our reserves. Section 137 payments - (Donation to organisations to benefit our local community) were slightly higher this year. The main increase was due to the donation towards grass cutting for the churchyard. Other donations included the WRVS and the Coastal Fun Scheme for children. In the current year provision has been made in the budget for land drainage at Hare Green.

The next meetings of Gt Bromley Parish Council will be held on 28th June and 2nd August in the Village Hall at 7.30pm.

LITTLE BROMLEY PARISH COUNCIL

At the recent Parish Assembly meeting the following minute was proposed and passed by all present. That the title of the present Little Bromley Village Hall Fund be changed to Little Bromley Village Amenities Fund - that the monies recently collected to be credited to this account. A board of four trustees have been appointed to manage the fund and organise any future fund raising events. The next meeting of the Parish Council will be held on 26th July in the Methodist Chapel, Chequers Road, Little Bromley at 7.30pm.

COULD YOU MAKE A REAL DIFFERENCE TO A CHILD'S LIFE?

Essex Social Services is urgently recruiting to find foster carers and adopters to look after children and teenagers. The number of children coming into care is increasing nationally and Essex is no exception. There are now approximately 800 children cared for in foster families in Essex - and the county needs to recruit an additional 100 carers this year. Foster carers usually look after someone else's children for a few weeks or months while families work through their difficulties. Permanent foster carers who can look after pre-teen or teenage children until they grow up are also needed. Foster carers are paid a fostering allowance and have access to professional training and support. There has also been a steep rise in the numbers of children being referred for adoption, and the county aims to approve 75 adopters this year. Adopters become the new, legal parents of children who cannot be brought up by their birth families. Nowadays there are very few babies given up for adoption. Most of the children are pre-school age or older and will have had a difficult start in life. Many are brothers and sisters who need to stay together so social services would especially like to hear from adopters who would be prepared to take on a ready-made family of two, three or even four Children. There are also many children with disabilities who need permanent families. In some cases, we pay an allowance to help with the costs of bringing up a child. Despite what many people believe, there is no upper age limit for adopters or foster carers. Social workers look at people's ability to look after children in a safe and responsible way. Applicants can be childless, with children at home or have adult children who have left home. They may be single or married working or not working and own or rent their home. Mix all well in a bowl, cover and refrigerate 2 hours. Brush a large loaft in with oil, put in meat mixture. Stand the tin in a baking dish with water halfway up the sides and bake $1\frac{1}{2}$ hours in a fairly hot oven. Cover with foil to prevent drying out. Cool for 1 hour then turn out. Wrap in foil and chill 6 hours before serving. *Jill Frostick*

Gardener's Corner for July

DAHLIAS: Keep the plants well staked as high winds can cause a lot of damage. If long stems are required for cutting, disbud some of the shoots. SHRUBS: Take semi-hard cuttings of Cistus, Ceanothus, Escallonia, Hydrangea, Pyracantha and Skimmia. FUSCHIA: To encourage bushy plants pinch out the leading shoots several times, but remember after pinching out it takes about six weeks for plants to flower. INDOOR PLANTS: Keep a jug by the kettle and any water left over from making the cuppa, pour into the jug and use for watering your indoor plants - they love the soft water. *Frank Griffiths*

WOMEN'S INSTITUTE

FROM THE RECTORY

Dear Parishioners,

What are our Churches for? Quite simply they are places for Christians to gather in to worship God. In these parishes. Christians have come to the same place for centuries to ask God's blessing on their lives. Recently the congregations here made a commitment to having a Eucharist every Sunday in each Parish Church-9.30am at S George's and 11 at S Mary's. Maybe we will be changing the decor, removing some of the pews, doing things in different places. We want to secure the future of our buildings for the coming generations. We want to be complementing the facilities that already exist in our villages. All of this is at an early stage, there are no plans as yet, only thoughts and ideas. There is still a lot of work to be done, not least in raising the monies! Any alterations will have to go through the Church's equivalent of planning procedure and there will be a period of public consultation. So you will be hearing more of this. Just as our churches have evolved over the centuries to meet the needs of the peoples and their lives of prayer. we are doing the same so that God may be worshipped here with the best we can muster to his glory and our encouragement. May he bless us in this task.

Her mother was also a talented needlewoman. There were some lovely hand made gloves. one pair for every day winter wear and another for evening occasions. Also a hand made family christening robe which has been used again more recently for the children, some embroidered bags for holding string and a wrap around overall that most housewives wore, usually made from a decorative material. Part of a nylon parachute was there to look at: her mother would unpick its stitching and make it into other clothing items. Several containers, some still with contents, that held potions to cure ailments were shown. One in particular was labelled 'To cure all ills' but which gave no indication as to the formula.

KITCHEN CORNER

A cookery demonstration at the WI Show at Marks Hall gave us some good ideas for summer picnics. Here are two of them:

BACON SIDE SPLITTERS Makes 6

100g/4oz streaky bacon; 225g/8Oz SR flour ; 25g/10 oa rolled oats ; 50g / 2oz margarine; 1 teasp (or more) coarse grain mustard; 5-6 tablsp milk ; $\frac{1}{4}$ teasp paprika ;

I tub salad cress; 225g / 8oz cottage cheese

Derind and grill bacon till crisp. then chop fine. Put flour, oats and seasoning into a bowl and rub in margarine. Stir in bacon. Beat together egg and mustard. add to than with enough milk to make a soft but not sticky dough. Knead lightly and form into a 15cm/6 in thick circle. Put on greased baking sheet. Mark into 6 wedges and brush with milk. Sprinkle with paprika. Bake in hot own (200C/ 425F) 20-25 minutes till well risen and golden brown. Cool on a rack. When cold split and spread with cheese and cress.

CHEESY MARMITE SOLDIERS Makes 60

75g/3oz butter ; 2 teasp marmite; 150g/6 oz plain flour; 75g/3 oz cheddar cheese; 1 egg beaten. Beat together the butter and marmite. Mix in flour and 2 oz of the cheese, grated. Add enough egg to make a smooth but not sticky dough. Knead lightly and roll out on a floured surface to a rectangle 23 x 30cm (9" x 12"). Cut into 7.5cm x 1 cm (3" x $\frac{1}{2}$ ") strips. Put on to greased baking sheets. brush with remaining egg and sprinkle with rest of cheese. Bake 200C/ 400F for 10 minutes till golden brown. Cool on a wire rack. Pack in foil for a picnic and serve with a barbecue dip.

QUIET LANES

"Walkers cyclists and horse riders stand to benefit from a successful CPRE (the' Council for the Protection of Rural England) campaign to establish a statutory network of quiet lanes in the English countryside." (CPRE Voice Summer, 2001)

The county of Essex holds an amazing variation in the character of its countryside and towns, Geographically this variety stretches from the coastal remotenesses of Foulness, the Dengie Peninsular, Mersey and Horsey Island, through the riparian agricultural, transportation and industrial reaches of the rivers Crouch. Blackwater and Stour through to the heartland of the central land mass ringed by the Colchester-Chelmsford-Braintree triangle and on up to the north western plateau once dominated by arable agriculture and now threatened with becoming; the fiefdom of the aviation and biotechnology global economy. In this county the past and the future are constantly in evidence in the present. Throughout history Essex has played its part in harbouring industry, furthering learning, innovating lifestyles, feeding the nation and refreshing

souls in its accessible and welcoming countryside. Any visitor to any part of Essex passes through the legacy left by many centuries of man-made landscapes, buildings and cultural activity. The future, both the threat represented by yet more roads, houses and industrial development and the promise represented by good design and new landscaping (in particular tree and hedge planting, which received such an enormous boost in the 1970s) is equally in evidence.

The rivers of Essex once served millers of every variety from corn to cloth in their sheltered valleys. The intelligence and skill of local workers, supplemented at various periods by immigrants from the nearby continent and the metropolis itself, encouraged manufacturers large and small to set up business here. The agricultural depression of the inter- war years can still be vividly recalled by the oldest inhabitant of many of our villages. The frenzy of national commitment to excellence in the defence industry has left its mark in the conurbations of Chelmsford and Colchester. Proximity to the Square Mile encouraged many a City leader to establish a home base in the once secret outback of the Colne Valley and other little known areas of tranquillity elsewhere in the County.

From the 1930s on (until the Beeching axes fell in the 1960s) many cyclists would load their machines on weekend excursion trains bound for country stations like Elsenham in Uttlesford, ride all day and return home in the evenings physically tired but mentally refreshed from their ' exertions away from the stresses and pollution of their working life in the accessible and welcoming Essex countryside. True, this very accessibility has caused its depredation too. Small land holdings have been abused by overcrowding with unsuitable activities. Visitors to popular beauty spots have on occasion caused the erosion of the very character they had sought to enjoy. And pleasure vehicles have been known to exercise their rights to drive on byways unreasonably when the result of their passing is damage and danger to others. But mostly the countryside of Essex has been cherished by owners and beneficiaries alike.

There are many Jeremiahs metaphorically striding through the printed pages of environmental journals and other publications wringing their hands, tearing their hair and crying "Woe. woe and thrice woe - the countryside is gone. the larks no longer rise, the badgers have departed. the sea is rising ...we are undone" and more in that vein. But I have found that it is still possible to walk down some lanes with a biddable dog off the lead, the young on their bikes and cowslips massed on the verges. There are larks and song thrushes, and badgers, and orchids and bats - if you know where to look for them. The very fact that all is not lost must encourage us all to take the necessary steps to protect what we have left and to ensure the appreciation of the long term benefit to everyone (whether they are conscious of it or not) of maintaining our countryside and in formal leisure spaces in built-up areas.

One of the most inclusive ways of encouraging a fondness for the local environment is to enable people to explore their neighbourhood on foot, bike or (in the country-side at least) horseback, secure in the knowledge that their presence along a particular stretch of countryside or streetscape is acknowledged and that any motorised traffic will be prepared to give way to them by slowing down and watching out for them. Such security can be obtained through a "Quiet Lane" designation. Essex Local Transport Plan includes a Quiet Lanes policy and all that is needed now is local interest and drive (if you'll pardon the expression) to establish Quiet Lanes throughout the County. How excellent it would be it Essex were to lead the way in being the first county in England to have a Quiet Lane linking local walks or rides in every parish - both urban and rural! All it would take is for each Parish (and town) Council to press Essex County Council to establish one country lane or small street to be so designated in each parish. The short term benefit to parents and children, dog owners, cyclists and horse riders would be multiplied by the long term benefit to the environment of having some areas deliberately set apart for some degree of tranquillity in this modern hectic world!

Why not write. now to your Parish or Town Council pressing them to call for Essex County Council to designate aQuiet Lane in your own parish? Preferably such a Quiet Lane proposal should form a link so that one could walk or ride a complete circuit in traffic calmed conditions. FROM THE RECTOR

Dear Parishioner Our Churches have been the focus of community life here for hundreds of years. Before Schools, Village Halls, and the like the Church would have been the place of gathering. The local priest was probably also the school teacher and doctor so surgeries and classes would have taken place there. At times of storm or danger the Church would have been a place of refuge, security, sanctuary. Births, marriages and deaths would have been marked within her walls, times of hope and joy, as well as of sorrow and grief. Our buildings have been lived in in the fullest sense of the word, a house belonging to God and his people. Since the Victorians, I suppose, Churches have been ordered and set aside solely for the worship of God and of course we have a great deal to be thankful to them for their care and development of buildings. S Mary's Ardleigh is the beautiful sanctuary known throughout the world, because of the generosity and skills of the priests and people in the 1860s.

All three of our churches and their churchyards are havens of peace and tranquillity partly because of their past histories, partly because they are still places of prayer and praise, and partly because they have a stake too in the future. Sadly at the moment Little Bromley is kept locked by the charity which cares for her, but the keys are easy to get hold of. In Ardleigh and Great Bromley our Churches are prayed in every day - you'll often hear the bell chiming- These occasions are for all in the parish whether you choose to attend or not. During the rest of the time they are there for you to visit as places for contemplation, and quiet, just as much as Christian prayer and praise. The buildings here, like the times of worship, are for all people. The Church Councils feel strongly that they should be open as much as possible and work hard to make this happen. Sometimes open Churches seem to be a risk, but we think if that is so, and it is a risk worth taking. Locked churches cease to have that lived in feeling which has marked them in the past.

Next time you feel you need space or want to be away, yet somewhere secure, pop into one of your churches as countless of your predecessors have. Bring your life with its cares and anxieties, as well as its hopes and dreams, and relax for a while in a place that has been a haven in the past and promises to be one in the future. May God bless you. *Fr Nicolas*.

One of these last year was my peacock which was rescued from where he was being hounded on a small housing estate. He was a young immature male which apparently are quite often dumped (presumably because too many males with insufficient females will fight). My cousin took charge and rang me in July to ask if I would take him on. She suggested clipping his wings but I did not like the idea as he would then be unable to fly up and roost at night. After some thought we decided to give him a home but knew that he may leave because we decided we would not get a peahen as peacocks can be very successful breeders (we know of someone who ended up with about 40!). He made the journey from Norfolk in the boot of my car and proceeded to settle happily with the menagerie here and most particularly with the ducks with whom he went everywhere except into the water when he would stand on the edge watching them uncomprehendingly and shepherding them away from it when they emerged. This year he grew his tail to the proper adult length for a young mature male and we realised it was only a matter of time before he was off to find a mate. The ducks were unimpressed by his displays, as were the dog and cats. The pheasants too preferred their own kind so he started to wander and we had feedback from various parts of the village that he had visited. The number of days away grew longer until now he only comes back for the odd day or so to sit with the ducks and say hello. I don't know where he is but I hope he has found his peahen and that he is being treated kindly and fed well. I wish him luck. Leonie Henderson

The garden refuse dumped in Park Road and Mary Lane North has been reported to the District Council for removal.

Re-cycling bins on Church Meadow From l August the Parish Council took over full responsibility of the re-cycling bins from Tendring District Council. it is hoped that in the weeks to come, the usage of the bins will become clearer and a more satisfactory emptying arrangement set up.

Stolen Bench from outside Village Hall A replacement bench has now been ordered- delivery awaited.

County Councillor Mrs S Candy attended her first Parish Council meeting since her recent elections. The Chairman asked for her assistance to press for measures to help reduce road noise from the A133 and A120 roads.

Lorries There are concerns about the number of large lorries over 7.5 tonnes travelling through the village on the B1029 road. Parishioners are asked to report sightings, giving timings and if possible. registration numbers to the Parish Council.

Open space land to the front of St George's Close Members of the public. present at the meeting, complained about the very untidy state of the large grass area in front of St Georges Close which belongs to the County Council. The Parish Council agreed that this plot of land in the centre of the village is unsightly and a letter would be sent to the County Council requesting remedial action.



TOMATOES: Pick fruit that have just started to turn colour and ripen off in PAPER bags (not plastic). LETTUCE: If you have cloches. plant winter lettuces such as "Arctic King" BEETROOT: Any surplus beetroot - dig them up and place in a black plastic bag and bury in a shallow trench. ROSES: Prune out old stems of ramblers when they have finished flowering. ANEMONES: Can be planted this month for early spring flowering - choose a sunny position.

KITCHEN CORNER

HONEYCAKE Makes 24 pieces

5 oz butter; 4 oz soft brown sugar; 6 oz clear honey; 1 tblsp water.

Warm gently in a saucepan till melted and blended then leave to cool. When cooled to tepid beat in two eggs, one at a time. Then stir in 7 oz SR wholemeal flour. Pour the mixture into greased lined oblong tin 11x7 inch or a small roasting tin. Sprinkle all over with flaked almonds and bake in a moderate over for 30-35 minutes (350F, 180C) till risen and firm to the touch. Turn out to cool, then cut in squares. *Jill Frostick*

ALTERATIONS AT LITTLE BROMLEY CHURCH


Thomas Legh, Bishop of St Albans, in whose diocese our parishes were until 1914, granted a Faculty to The Revd Harry Holdsworth Minchin, rector of Little Bromley and Edgar Cooper, the sole churchwarden, to do the following alterations because there was "urgent need of renovation. the floor being rotten, the walls damp and the sittings unsightly and inconvenient". The parishioners agreed at a meeting on 9th April, 1885. that there was a need for reseating,

removing the gallery and making other alterations according to the plans of Mr F G Jackson. This work required the removal of all woodwork of the pews in the Chancel and Nave: the

wooden Reredos in the Chancel; The Reading Desk; the Gallery in the Tower; to alter the position of the Alter Rails: to provide a new and more convenient Communion Table and a Credence Table; to open out a blocked up Window in the Chancel and two blocked up Windows in the Nave; to provide for warming the Church with one of Powill's Stoves and build a chimney for this.

The estimated cost was seven hundred pounds of which five hundred pounds had been raised by subscription and this had been deposited in the London and County Bank, Manningtree.

It was necessary to remove the monument of the



Revd. Thomas Newman, Junior, so that the blocked up window in the chancel could be opened, but it was intended that the monument should then be replaced as near to the original position as possible.

If anything else was necessary to facilitate the work this was agreed and the faculty document signed and sealed by the Bishop of St Alban's Registrar, George Henry Knight on 22nd May 1885. The Rt. Revd. Thomas Legh had been Bishop of St Albans for eight years having been translated from another bishopric.

Almost a new interior to what many believe is an old one. What did the original church look like inside? There is no one alive today to say. *John Appleby*



KITCHEN CORNER

A vegetarian dish to make the most of the autumn vegetables from the garden. This is quick and easy to make.

COUSCOUS WITH ROASTED VEGETABLES

175g/6 oz couscous; 700g/1½ lb mixed vegetables (eg. sliced courgettes and aubergines, tomatoes, young carrots, halved peppers etc.) 8tbsp olive oil; a handful each of fresh coriander. mint and parsley roughly chopped; salt and pepper; 1 tbsp harissa (spicy paste) or some garam masala or curry powder; 3-4 tbsp white wine vinegar; grated rind and juice of 1 orange. Put couscous in a bowl and pour on boiling water to cover by 1 cm. Leave to soak 30 minutes. Put all the vegetables in a roasting tin, drizzle on half the oil and add half herbs. Stir in seasonings and roast in a hot oven 20 - 30 minutes till tender. Put rest of oil and vinegar in a large bowl, add the warm pan juices from the vegetables, stir in the couscous, rest of herbs orange juice and rind and season to taste. Serve at once, piling the vegetables on top and sprigs of coriander to garnish. *Jill Frostick*

Gardeners Corner for October

SHRUBS: Take hardwood cuttings this month.


PATIO PLANTS: Take under cover half-hardy plants that are in pots such as azaleas.

ROSES: Take cuttings of climbers and ramblers. Plant in the position you wish them to grow i.e. over arches or against the fence.

RHODODENDRONS; Now is the time to layer established plants. Take a low growing branch and

peg it to the ground with a piece of bent wire and cover with soil. In the spring when it shows signs of growth sever from the parent plant and replant it.

DAHLIAS: When frost blackens the stems cut down to six inches and lift tubers. turn upside down to drain stems then store under cover for the winter. *Frank Griffiths*

"Chusing a place to erect two pews for the accommodation of Mr Warren and his family" was on everyone's lips. John Hanson, who was at the Hall strongly objected to the scheme as did Mr Wade. This seems to prove that there was still work going on to install new seating. Hanson had his way which is what one would have expected from such a strong character. *John Appleby*

NEWS FROM THE DOCTOR'S SURGERIES

ARDLEIGH SURGERY - DON'T FORGET YOUR FLU VACCINATION

The Department of Health recommends that all people aged over 65 including those with chronic conditions, such as asthma, diabetes, heart disease and renal disease should be vaccinated against influenza as complications associated with the flu can be serious. The Department of Health has therefore, set a target for all general practices to vaccinate at least 65% of their over 65 patients. Last year Ardleigh surgery achieved 70%! Ardleigh Surgery, in common with all other surgeries, will be offering 'flu vaccination clinics during October and November. Please contact the surgery to book into a clinic on 4, 11, 25 October or 8 November at 2pm. If these dates are inconvenient patients may make an appointment with a Practice Nurse for some other time. As the availability of 'flu vaccines is limited this year, as always, make sure you book an early appointment.

DIABETIC SCREENING are you one of the missing million? Statistically, there are approximately one million undiagnosed diabetics in the UK. Unfortunately, many people with diabetes are only diagnosed after they have already developed complications of the eye, kidney or circulation including the heart. Ardleigh Surgery are concerned that some of our patients may have diabetes, but are unaware. It is planning, therefore, this autumn during the flu vaccination campaign, to offer urine testing to anyone over 50, or those with a family history of diabetes, who have not had this done in the past twelve months. WEALTH OF THE COUNTRYSIDE

The National Federation of Women's Institutes launched the (Wealth of the Countryside campaign during 11th to 24th September. All WI members had been asked to record the hours they voluntarily give to their local community during one month. Our local WI is not large with only 23 members but we came up with a staggering 352.5 hours for the month broken down into WI organisation and support, Managing/supporting other organisations, Environment and conservation, Personal care and support, Social, cultural, recreational activities, Campaigning, citizenship and Other. Taken over 12 months this amounts to 4,230 hours which at £10 per hour, the accepted value for volunteer work, is £42,300 as our contribution to the community. The WI movement was started in Stoney Creek, Canada, by a Mrs Adelaide Hoodless with the help of Mr Erland Lee on 17th February, 1897. In Great Britain the first Women's Institute was formed at Llanfairpwll, North Wales on 16th June, 1915 by the combined efforts of Mr Nugent Harris, Secretary of the Agricultural Organisation Society (AOS), Colonel Stapleton-Cotton, Chairman of the North Wales Branch of the AOS and Mrs Alfred Watt from Canada.

FROM THE RECTORY

Dear Parishioner,

A few years ago someone produced a list of "modern sins" to help Christians in their spiritual lives. It came under great ridicule for amongst other things it listed bad driving as being sinful. A sin is something that causes a break in a relationship. it could be between God and myself, between another human or something that damages myself.

The reasoning behind the driving goes something like this. Causing an accident is obvious but simply cutting someone up or irritating another may mean that that person gets into the office and bites off the head of the secretary, who is then abrupt to someone on the telephone, who the chain continues. Often it is the little things that do that, like a pebble dropping into a pool, send waves out far beyond my awareness.

Sometimes it is because I don't say to someone "it hurts when you do that" or "it makes me sad when you say things like that", that it eats away inside me and either makes me poorly or eventually becomes way out of proportion. It doesn't make my reaction right but sometimes it can explain it.

In trying to come to terms with the tragic terrorist events in America, and indeed in other parts of our world, I have to acknowledge, as Jesus did, that humans are capable of great evil towards themselves and each other. The third generation person born in a refugee camp can have a hatred, rightly or wrongly, for those he thinks are responsible that fuels him to react disproportionately. It doesn't make the action right, but can maybe be understood a little. Jesus said love your neighbour yes, but love your enemy too, lest your lack of love destroys you and him. Forgive those who trespass against you. Don't let hurt or grievances fester or be perpetuated. Be reconciled to each other. Love one another. Every day our world changes, but especially so on September 11th this year. How I wish I could turn back the clock, but I can't. What I can do is seek to be someone who when I sin or am sinned against, does all in my power to mend the break. When I see another being hurt or an injustice being carried out, I seek to bring reconciliation. As a Christian leader, as a man who tries to walk humbly with his God, I can ask you to share with me in being loving, being generous, in giving the benefit of the doubt, in reaching out to others in need, in being strong in the face of evil. I can try to make sure I'm a good driver. May God bless you. *Fr Nicolas*.

PARISH COUNCIL NEWS

Essex County Council Land between St Georges Close anti Brook Street (B1029)

There have been numerous complaints about the state of this plot of land. Essex County Council treats this plot as it does grass verges and will only cut the perimeter grass. the remaining being left. The plot is a permanent eyesore and negates all attempts by the Parish Council to make the village look attractive. The Parish Council has therefore agreed to manage the site and is now consulting with the County Council so that the necessary legal arrangements can be made.

Land Drains - Hare Green Recreation Ground Two quotes. in the region of £5,000, have been received to drain the whole of the recreation ground. Councillors are now investigating the feasibility of partial drainage of the ground which may be sufficient to improve the condition of the playing field.

Land Adjacent to the Old Spread Eagle Public House Despite strong objections from the Parish Council, Tendring District Council have renewed the planning application to build two dwellings on this plot of land.

Excessive Speeding in Great Bromley Council has received several complaints about excessive speeding by motorists and motor cyclists in the village. Speeding is a major cause of accidents which can lead to death or serious injuries. Council will pass on any information it receives about the culprits to the police.

Ralph King, Rector of Little Bromley in the 16th century, gives an account of an accident there in 1594. In the Little Bromley Burial Register he writes - "William Tybald, a child of the age of viij years smothered with a corne stack falling uppon him by myshannif, being the sonne of Robert Tybauld" (buried xiiij nov. 1594) There is no other detail so whether William was a local child or had come from a nearby parish to play in the place of his accident is not clear. Maybe some day other evidence will come to give details of this family. *John Appleby*

KITCHEN CORNER

FOREST SAVVY This month's recipe comes from the Forest of Dean, Gloucestershire. Ingredients for 4: 8 oz/225 g SR flour; 4 oz /110 g butter or low fat spread; 4 oz/110 g lean smoked bacon, finely diced; 4 oz/110 g double Gloucester cheese; 4 oz/110 g cooking apple, peeled, cored & diced; 6-8 tablesp chilled water; 1 onion, chopped; 1 potato, chopped into fine dice; 1 tableSp oil; ¼ teasp ground ginger; ½ carrot, chopped into fine dice; good teasp fresh sage leaves, chopped; ½ teasp English Mustard powder; 1 egg (for glazing); Ground black pepper and salt. Sieve flour and rub in fat. Add water and mix to smooth dough, cover in cling film and chill for 20 minutes. Heat frying pan and add oil. Add onion and fry gently until soft. Add diced bacon and continue to cook for 2 minutes. Remove and set aside. Cook carrot and potato in boiling water for 2 minutes, then cool. Add apple, cheese, potato, carrot, ginger, mustard and sage to bacon & onion mix and season. Roll out pastry and cut into 4 rounds (size of a saucer). Put mixture in the centres, brush edges with water, fold in half and seal. Brush with beaten egg and bake in oven for 20-25 minutes. Gas Mark 6 or Electric 180C. *June Willgress*

FROM THE RECTORY

Dear Parishioner,

November is always a poignant time, with the leaves falling, days shortening, animals (and some humans) thinking about hibernating. The Church of England calls this the season of the Kingdom because our thoughts turn naturally to death. The month begins with the solemn feast of All Saints, when we celebrate those chosen by the Church as having been as close to God as is possible in this earthly life. On the 2nd we remember with prayer and thanksgiving the faithful departed, especially those whom we have known and loved. Then the 11th brings us to Remembrance Day when we remember all those who have died as a result of war. Maybe this year as we remember the events of September 11th, which some have named as an act of war and the subsequent action in Afghanistan, these occasions will be more real to us. Some days after the atrocities in New York I was privileged to preach to the English Church in Sarajevo. I prepared a homily on being "tearful & fearful" and was taken aback at how apposite that was. The congregation was diminished as many people had been called home, or decided to leave. For the others simply travelling out was seen by their embassies as a security risk, but it was a risk they chose to take rather than be prisoners in their own homes. They were all "tearful & fearful" as I know I have been at times and I expect some of you have been. For myself being at Liverpool Street Station on September 11th at 7pm during what should have been its busiest time and yet eerily quiet, hearing of the beginnings of the offensive on Afghanistan; tearful & fearful.

The Christian Gospels teach us that tears are all right. Jesus weeps for the death of his friend and the lack of understanding and faith. He weeps over the city of Jerusalem and the closed minds of her inhabitants. It's all right to be tearful and at times necessary. Tears of grief, tears of frustration, even of despair and anger, all form an important part of our emotions and should be allowed to flow freely.

Was Jesus ever afraid? More difficult to answer that one. On the night before he died, Jesus spends a great deal of time in prayer and contemplation showing us that above all else fear is something to be controlled rather than controlling- His conduct at his arrest, trial and crucifixion show a strength that comes from his relationship with God through the power of the Holy Spirit. Indeed he admonishes his disciples when they meet fear with violence.

The Gospels call each of us back to the basics of leading a life of love, mercy. forgiveness and reconciliation. Whatever beliefs you hold that would be a good start as you stand on November 11th for two minutes silence. acknowledging the past, looking to the future. May God bless us and his world with peace & security.



SUZANNE AND JAMIE'S ECUADOR CYCLING CHALLENGE

ON BEHALF OF MACMILLAN CANCER RELIEF 13 - 29 October 2001

By the time the December Bromley Messenger comes out with our report, we shall be hopefully getting back to some sort of a 'normal' routine after having experienced 2 weeks in Ecuador - the most amazing land of 4 seasons in one day. I knew that the physical challenge of cycling across the Andes would be a little tougher than the training we have done in the undulating Essex countryside! Unfortunately nothing could have prepared us for the emotional challenge which followed the accident which happened on our first day there. We took a short canoe ride across a wide, fast flowing river Napo to our first night's stop in a jungle lodge. One of the canoes got into difficulties and capsized with the loss of a young woman's life. We did have the option of abandoning the challenge and come back to England, but the majority of the group had decided that by returning home we would not achieve anything, so we decided to continue in memory of our friend Sharon. Although it was a very hard decision, the emotional and physical battles (heat, humidity, altitude and long steep hills) were enormous. The event organisers and all the participants helped each other to get through this incredibly tough time and make it successfully to our Pacific Coast destination. On a more positive note I am happy to tell you that Jamie and I have raised between us over £6000 for Macmillan Cancer Relief and the whole group has raised more than £200,000! My part of the money raised will go towards financing a Macmillan nurse at St. Helena Hospice in Colchester and a new full-time specialist oncologist at Colchester District Hospital.

We would love to share our experiences of this unforgettable trip, the beautiful scenery, the kindness of the indigenous people and the new friendships made; with our friends and sponsors alike. We have captured the trip on slides and are planning to do a talk with a slide show sometime in the New Year. This just leaves me to thank all of you who have sponsored us for the Ecuador cycling challenge. It has been more than an unforgettable experience. it has been a humbling. life changing experience. *Suzanne and Jamie Abbott*

Hearing Dogs for Deaf People is a registered Charity which carefully selects and trains unwanted dogs to respond to specific sounds and become the ears of a deaf person. Most dogs are chosen from rescue centres or are donated, thus giving unwanted dogs useful lives to the benefit of deaf people. Instead of barking, the dogs are taught to alert the deaf person by touch, using the paw to gain attention. and then to take them to the sound source - such as the alarm clock, doorbell, telephone or baby crying. If the sound indicates a potential danger such as a fire alarm the dog will alert its owner by touch and then immediately drop to the floor. Prior to training, the dogs spend about eight months with volunteer puppy socialisers, living as part of their family, being taught basic obedience and going to training classes every two weeks at the Charity's main training centre. The puppy's character and progress are constantly monitored and, when the time is right, it is taken into the centre for several months for its official Hearing- Dog training. Once training is completed, the deaf person is invited to stay at the self-contained accommodation at the centre to work alongside the trainer for a week.

The practical value of a hearing dog is obvious, but the therapeutic value should not be underestimated. The deaf person usually finds having the dog increases his or her confidence and independence. Hearing Dogs provide companionship, mobility, awareness of sounds and a feeling of security. Deaf people no longer have to rely on mechanical equipment such as flashing lights and other devices because a hearing dog provides awareness of sounds. As Helen Keller said, "When you lose your sight, you lose things, when you lose your hearing, you lose people". The N.E. Essex & Borders branch was formed in 1995 and we are delighted with the high level of support we have enjoyed. The role of our branch is to raise awareness of the Charity and raise funds by inspiring local support. We do so by giving talks to schools and organisations, attending shows and functions with our stall of commercial goods, seeking sponsorship and by holding specific fund- raising events from time to time. 



Dear Parishioner,

Advent is the time of preparation for the feast of Christmass.
