

"AN AUTUMN MUSICAL HOTSPOT"

Well that's what the blurb said and also that cheese and wine was included in the ticket price. Having spent hours worrying about how much there would be to eat, as one does, I settled for some marmite on toast to accompany my afternoon cup of tea and off we went to the village hall. There, Henry was on the door, as is his wont, flogging programmes at 20 pence a throw. Not wishing to wear out my trouser pockets with masses of change (why is it that a tenner is the lowest denomination dispensed by cash machines?) we didn't do a deal as I had no small change. No matter, I recognised almost everyone on stage and certainly all the tunes. Jo Cobbold's excellent flute rendering from "Titanic" was witnessed by Yvonne singing soprano with the chorus, and earned her prolonged applause. And did you know that Gregory could play the piano, as well as the organ? You didn't! Silly moo! I spent ages trying to see any resemblances between Tricia and her brother Stephen, and failed. One can only be grateful that nature has ordained that brothers, not sisters, will lose their thatch in middle age.

I wonder if any mums felt inadequate when Peter joined Rene and Barbara in a rendering of Sisters. His falsies would have done wonders for the sales of Wonderbra. And, as for his pins, psalm 147 reminds us "Neither delighteth he in any man's legs".

The whole evening was, of course, a huge success. Thankfully, I was not offered any goat's cheese at the interval and one particularly sympathetic soul offered me an extra crust of bread. Tricia deserves our congratulations on a very slick production and all those who took part and who worked like demons on the day are worthy of our grateful thanks. Green was the theme on the night. NEW DISTRICT COUNCIL BOUNDARIES

The Boundary Commission has identified new demarcations of representation in our area for District Council . This means that in the next elections in May 2003, you will be voting for two candidates. They will represent Thorrington, Elmstead Market, Frating, and Great Bromley. Parish boundaries are unaffected since they were traditionally "church" designated. As you are already aware the hierarchy at the Tendring District Council (TDC) has also changed, more of a select committee than an all involved elected council. TDC has not produced any information to the public for publication, and the information above was obtained through a telephone call. Candidates, which for the forthcoming elections will be sought by the various political parties, will have a bigger responsibility as they will be representing twice as many voters. *Len Christodoulides*

GREAT BROMLEY PARISH COUNCIL

A meeting of Great Bromley Parish Council was held on 5th December.

Planning There were no planning applications for consideration by the Council during November. Tendring District Council has approved the renewal of planning permission for a sewage treatment plant, brick shed for toilet, washing machine etc. and retention of wall and additional curtilage at The Caravan, Carrington Road, Gt. Bromley. Approval is subject to conditions and expires in November 2005.

Highways and Footpaths The Council noted that certain footpaths in the parish were being used by horse riders without the landowners* permission. If this continues the County will be asked to install suitable barriers.

Tendring District Council The Parish Council and Clerk will be visiting TDC headquarters in January to be briefed by the Council on its role in supporting the work of its constituent parish councils.

Budget In January the Council will set its budget and precept for 2003-4.

Recycling It appears unlikely that TDC will be able to provide, in the near future, a tins and cans recycling bin at Church Meadow. However, as from April, 2003, TDC will collect recyclable materials (except glass) from properties every two weeks.

Freedom of Information The Council agreed a model publications scheme under the Freedom of Information Act 2000. This will enable members of the public to obtain information on the parish council's decisions, plans and activities.

Fly tipping The Council alerts TDC of rubbish dumped on roadside verges. TDC then arranges for the waste to be removed by Onyx. Members of the public can also report fly tipping direct by telephone Environmental Services TDC on 01255 256198.

The Great Bromley Parish Council will next meet in the Village Hall at 7.30pm on Thursday, 23rd January, 2003. Agenda are posted on the village notice boards and residents are welcome to attend.

A splendid effort and thanks to all who took part, it is really appreciated and much fun was had in the process. 

KITCHEN CORNER

Apples are a popular and versatile fruit and there must be hundreds of different ways of using them! Here is a pudding which I was served at a party recently and found very delicious. Stew the apples with cinnamon and lemon peel till very soft. Sweeten to taste. The amount of sugar depends on the type of apple. Add a few sultanas as well while cooking. Turn them into a serving bowl and leave to get cold.

Topping: 6 oz digestive biscuits crumbled, 3 oz butter, 3 oz demerara sugar.

Melt the butter and stir in crumbs and sugar. Sprinkle this mixture over the cold apple. Serve with double cream and yoghurt whipped together, put in a dish and sprinkle with demerara sugar. If you make this in advance for a party or dinner, only sprinkle the crumb mix at the last moment, or it will not stay crisp. *Jill Frostick*





FROM THE RECTORY

Dear Parishioner, As I write this the Iraqi government are handing over the dossier requested by the United Nations on the state of their weapons. Much posturing and political rhetoric is being handed about and ifs hard to see what will happen next. As in most things there is little that is black and white, purely good or purely evil, although some would have us think so. Behind any statement or action there are always several agendas, some of them transparent and obviously for the good and security of the most people, others less so, more determined by national interests - economic and political. I find it difficult to sieve through what I'm being told and make sense, let alone a judgement on what is right.

A few months ago I wrote of the process a Christian goes through in trying to determine what is just and right and if military force can be justified. This month caught up in the celebrations of Christmass and the season of the Prince of Peace, I want to think on his teaching about enemies. In doing so I'm very much aware that some will say that: it is religion which is often the problem if not the cause of much strife in our world. Again I think I have to go back to the fact that there are often hidden agendas behind the mask of religion.

I'll try to strip away religion and read what Jesus is recorded as saying I find a strong message. "You have heard how it was said: 'Eye for an eye and tooth for a tooth'. But I say to this to you love your enemies, set no bounds to your love. just as your heavenly father sets none to his" (From Matthew 5:3 8-48). Jesus came to usher in a new way of living between enemies, one that if adhered to means one ceases to be enemies, maybe even become friends. It takes a lot of courage, of strength, of letting go of status and self-interest, but the danger is otherwise the whole world will end up blind and toothless

On the world stage this seems impossible, but then again, people of faith can place great store in prayer and hope for the human race. I'm still left with "what can I do?" I can write letters, yes, but more? I can try to explode the myth, often put about by the media that faith is the cause and not the answer. That Muslims and Christians and Jews are enemies and have something to fear from each other. I can go the extra mile, seek to be generous and to those who could have resentment towards me, make the first step of reconciliation, as someone once wrote pour colas of Christian kindness upon their heads! As part of this I am organising a second day - January 25th 10-4 - at the University for people to discover more about Islam. Alter the success of the last occasion there will be a larger input from the local Muslims, including providing lunch. If you're interested please send me £8.

It may simply be a drop in a bucket, but eventually buckets can fill up. It may bring into the open some of those agendas, dispel fear and develop trust. It will help me feel I am doing something rather than being powerless, it may do the same for you and bring blessings of peace to our community, it may save a tooth or an eye. I hope and pray so. May God bless you, *Fr Nicolas*.

TENDRING REVISITED

It was a friend's Christmas present and she lent it to me. A jigsaw. Not a big puzzle, with only 250 pieces, but nonetheless it proved more difficult than I had imagined it would. It was an ordnance survey map with her house marked right in the middle of the jigsaw with the piece house shaped. The area covered was from Colchester (top left) to Clacton (bottom right). I sat down after lunch thinking half an hour, maybe a little longer, should see it finished. There was no picture (in any event I usually try to do jigsaws without reference to the picture and I therefore felt that to pull out the map as a reference would be cheating) and just my knowledge of 30 years of familiar territory to guide where the pieces would go. Having easily completed the four straight sides the half hour seemed a doddle. I found village names half on one piece and half on another. I joined them together and placed them where I thought they should go on my map around the central piece of my friends house. The built up areas of Colchester and Clacton were done in a flash but as I joined up the familiar villages I became slower and slower as they never seemed to be as far over or as far down as I imagined them to be. In the end the lynch pin for me to completing the puzzle was the green ribbon of the A120 wending its way from the north west (top left!) of the map to the south east (bottom right). Everywhere seemed to fall into place around it although it took me almost to the finish to find "my" piece with our house on it (needless to say on two separate pieces). The creeks and rivers were surprisingly the most difficult of all. I hadn't realised there were so many winding their way through the landscape. and I had often no notion of their names so I have learnt a great deal putting this puzzle together. I spent a very happy relaxing afternoon - a complete time-waster of a day - piecing the bits together with happy memories of all sorts of occasions spent with the children and with friends at the various places around the Tendring Peninsula, out towards Rowhedge and along the creeks. A journey back in time with the anticipation of finding in the future some of the places marked that I have not been to before. It took me approximately four hours to complete! Leonie Henderson

NEWS FROM THE DOCTORS' SURGERY "THE HOLLIES", GT BENTLEY

This is our first bulletin bringing you news of developments and changes here at the surgery. From 2nd January, we are changing our appointments system to make access to the doctors very much quicker. For people with an urgent problem, there will be no change. They will still be seen the same day. However, the big improvement is that anyone wanting a non-urgent doctor's appointment will now be guaranteed one within two working days. (Working days incidentally are Monday-Friday). To make this work, we will only be booking doctors' appointments two days in advance except for specialist clinics, such as diabetic reviews. Don't be alarmed by this! We promise that when you want to see a doctor you will be offered a time within two working days. even when things are busy. Inevitably we need a little help to make this work. Most importantly, please do not press staff to book appointments further ahead than two working days. They won' t be allowed to. Also, we won't be booking routine matters or follow-ups on our busiest days, which are Mondays and Fridays.

We know that some people like to see their favourite doctor every time. We cannot promise that this will always happen. (Some doctors might never go home if we did!) Please help us by accepting an appointment with whichever doctor is offered. If you insist on seeing your favourite and all appointments are booked, you will be asked to ring back another day. This new system which will be very much better for everyone, will soon be extended to cover the nurses. This is going to be possible partly because a new nurse has recently started here. Her name is Bonnie Beard. We also have a new part-time doctor starting in February. He will help out with the busy days and ensure that we keep to our promise about appointments. *Hugh Cronin, Practice Manager*

GREAT BROMLEY PARISH COUNCIL

Report on Great Bromley Parish Council's *ad hoc* meeting held on 9 January 2003 **Tendring District Council: Cultural Strategy** The Council noted Tendring's draft cultural strategy for the district and agreed to contribute its views in response to a questionnaire and at a consultation workshop in January.

The Counil's budget and Precept for 2003/4 The Council agreed that its budget for expenditure in 2003-4 should be £12,500 (the same as for 2002-3) and that this amount should be raised from parish Council Taxpayers via Tendring District Council. This money will be spent on the following: general administration and contingencies (£5,550), contributions to charities and voluntary organisations which benefit the local community (£1,300), contribution towards Village Hall costs (£2,500), costs of maintaining Council property including the playing field (£3,150). In addition to the Council Tax Precept the Council has an annual income of about £540 which includes £360 revenue from the Church Meadow bottle and paper recycling banks. The Council expects to maintain its reserves at about £10,000. The Council will draw on this fund when it makes a contribution towards the cost of additional equipment for the playing field.

Next meeting The Great Bromley Parish Council will next meet in the Village Hall at 7.30 pm on Thursday 23 January 2003. Agendas are posted on the village notice boards and residents are welcome to attend.





KITCHEN CORNER

Pancake day comes soon (4th March), but they are good on other days too. These recipes are for breakfast pancakes served the American way with bacon and maple syrup. They are also good with marmalade or honey or just buttered.

BUCKWHEAT PANCAKES I use equal quantities of buckwheat and wholemeal or plain flour. Either milk or yoghurt (plain) with water to mix. You can add a beaten egg for a richer mixture. Combine the flours with pinch of salt, gradually stir in liquid to smooth batter - consistency of thick cream is about right. Hot greased pan, drop in spoonfuls and cook both sides for a few minutes till nicely golden brown.

POTATO PANCAKES makes 4

1 small potato, peeled, cooked and mashed, 1 small egg ,30 g plain flour, 30 g potato flour (or use plain if unavailable), 50 ml milk, $\frac{1}{2}$ teasp baking powde,r salt and black pepper ground, nutmeg oil for frying

Cool the mashed potato, then put in a bowl with egg, flours and baking powder. Whisk to a smooth paste, gradually adding milk. Season well. Heat pan with a little oil, pour in ¼ of mix and cook both sides. Continue with rest. Can be re-heated when needed. These will be quite thick. Serve with bacon and syrup as above. *Jill Frostick*

FROM THE RECTORY

Dear Parishioner,

As I write the Ark Royal has just sailed out of Portsmouth with a great deal of speculation as to where she is going and what the men and women on board will experience before they return home. The Prime Minister has spoken with a great sense of confidence in the path he is treading and the "Hawks" (a term I understand to be used for those hovering and eager to move militarily into Iraq) are crying louder. So what of the doves? Presumably they are the ones who are urging greater diplomatic efforts and questioning the approach. Rowan, the new Archbishop of Canterbury, has spoken of the Three Wise men who told Herod of the birth of a King and thus triggered the massacre of innocents. They are, he said, "like contemporary strategists who miss the huge and obvious things and wreak yet more havoc and suffering". Archbishop Rowan like other "doves", has the difficulty of finding alternatives to force. Part of this difficulty seems to me that the Iraq issue is at least one step removed from the war on terrorism.

As yet no one has been able to link Saddam Hussein or any Iraqis with al Qa'ida, September 11 2001, or any other recent terrorist attacks. More plausible is a desire for a regime change connected with oil interests. When the doves ask did we sign up for militarily bringing about regime changes and who decided (after all the list of governments with bad human rights issues, some of whom we count as allies and trading partners, is quite long) Iraq was to be first.

A few months ago many of you joined thousands of others on a march in London entitled "Liberty and Livelihood" because you felt passionately that things were being done in your name that threatened those things. I've never been on such a protest march myself, but am seriously thinking and praying about joining others on February 15th because liberty and livelihood are in my name being threatened because on the information I have, I come to a different conclusion to the Prime Minister. Military action will certainly strike at the liberty and livelihood of the Iraqi people, possibly de-stabilise the whole region, increase the possibility of revenge terrorist attacks, and trigger a greater insecurity in our world. May the doves, the men and women of peace and justice, find a voice, a viable solution, and a way to strengthen the things we hold dear and will march for. May God bless you, Fr Nicolas.

DEEPEST AFRICA

Wednesday 29 January, 2003

Dear Messenger Readers, Moni! Muri Bwanji? (Greetings! How are you?) I am writing from Lilongwe, Area 1 - the frenetic capital of Malawi, Southern Africa. The air is heavy and thick. Angry monsoon clouds are gathering ominously overhead. From the last downpour, the earth is stodgy and obstinate. Everywhere, there is rich green foliage. Down the road, battered taxis and buses rush to and fro. Beyond that, traders sell bric-a-brac, or barbecued maize, or woven furniture Builders collect corrugated steel from the wholesalers. And on the other side of town is City Centre with its banks, corporate offices, international aid organisation headquarters and Capitol Hill - the financial and bureaucratic hub?

In the weeks before Christmas 2002, residents of Great Bromley and the surrounding region donated an amazing £502 as part od a Raffle at the Old Courthouse Inn in aid of the UK charity Building Futures in Malawi. In 1999 the charity founded Falls Secondary School and is continually striving to enhance its basic resources. (Very basic - trust me; the staff teach with a sum total of about twenty books - and this is the middle of the capital). With this and other generous donations, my friend Tom Bowden and myself were able to fund a 2-tonne shipment of books, computers and football equipment and still bring £400 with us to Malawi to spend on further development projects. We are thinking of building a library to hold all those books when they arrive on 24 February?

After receiving us in the typically warm Malawian manner, the Headmaster put us to work. I am teaching Form 1 and 2 Mathematics while Tom is teaching English Literature to Form 3. English is the official language of Malawi, but the language barrier is still the most difficult to break. Tom is also coaching the school football team twice a week with a girl's session on another day. I don't think any of them had seen so many footballs in one place before. The school team beat a local team (of older boys) 4-2 last Friday, and there is a Teachers v Pupils match tomorrow. The teams are wearing kits donated by Liverpool FC and Colchester United PC that we brought in our hand luggage. Football is a universal currency over here! GARDENER'S CORNER FOR MARCH

SHRUBS: Rooted suckers from Cornus, Philadelphus and Lilacs may be severed and planted out. Shrubs for containers may also be planted this month. If you have a Forsythia take a few cuttings and place in a vase indoors - they will bloom and give a bit of colour - alternatively place the cuttings in a dark place when they will bloom white. TEA ROSES: Prune this month CHRYSANTHEMUMS: Propagate summer flowering types from new shoots on stools. DAHLIAS: Start tubers into growth by placing them in boxes of damp peat or old compost. Sow SEEDS at the end of the month. IRISES: Remove dead and dying leaves from Bearded Irises and apply fertiliser. *Frank Griffiths*

GREAT BROMLEY PARISH COUNCIL

Report of a Great Bromley Parish Council meeting held on 23 January 2003 County Council **County Councillor reports** Mrs Candy reported that our Council Taxes were likely to increase by at least 20% in 2003/4 with further annual increases in prospect. She also reported that the A120 was unlikely be "dualled" before 2016.

Environment The Council continues to be concerned at the amount of rubbish and litter deposited by the roadside. The District Council is regularly reminded of its responsibility for clearing this away promptly. It was reported that rubbish was being dumped in Church Meadow and wind- blown litter was accumulating in the hedges. Residents are asked to assist with dealing with this problem. A dog-waste bin is to be installed in Back Lane East, where fouling has been reported. A six-day-a-week rubbish disposal facility is to be opened in Lawford.

Highways and footpaths The Council considered but could not support Tendring District Councils proposal that a section of footpath 25 . (Hall Road to Blue Gate Farm) should be diverted. This diversion was not considered to be in the public interest. Residents are reminded that blocks placed on roadside verges adjacent to their properties can be hazardous to both motorists and walkers. As such these blocks may be removed by the County Highways authority.

PLANNING The Council considered and recorded no objections to the following planning applications: "Camelot", Ardleigh Road, Great Bromley: proposed conservatory.

"The Caravan", Carrington Road, Great Bromley: continued stationing of caravan for residential purposes together with sewage treatment plant, ancillary building and additional curtilage.

2 Holly Dene Cottages, Briar Road, Great Bromley: proposed extension and alterations. 2 Meadow Close, Great Bromley: proposed two-storey side extension.

Barn adjacent to Portlands, Harwich Road Great. Bromley: continuing siting of mobile home for a maximum of one further year.

The Council considered but, in the absence of sufficient information, was unable to come to a View on the following planning application: Barn adjacent to Portlands, Harwich Road, Great Bromley: addition to barn and cart lodge (variation to previous planning permission). Tendring District Council has approved the continuing use of Seven Rivers Bungalow without

complying with a condition restricting occupation to staff. **Tendring District Council** informs ' residents of proposed development in their neighbourhood. Residents are asked to let the Clerk have a note of any objections or comments they may have on these proposals. Residents' views do help the Council in deciding its recommendations on planning applications.

KITCHEN CORNER Herefordshire Apple Cake

150g/6 oz raisins 100g/4 oz sultanas 50g/2 oz cut mixed peel 2 tablsp medium cider 225g/8 oz plain flour $\frac{1}{2}$ teaps bicarb of soda ¹/₂ teasp (level) ground cinnamon 1 teasp (level) mixed spice ¹/₄ teasp (level) ground allspice 100g/4 oz butter or marg 150g/6 oz caster sugar 2 large eggs 225g/8 oz cooking apples, peeled and cored

Grease and line 20 cm/8" round cake tin Soak raisins, sultanas and peel in cider for 1 hour or so. Sift flour with spices and bicarb of soda. Cream the fat with sugar till light and fluffy. Beat in eggs one at a time alternately with a spoonful of flour, then fold in rest of flour.

Coarsely grate apples and fold in together with soaked fruit, ginger and lemon rind. Turn into prepared tin and level top. Sprinkle with crushed sugar.

Bake moderate oven 170C/325F/Mark 3, 160C for fan ovens, for 1¼ hours or till skewer comes out clean. Leave to cool 10 mins then tum on to wire rack and leave till cold. Wrap in foil, or put in airtight tin or container 48 hours before cutting.

Their founder was Leonard Cheshire, a Group Captain in the Royal Air Force in the 1939-45 War, during which he won the Victoria Cross. He joined together with some fellow officers after hearing of a friend, Arthur Dykes, who was very ill in hospital and needed somewhere to live and be cared for. They moved him into Lee Court, Hampshire and things developed from there. The Leonard Cheshire Home inspired other people to set up similar places around the country and, of course, Great Bromley has the Seven Rivers Home. In the UK nowadays, 19,000 disabled people are supported and encouraged to be able to live more independent lives. Some choose to live in the Leonard Cheshire Home, whilst others prefer to be in their own homes using their Care at Home services for the support they need. The Leonard Cheshire Charity helps to support projects in 55 countries around the world. Such as helping disabled people in the Third World to work but still providing necessary support facilities. Gill said that policy changes are gradually happening. Residents are encouraged to help and to become involved with the running of the home. Seven Rivers has 28 residents at the moment and do not admit anyone over the age of 55 years old. Fund raising methods are also changing. The Summer Fete has become much too expensive to organise, especially the insurance cover needed. They hope to run smaller events such as evening entertainment. The Cheshire Home logo, or badge, which as you probably know is a red leather, means "Prosperity and Peace" in Singapore. This month our speaker is Mr Derek Ladkin and his subject is "The Antarctic". Dear Parishioner, March 5th is Ash Wednesday which for Christians is a special day of prayer for repentance - saying sorry for wrongs acknowledged to have been done in the past - and reconciliation - making one again with God, neighbour and self. It is also the first day of Lent which is the season for increasing the awareness of God, neighbour and self. This year my preparations for this holy season are being overshadowed by the events of the world stage. The Bishops of the Church of England have issued their own response to the situation: "We continue to hold that a conclusive case has yet to be made in favour of military action against Iraq. We do not believe the evidence presented to date suggests a Clear link exists between Iraq and Al Qaeda or that Iraq poses an immediate threat to international security. Without compelling new evidence to the contrary, we contend that military action could not be morally justified. We call on Iraq to present credible evidence to support its claim that it does not possess Weapons of Mass Destruction. We believe that it is vital that proper focus and attention is given in any event to ensuring that the basic humanitarian needs of the Iraqi people are met and that a clear path is constructed for the swift and effective return of Iraq and its people who have long suffered under the regime of Saddam Hussein to a rightful place in the community of nations." Traditionally Christians give any money saved through having gone without something, a meal or luxury, to a charity. This year we shall be sending our offerings to S John's hospital in Jerusalem. There they specialise in eye treatment and welcome anyone asking only for payment according to the patient's circumstances. In the present troubles they are having to deal with all sorts of injuries as most other hospitals only treat people with health insurance, which is beyond the wildest dreams of a lot of people. For me this will go some way to help ease the feeling of helplessness. If you feel you'd like to make a positive sign that the West does care for peoples of the East, regardless of faith held, please take a box from Church, returning it for Good Friday. May God bless you and give us His peace. Fr Nicolas.

WHERE ARE WE HEADING?

I am writing this as war breaks out in Iraq. Already there have been casualties. What a shame diplomacy broke down and we are reduced to this. I feel helplessness, coupled with resignation, and acceptance of the situation we have been led into by our government. I have in the past experienced the same of lack of control that one has over one's destiny. Years ago when the children were very young a car came off the road on the spot where they had been playing only five minutes earlier: the IRA blew up the pub in Bishopsgate where my husband had been just the day before: my son, when in Northern Ireland with his girlfriend, decided at the last minute not to go into Omagh the afternoon that town was hit by the bomb. The latest fear from aeroplanes is not terrorists or hijacks but an invisible flu-like virus that is being carried here from the Far East. Life is full of near misses and we cannot just stop living our normal lives for fear of what might happen.

The same with this war. I fear how it is going to change the world and that it may not be for the better. I also feel annoyed with myself as I can't seem to positively make up my mind whether I am for or against such a war. Originally the talk was to find and convict international terrorists with which I agree, though what this by itself would achieve is hard to see as attempts in Northern Ireland have shown. Then suddenly everything shifted against Iraq. Saddam Hussein has long been a problem which no-one seemed too bothered to sort out, regarding him as contained, so why suddenly now? Why not apply the same effort to the much older and equally pressing problem of the conflict between Palestine and Israel from which it could be said most of the problems in the Middle East stem. What about North Korea or the Pakistani-Indian dispute and their atomic abilities. I am not persuaded by American diplomacy or could one say lack of it. I feel they are trying to walk roughshod over us and the rest of the entire world using their money and strength as levers. Equally I do not like France's inflexible approach and feel that they have their own agenda in seeking to reassert themselves on the world stage.

Why then is Blair risking everything for, to me, no apparent reason. Is there something that we do not know about which he does and for that reason he is placing his country at risk for the greater good. 1 am just so confused. I no longer know what to think. Perhaps it is as well that something is happening so that we can now all move on to pray for as few casualties as possible on all sides and support our troops in what they have been ordered to do. We should also pray that the powers involved make a better job of sorting out the mess resulting from this conflict if it is not to be futile. *Leonie Henderson*

GARDENER'S CORNER FOR APRIL

LAWNS: Now is a good time to sow seed for new lawns or to repair bare patches RHODODENDRONS: remove faded flowers - mulch with peat or garden compost. Keep lime well away from them. DAHLIAS: Plant tubers. Take cuttings of tubers started into growth in March. CARNATIONS & PINKS: Feed border plants with a general fertilizer. ANNUALS: Sow hardy and half-hardy annuals BULBS: Plant GLADIOLA this month - keep deadheading bedding daffodils and narcissus. HOUSE PLANTS: Increase watering and give regular feeds. Pot on plants that are root bound. *Frank Griffiths*

DID SHE KEEP AN EYE ON YOU?

As the last Headmaster at Little Bromley School it was interesting to find details of a former Headmistress there, especially as her family, like mine, originated in Boxted, Essex in the mid-15008. Daisy Lavinia, one of William Robert and Anne Maria Johnson's large family was born at Stanway on 14th March, 1886 and baptised on 24th April at Stanway St Allbright's church. Children always noticed something special about Daisy and they remembered it too. She had a glass eye. It was her brother, Claude Johnson, who accidentally poked her in the eye and blinded her. She did not marry but spent her life teaching. In the 1930s and for ten years she was the Headmistress of Little Bromley Council School, as it was then known, but moved on to become Headmistress at Kirby County Primary School. She retired after twelve years at Kirby because of ill heath. Daisy died in 1971, two years after Little Bromley Primary School closed. She was eighty five. Daisy's eldest sister, Agnes Maude, born 10th April, 1880, also became a teacher at Aldham School. She was a Red Cross Nurse in WWI. *John Appleby*

KITCHEN CORNER

A non-meat dish for the season of Lent.

VEGETABLE BIRYANI serves 4 people . Preparation 10 minutes Cooking time 40-50 minutes 1 large red onion cut into wedges; 1 courgette sliced thickly; 1 red pepper de-seeded and cut into 6, 1 sliced carrot, 1 aubergine thickly sliced; 2 tblsp olive oil, 2 tblsp mild curry paste, 125g (4oz) basmati rice; $\frac{1}{2}$ - $\frac{3}{4}$ pt hot vegetable stock; 2 tblsp chopped fresh coriander (if available) salt and pepper

Heat oven to 190C/375F. Toss vegetables in oil, season and spread into roasting tin. Cook 20 minutes till starting to turn golden. Stir in curry paste, rice and stock. Cook in oven 20-30 minutes till liquid absorbed and rice tender. Stir in coriander and serve immediately. *Jill Frostick*

WOMEN'S INSTITUTE

We had a very interesting talk about the Antarctic given by Derek Ladkin at our March meeting. His son, Russell, has spent 12 years as a scientist working in the lowest temperatures, -59C on average during the winter. Staff and stores annually voyage the 9,500 miles by sea and calling in at South Georgia Island to visit the explorer Ernest Shackleton's grave on the way, eventually arriving at their destination at the base of an ice shelf. The base Commander has been sworn in to act as a Magistrate and Head Postmaster. There is always a doctor on hand and everyone takes a sheepskin to sleep in. The scientists camp consists of tubular buildings built on the ice some 8-10 years ago, which are now covered by 20 feet of slowly moving ice and has to be constantly monitored. Deep crevasses appear in the ice and the scientists are trained to descend into them in case of accidents i.e. personal or equipment falling in.

Ice cores and other various samples are taken and brought back to Cambridge to be studied. Solar powered weather stations in remote areas have to be recorded and maintained. Ozone levels are monitored and the ozone hole is measured. Derek showed us some beautiful slides of the area and the other inhabitants, such as a colony of about 10,000 Emperor penguins and some seals. He also told us how his son was awarded the Sir Vivian Fuchs Antarctic medal for his work out there.

Report of Great Bromley Parish Council meetings held on 20 February and 13 March, 2003 PLANNING The Parish Council considered and recorded no objections to the following planning application: 4 Hall Cottages, Hall Road: rear extension

Tendring District Council has approved the following planning applications:

- 1. 4 Peace Cottages, Badley Hall Road: two-storey side extension and tree pruning.
- 2. 6 St Georges Close: rear extension and re-siting of garden chalet.
- 3. The Old Courthouse Inn, Harwich Road: lounge extension.
- 4. 2 Holly Dene Cottages, Briar Road: extension and alterations.

5. 2 Meadow Close, Great Bromley: two-storey side extension.

Tendring District Council has refused the following planning application: 1 Barn adjacent to Portlands, Harwich Road: continuing siting of mobile home and addition to barn and cart lodge (variation to previous planning permission).

Environment Tendring District Council has published new schedules for cleaning roads, verges and footways. Rural roads and lanes will be cleaned every 12 weeks (Tuesday 15 April, 8 July, 30 September 2003). Roads with housing will be cleaned every four weeks (Wednesday 16 April, 14 May, 11 June etc 2003). Please let the Parish Council know if your road has not been cleaned on these dates.

Recycling A reminder to all households that as from 2 April Onyx will be collecting recyclable materials from your door step on alternate Wednesdays. Please leave out tins, cans, plastic bottles and paper in carrier bags or cardboard boxes, (not black bin bags). Glass will not be collected but can be deposited in the recycling bins at Church Meadow.

The Council has installed a dog waste bin at the end of Back Lane (East). A larger litter bin will be installed at Church Meadow. The Council has agreed 2003/4 hedge and grass-cutting contracts for the following parish land: Church Meadow, Cemetery, Hare Green recreation ground and Brook Street-Saint George's Close. With the support of District Councils "Tendring in Bloom" scheme there will be 10 flower tubs on display during the summer months. The Council has planted nine trees on the land it maintains adjacent-to Brook Street/St George's Close.

Community activities The Council has agreed that the Hare Green recreation ground can be used occasionally by local voluntary groups for fund-raising car boot sales.

Road safety The Council has asked the County to introduce a 30 or 40 mph speed limit on the Frating Road between Balls Green and the Harwich Road intersection. Waiting restrictions are being introduced on Brook Street and at the entrance to St Georges Close. Alternative car parking for parents of school children is available at Church Meadow where the Parish Council is working with the School and Essex County Council to improve the surface.

Council donations The Council has made contributions totalling £1,364 to the following community organisations during 2002/3: Bromley Messenger, Hamilton Lodge, Bromleys PCC: (for St George's Church grass cutting), Tendring District Council's Coastal Fun 2003, Tendring Citizens Advice Bureau, St George's Primary School and the Royal British Legion.



NEIGHBOURHOOD WATCH

Since I last wrote, Gt Bromley has suffered a number of crimes. We have recently suffered a spate of garage and shed breaks in the Frating Road area. It is thought those responsible moved on to the Ardleigh area where a male was disturbed. One person has been arrested and enquiries are continuing in this matter. A pedal cycle has been stolen from Meadow Close and a motor vehicle has also been stolen from Mary Lane South. A strange occurrence has been the theft of rabbit traps from a field off Brundells Road. These are humane traps, used because the vast numbers of rabbits are destroying crops. It is possibly somebody who is unhappy that the rabbits are being trapped. However, it is perfectly legal and the removal of the traps is theft. If anybody has any information regarding the above offences, please let me know. Recently we have had a few reports of nuisance youths in the Home Green area. This includes debris being thrown from the bridge on to the A120 on the B1029, stones being thrown at houses and youths running across peoples gardens. This is unacceptable behaviour and can be extremely dangerous. Lt Bromley has not suffered any crime of note.

The following letter has been received from Mr G C Hubert of Grove Farm, Elmstead Market which is a salutary reminder to us all to keep our dogs under control at all times and particularly at this time of year with the lambing season.

DOGS SHOT FOR SAVAGING SHEEP

Most regrettably on 25th February we found it necessary to shoot - ONE FATALLY - two dogs for savaging our sheep. The police were called, as was the vet, to attend to the sheep. We found it most distressing to see our sheep with wool, skin and flesh torn from them. One sheep died two days later from stress and two aborted their lambs, both with twins. I am sure this was equally as distressing for the dogs' owners, particularly their children to have to collect their dead dog. The surviving dog required veterinary attention and may still lose an eye. Obviously the whole episode will result in overall expense to the dog owners of several hundreds of pounds. May I strongly appeal to all dog owners to keep their dog under control particularly when walking the footpaths in the countryside. As well as you feel you know your dog & dog is a safe dog, regardless of breed and will quickly revert to its hunt and kill instincts when not controlled. We would hate a repeat of this episode but would of course have course to respond similarly should our stock, including game and wildlife, be threatened. We try and keep the footpaths open and marked, as do most landowners, and enjoy and encourage people to use them properly.

MALAWI

I know Great Bromley has supported Dominic who has been teaching in Lilongwe, so I thought I'd add a line giving a different aspect from the viewpoint of a visitor. I stayed with my niece/goddaughter and her 4 children for 3 weeks in March. She has lived there for 10 years having married a Dutch paediatric surgeon. His parents, also doctors were and one still is. heavily involved in the Queen Elizabeth Hospital, Blantyre.

First I was struck by the totally different outlook. All the internationals and professionals I met who were working there, some of whom were Malawian, mostly funded by donor aid, had a much broader caring view of life than we meet here. Their problems are AIDS, cerebral malaria, malnourishment, corruption and ill conceived or inappropriate aid. PLUS FREQUENT power failures.

At crossroads one is faced with huge notices from the President stating "AIDS is killing Malawi. Change your behaviour" (They tell me he doesn't!) But tribal conditions still maintain, also ignorance and suspicion has to be overcome before this will happen. It is one of the most highly infected countries in the world and at the International school concert I went to, the 6th formers were singing a song insisting we all use condoms! Yes, I saw people dying of AIDS in the hospital being cared for mainly by their family members. Nurses are few and far between most having been seduced to work for the NHS. At one hospital I visited there were brand new mosquito nets for the children's ward, never used; the mothers who slept under the beds didn't like being shut in! Large industrial washing machines given from the aid programme lie ill-used, broken and no one to repair them.

I had the opportunity to accompany a mission up country to deliver supplies to 80 or so Grannies, selected by the three chiefs as being the most in need of those who were caring for extended families of AIDS orphans. Nearly all the Malawian workers I met had this added responsibility. A sack of maize, a bar of soap, a T shirt and a knitted woolly blanket seemed heaven sent. They all stood up and danced as a thank you for us "do-gooders" and the blind

children, being educated separately where we were delivering a Braille machine (which I might say didn't work when tried - such is the "aid" sometimes!) gave us a song.

The country is beautiful. dominated by the great lake 365 miles long, and surrounded by mountains. The international school in Blantyre teaches the UK school curriculum despite the wide range of races, 70% Malawian with, it would appear, no racial prejudice. Playtime is lake pursuits: swimming, sailing, fishing avoiding the croc, and climbing the great Mulange mountain.

Two young men, also gap year boys whom I suspect were there under the same organisation as Dominic, working in Limbe, dropped in one weekend, greatly appreciating the music, food and swimming in this very happy home. One Malawian boy I met had graduated barefoot from his village school, and had now got a scholarship to Cambridge. So it can happen.

There is every possible variety of church there, all faithfully used, in the villages, built from reed and mud to the wealthy mosques. Having arrived with a heavy case of books, I off-loaded and returned laden with local crafts and with only the clothes I stood up in, as I left the rest behind for the "boys" and their extended families. Any support you can offer will be welcomed I know. *Jean Harding*

Report of Great Bromley Parish Council meeting held on 17 April 2003

PLANNING Tendring District Council has approved the following planning applications: 1. "The Caravan" Carrington Road: continuing approval subject to conditions, of caravan, ancillary building and additional cartilage.

2. "Camelot", Ardleigh Road: conservatory.

3. 4 Hall Cottages, Hall Road: rear extension.

4. 2 Meadow Close: two-storey side extension.

Local Election -Thursday 1 May

A reminder to vote for your nine parish councillors and two district councillors on 1st May. The Village Hall polling station will be open from 8.00 am to 9.00 pm. Those elected will have an important task in representing your interests.

RURAL HOUSING TRUST Following the recent considerable interest in a tenancy at Lakewood the Council was briefed by Trust officials on the possibility of a further scheme. Although there appeared to be demand for affordable housing in the parish a detailed assessment would need to be undertaken. The Council will have further discussions with the Trust and consult with the community.

RECYCLING A reminder that recyclable materials will be collected on Wednesday 14 and Thursday 29 May. The Church Meadow recycling site raised £65 for parish funds during the period October to December 2002.

SPEEDING In spite of the introduction of new speed limits the Council is concerned at the incidence of excessive speeding on the parish's roads. The police will be checks and the Council is consulting with increasing the number of speed the County's Highways Department as to what other measures can be introduced to deter speeding.

'PARTICIPATION' ALLOWANCES The Government is introducing optional attendance allowances for parish councillors. The Council agreed that its councillors should continue to carry out their responsibilities on a voluntary basis. Attendance allowances, which would have been a charge to council tax payers, will therefore not be paid to Great Bromley parish councillors. KB

The mobile phone I discovered is a must under these circumstances as various family members kept in touch with each other to say where they were sited and when she was last seen. She wasn't "alone" long on any part of the route. We gave up at Blackfriars and did not try to join the melee to get to the finish - we would

probably have been too late if we had, so we found a cup of tea and with great relief sat down before wending a weary way home along with others some of whom had already completed their run and had their medals proudly round their necks.

Sister finished in 4 hours 56 minutes and 46 seconds under her 5 hour goal. Well done to everyone who ran. Having watched you all day I now fully understand what a lot of guts it takes. *Leonie Henderson*

ARDLEIGH WEA

'Tutor for the Spring Course will be Mr Denis Hance on "English Cathedrals". Thus we were told of the subject matter for the ten weeks beginning in January. If I can quote from the leaflet handed out to all attending students "Cathedrals are great tourist attractions. In them can be seen fine architecture, sculptures, glass and woodwork". We were also told we would trace their development from the very early stages up to the present day. Well, we didn't quite dig out the foundations, but as good as. We started at the beginning - Anglo Saxon times (yes, there were cathedrals then), and then throughout the ages. "By your arches ye shall be known!" The Normans had the Roman arch (i.e. a rounded arch) whereas the Early English went for the pointed variety. Each age had its own speciality for roofs, windows, arches, floor tiles, furniture and fittings. Different ages found different ways of holding up the roof. We were shown the different designs . and methods of designing the shapes that were used in the arches and the columns. The different monuments, the stained glass. You name it we. saw it. All this with the help of a very extensive and excellent series of slides. A very good field trip to Norwich and Ely cathedrals was a fitting climax with even the weather turning up trumps. Yes, we could see why cathedrals are so attractive, and we could appreciate the work of the master craftsmen and ordinary workmen who built them, and not least the people who found the money to pay for them - just as important. in days of old as today. The marvellous thing is that so many are still standing, and in use, after hundreds of years in some cases. Yes, there are some modern ones too. They don't look quite the same, but then things do change over the years don't they? I hope so, and I hope there will be the equal of Dennis Hance to teach them all about it. Thank you Dennis for a very instructive and interesting ten weeks.

WOMEN'S INSTITUTE

From the deep frozen Antarctica at our March meeting we moved to the warmth of the Mediterranean with Mr Brian Hogg, our speaker, for April. Mr Hogg started by telling us he had attended a course on the Art and Architecture along the Northern edge of the Mediterranean and what a vast subject it is, stretching from Turkey to the South of France. In Turkey, a fine example of the use of marble and coloured tiles is the famous Blue Mosque, a Christian church that was converted into a Mosque with wonderful mosaic pictures. Greece has famous temples, the Parthenon and Acropolis for instance, with marvellous marble columns, each cut to size and a wooden dowel inserted to absorb shocks from earth movement. These temples were for "Mythical Gods". The marble had to be transported six miles on a horse drawn cart. The Greek Islands are famous for Blue Domes, a colour which was thought to be nearer to heaven and also beautiful icons carved in Yew wood and covered with gold leaf. Also, round pots were works of art, coming in all sizes from 2 foot to 6 foot high decorated with three dimensional figures in black, brown and sienna.

Rome has many famous buildings. The Forum has very high columns filled with concrete - the Romans had discovered how to make concrete by this time. St Peters has famous paintings on ceilings and sculptures by Michelangelo. The Partheon has the largest dome in the World and is the oldest building at 2000 years old built by the Romans.

In Florence there is the 18 foot sculpture of David carved from a single piece of marble. Other famous works of art include the Leaning Tower of Pisa. built 1000 years ago, 680 high with an 85 tilt. The Cathedrals exterior is faced with white, green and red marble and has a wonderful fresco of "The Last Judgement".

In Venice many of the Palaces are now art galleries. St Marks in St Marks Square, is a very beautiful building rich with paintings and mosaics with statues of horses on the front. The architecture of Southern France is very similar to Greece and Italy.

GARDENERs CORNER FOR MAY

LAW NS: Cutting should be in full swing now with the blades lowered. Feed poorly growing grass with a sulphate of ammonia - 1/2 oz per square yard. ANNUALS Plant out half hard annuals after risk of frost has passed. Sow seeds of biennials - Canterbury bells, foxgloves, Sweet William and wallflowers. PRIMROSES & PRIMULAS: Why not grow your own - after flowering leave seeds

on to ripen then plant in a seed tray. Sprinkle seeds on the surface of moist compost and cover with a sheet of newspaper then a piece of glass. Keep away from the hot sun. Pot up young seedlings as soon as they are big enough to handle, i.e. when they have their two true leaves. *Frank Griffiths*

KITCHEN CORNER

May is the month when all the herbs begin to grow again strongly, so there are plenty to flavour our dishes. Here are some ideas for herb butters which you might like to try.

CLASSIC GARLIC BUTTER

2 large new season garlic cloves, peeled

1 small shallot, finely chopped

A handful of green fresh parsley

225g/8oz unsalted butter at room temperature

Mash garlic to a paste, beat into the butter with parsley and shallot. When fluffy, place on to a square of kitchen foil and roll up to seal. Put in fridge or freezer till solid. Cut off slices as needed.

1) Use on grilled meat or poultry 2)Mix with breadcrumbs to top mussels etc. before grilling.

SPICED BUTTER

100g/4oz unsalted butter (room temp) 3 small spring onions, white part only, chopped 2 plump cloves garlic, peeled and chopped 1 tablsp cumin seed 1 teasp coriander seed 1/2 teasp chilli powder Small handful chopped parsley Salt

Mash butter and stir in onion and garlic. Toast seeds in dry pan until fragrant. Add chilli powder and warm a few seconds then grind all to a fine powder. Stir into the butter with chopped parsley and a little salt. Use with meat, fish or vegetables.

PARSLEY BUTTER

100g/4oz softened butter 5 tablsp fine chopped parsley Juice of 1 lemon Salt & fresh ground black pepper Cream butter with a fork and fold in other ingredients. Use for fish, lamb chops etc. This recipe can be used with tarragon, chives, coriander, dill, basil or pink peppercorns. *Jill Frostick*

UNITED PARISHES OF ARDLEIGH AND THE BROMLEYS

Dear Parishioner,

Like most people who live in Limete, an area in the centre of Kinshasa, capital of the Democratic Republic of Congo, Therese Atatu has not had an easy life. Now 63, Therese has brought up 14 children, all of whom were born in military camps when her late husband was a serving soldier. Yet although she has reached an age where most of us would be looking forward to taking things more gently, Therese has turned her energies to bringing up an even greater number of grandchildren. Among Therese's extended family is her daughter-in-law Josephine, who came to live with her after her husband died of AIDS five years ago. Josephine is herself HIV-positive as is her son Junior, who is 16 but looks about half that age. Although Josephine also comes from a different tribe, Therese refused to follow the usual custom of rejecting her son's widow. On the contrary, Therese decided she would take in all her grandchildren who have lost one or both parents to AIDS. She reckons that she has brought up, or is bringing up, a total of 18 grandchildren! Besides that, she is involved in her local church, taking part in their work of distributing food to the poorest people in the capital. Josephine receives support from one of Christian Aid's partners in Kinshasa, Fondation Femme Plus, who offer help with health care, psychological counselling and income generation to women who are HIV-positive. They also organise seminars for people like Therese who are caring for family members living with HIV/AIDS. Therese's grandchildren know that their grandmother is a very special person. Eleven year old Gloria explained: "When we're naughty she scolds us but she never smacks us. She tells us we won't have anything to eat as a punishment but she soon calls us to come and

eat after all. We love her very much". Seven-year-old Dorcas said simply, "I love her, she cuddles me". When Therese was asked what motivated her to devote herself so unstintingly to caring for her family she replied: "It's the love that I carry inside me. I can't abandon the grandchildren or my daughters-in-law - where would they go? It's much better to have them with me. Since I was young, giving is all I've known how to do. My Christian faith helps me to live and builds feelings of love within me. "

This year Christian Aid Week is focusing on ordinary people like Therese who are changing the lives of people around them, some of them from the UK, all others from overseas. Please use the envelope in this magazine; be generous, drop it into Church or the Post office, or simply pass it to someone you know goes to Chapel, Church or Mass. Thank you. DID YOU VOTE?


The right to vote is a precious thing. In this country the universal right to vote did not arrive as quickly as some would have wished and many used all sorts of means in order to gain this right. Some have even died to this end. Even now in parts of the world there are those who would give their all, including risking their lives, for the chance to vote. For them the right to vote is an emotive thing.

Over the past years it has been reported after each election, both general and local alike, that numbers of people voting are down. This year was no exception when it came to the local elections although apparently where there is now a postal vote numbers were up slightly. One of the main problems must be that we are being asked to vote for people who we frequently know nothing about nor how they stand on matters that concern us even if we know who they are. Presumably the view at national elections is that we are voting for one party or the other, or is it now their leader, and the idea of electing a candidate to put forward the views of his or her electorate is a fiction. Not a new problem; just listen to the words of Private Willis in the opening of Act II of Iolanthe in 1882: "When in that House MP's divide, If they've a brain and cerebellum, too, they've got to leave that brain outside, and vote just as their leaders tell 'em to" This year I hardly knew that there were to be elections, such was the silence, until the polling cards arrived. Even at that point it was a total mystery as to who the candidates were until a few days before 1st May a leaflet from one party was pushed through the door. Whilst I am sure that their candidates are both very able people with our best interests at heart. I have neither seen nor heard them. The other party who I later learned had put up two candidates retained their mystery by doing nothing at all to gain our vote (at least down our road). I think it is folly for candidates in local elections simply to rely on the coat tails of their national party leaders. They should ensure that everyone knows that they are standing for election, who they are and what they stand for as individuals if the general disdain for local elections is to be reversed. On the other hand it may suit them simply to seek election relying upon the support of the party faithful. No wonder independent candidates are successful where there is a clearly defined and important local issue on which they stand.

Fortunately party politics do not play a part in the election of parish councillors and long may

this be so. They present the interests of the parish on numerous matters to the District Council with appreciable influence. We should be very grateful to them for all the time they give up voluntarily and for the hard work they put in for us all with probably few thanks.

However I would like to know before I enter the Village Hall to vote just who is standing for election. I like to think about it. I do not want to be surprised as to who is or is not on the list before me. I want to vote for who I feel will do their best for us. This year Great Bromley had more candidates than places which is excellent news as it shows that people are wishing to take an active part in community affairs. If you do not vote you should not moan about the results. However it is difficult to be enthusiastic about visiting the polling station if you do not know whose names you will find on the list before you arrive. Leonie Henderson

GARDENER'S CORNER FOR JUNE

SHRUBS: Take leaf bud cuttings of clematis and softwood cuttings of fuschia and cotoneaster early in the month. ROSES: Disbud Hybrid tea roses if large blooms are wanted. CHRYSANTHEMUMS: Complete the stopping of outdoor flowering plants. LILIES: In humid weather spray with Bordeaux mixture to prevent lily disease. IRISES: Tall bearded irises may need supporting. After flowering cut back stems. At this time of the year with weeds and grass growing like mad, don't worry too much about it - always remember where weeds and grass won't grow, nothing will grow! *Frank Griffiths*

KITCHEN CORNER

BREAST OF LAMB cooked in the daube style to serve 8 people

This recipe needs a long slow cook, so is ideal for entertaining, as can be prepared well in advance.

1 bottle good red wine
2 x 200g tins chopped tomatoes
olive oil
6 cloves garlic
2 x 1.5kg breast of lamb on the bone
-

Put bacon in large heavy-bottomed casserole. Heat gently till fat runs. Add vegetables and 1/2 tbsp olive oil. Squash in the lamb and tuck herbs under. Season well.

In separate pan bring the wine to the boil and set alight. When flames die down, pour over the meat. Add the tomatoes, pushing them into wine. Cover pan with a sheet of grease-proof paper and the lid. Cook at 300F for 3 hours. Skim off as much fat as possible and serve with mashed potato. *Jill Frostick*

NEIGHBOURHOOD WATCH

The following is a police bulletin currently being circulated on the internet. PC 1061 Chris Phillips has checked it with the Crime Reduction Officer at Clacton police station who advises that these articles are still current. The only part he might dispute is the figure given for percentage of women burgled. However the bulletin is still well worth noting.

"We have been informed of the following scam which is targeting females in particular. They receive a phone call from the Post Office asking them to confirm their postcode. When this is given, they are told that they have become eligible for some gift vouchers for their co-operation and are asked to provide their home address and postcode in order to receive the vouchers. So far 90% of the women who have provided this information have been burgled, as it is assumed that their homes are empty during office working hours. The police are aware of this scam and the Post Office have confirmed that they are NOT conducting any postcode surveys. Also, it has been reported that if you receive a telephone call from an individual who identities him/herself as being a BT Service Technician who is conducting a test on that line, or if anyone else asks you to do the following DON'T. They will state that to complete the test the recipient should dial nine, zero (90) then the hash key and then hang up. This will give them full access to your phone line, which allows them to place long distance, international or chat-line calls. These are then billed to your account. The information which the Police have suggests that many of these calls are emanating from prisons. The information has been checked out by the police and is correct. DO NOT PRESS 90 FOR ANYONE.

THE ANNUAL PARISH ASSEMBLY was held on 15th May, 2003.

The Chairman reported that the full parish council had met on 13 occasions during the year plus an annual parish assembly. There had been 7 joint planning meetings with Ardleigh parish council as well as a training session on planning. The Council considered 28 planning applications, compared with 43 in 20001/2. Council considered and responded to a number of strategic consultations. such as the upgrading of the A120 and the proposed Bathside development in Harwich with Councillors also representing the parish's interests at a number of external meetings.

He reported that the Council has taken steps to improve the village's general appearance. The parish has assumed responsibility for maintaining the highway land at Brook Street and 9 trees planted. A litter bin and dog bin were installed at Church Meadow and Back Lane respectively. Flower tubs were placed at 10 locations during the summer. However, in spite of representations to the District Council, roadside litter and fly-tipping continued to be a problem. The parish council continues to maintain Church Meadow. the cemetery and the Hare Green recreation field. To ensure that the recreation field is useable throughout the year drains were installed at a cost of £5,000.

With increasing traffic the Council was concerned with road safety. There has been an extension of the 40 mph limit on the Harwich/Frating Roads. Parking at Church Meadow has been improved with the installation of drains and additional hard surfacing. Further parking restrictions are to be introduced near the school. In spite of representations the noise from the A120 and slip roads continued to be unacceptable. The Council works with the County's

highways department to ensure that footpaths are maintained and, together with roadside verges. kept clear of obstructions.

The Vice-Chairman and councillors were thanked for their commitment and hard work on behalf of the parish during the past 12 months. The Clerks were also thanked for their efficient support of the Council, in particular Mrs Sandra Shute who resigned in 2002 alter long service. Thanks also to Mrs Nicky Robinson who assisted on a temporary basis prior to the current Clerk's appointment in November 2002.

The Chairman thanked the County and District Councillors for continuing to represent the parish's interests and for keeping the Council informed of external developments.

Report by the District Councillor The Tendring District Council constituency has been extended to include the parishes of Elmstead, Frating, Great Bromley and Thorrington and will in future be represented by two councillors. Mr Jessop will continue to represent the interests of both individual constituents and the parish as a whole.

Report on the Hare Green recreation ground The representative councillor, Mr Phillips, reported that the recreation ground continued to be in good condition particularly following the installation of drains. The grass and hedges are cut regularly. The annual ROSPA inspection report was satisfactory although some minor repairs were carried out on the play equipment. Some small trees have been replaced. The Council has established a committee to oversee the purchase of new recreation equipment for young people. £500 currently in the recreation field account. would be used for this and grant aid was being sought.

Report on the Village Hall Mr Fairley presented a report on behalf of the representative councillor Col Frostick who was unavoidably absent. 2002/3 was another successful year for the hall with a healthy financial position. The hall is used by a wide range of organisations from both within and outside the village. Improvements to the hall were undertaken during the year and would continue in 2003/4. These included essential electrical work and resurfacing of the car parks. The parish council's support for this work was gratefully acknowledged.

Report on the Poorlands Charitable Trust The Trust's chairman, Mr Wild. reported that in January 2003 Poorlands distributed grants totalling £170 to nine elderly and needy parishioners. The trust presently had investments valued at about £4000. The parish council is responsible for appointing trustees and two were approved at its recent annual general meeting.

Report on Parish Council accounts Mr Richardson reported that the Councils precept has been maintained at £12,500 supplemented by some income from the provision of services. There were some major items of expenditure during the year in particular drainage for the recreation field costing about £5,000. This expenditure had lead to reserves being reduced by £2,400 to about £11,500. Annual commitments included maintenance of the Council's properties and the village hall. £1,364 was shared among seven organisations which benefited the local community.

Report on policing matters Mr Philips reported that 38 crimes were reported in the parish during the year of which 12 were satisfactorily detected. The parish continued to have a low incidence of crime compared with similar local areas and detection rates (eg £50% for burglary) were relatively good. He highlighted the importance of all crimes being reported to the police. Speeding continued to be a concern and more radar checks would be carried out when safe to do so and resources allowed.

Report on footpaths Mr Sievewright confirmed that the parish's footpaths were well maintained with paths being reinstated by farmers alter planting. Residents should continue to report any difficulties to the parish councils footpath officer, Mr Sievewright.


Questions from the public It was reported that some of the parish notice boards were difficult to open and needed renovation. It was suggested that parish council notices should also be posted on the village hall notice board.

THANKS I would like to thank the Parish Council for their help in keeping their part of our council tax to a minimum. In the media we see articles about abuse and fiddles of allowances by councillors so it was good to read in the Messenger that Great Bromley Parish Council have voted to continue with the tradition of carrying out their responsibilities on a voluntary basis and continuing to bear the cost of their unpaid local government position. The Village Hall Management Committee met on Tuesday, 29th April in the Village Hall. The Secretary reported on the correspondence dealt with and the Treasurer spoke of the current financial position and gave an end of fiscal year report based on the accounts which had recently been examined by our independent auditor.

Waste disposal from the Hall was discussed, something we have to pay for by the bin load. The waste contractors seemed to have tightened their procedures recently, only willing to take material actually in the bin. NO ONE IS FORGOTTEN!

George Martin, a yeoman of Great Bromley, left a huge will dated January 1602. He was buried in Great Bromley. To the poor of both Little Bentley and Great Bromley he left 20 shillings apiece. To the poor of Wormingford and Little Bromley there was 10 shillings per parish. George had a married daughter, Alice Hoye. To his grandson, George Hoye, a minor, he gave land of eight acres in Reynes Hath, Little Bentley; it was leased to a Robert Clark. George also inherited his grandfather's house, lands called Newmans alias Harwoodes and Hodgkyns; a farm called Bussardes also Eastwoodes in Great Bromley; land and tenements called North Lands and Howlettes purchased from William Pyrton, esquire; free land in Great Bromley, once in the ownership of a Mr Cooper; and copyhold lands in Weeley. If George died before he was 21 then the ownership of all these passed to Edward Hoye and Elizabeth Hoye. Edward Hoye, his son-inlaw was to collect rents, etc., until George reached his majority and he was to see that George was educated and well fed.

(unnamed) Quarles' wife of Dedham was given a young cow (already in his possession) Elizabeth Bonner, his niece, received ten shillings, John Bonner, his nephew, had a cow. The following were each left ten shillings - Thomas Perry, William Fuller, whose bond was also forgiven, Christopen Fuller, plus a bullock, George Fuller. Lancelot Fuller had a bullock. Mary Martin's children, (unnamed) had 10 shillings. Michael Davy's children from Great Bentley were to receive five shillings when they reached eighteen years of age. Richard Mont, a servant, was recipient of a bullock and six shillings and eight pence (6s. 8d). Young Pyrton, Lord of the Manor of Little Bentley, etc.. had a cache of silver plate. In Great Bromley. to produce ongoing cash, John Upcher was to farm North Lands and Howlettes at the rent of £13 6s. 8d,, per year and entitled to have three loads of wood as fuel. The generous donor left forty six shillings and eight pence (46s. 8d.) to the church officers of Great Bromley to distribute to the poor of the village who attended his funeral. Every one of the servants who were living in his house at this death received six shillings and eight pence (6s. 8d). Charles Cardinal, Lord of the Manor of Great Bromley landed four pounds. Ralph King, the Rector of Little Bromley, maker and writer of the will netted forty shillings. The will was witnessed by Thomas Rolfe, David Stone, Ralph King and Alice Day. Many local people were remembered as can be seen and there is much more that can be added about their births, marriages and deaths. John Appleby

UNITED PARISHES OF ARDLEIGH AND THE BROMLEYS

Dear Parishioner, On June 14th the Churchwardens and myself will be sitting at the Lytch Gate again for a Parish Gift day. Last year the weather was good to us, and many of you were very generous too. One of the pleasant things about the day is people simply stopping to say hello, or introduce themselves. It's just as well that there are some good things about the venture because it is not my favourite way of spending a day, but unfortunately it is a necessary one. S. George's Church here in the Bromleys is a vibrant and growing one. In the past two years the members of the congregation have increased their regular giving by 17%. Sadly this is still not enough for us to cover the upkeep and running costs of the building, let alone carry out any improvements, or save for that rainy day. The Church Of England does not receive any funding from the state or government. Its members and generous friends fund it. Occasionally grants are received from the Heritage Lottery Fund (like for the roof), but this is because it is building architecturally important to the country, not because it's a Church. We try to raise money at events, like the flower festival and plant sale, and these go a long way to helping. We still need to appeal to you to make a donation to help us cover the bills and invest for the future. To give you an idea of some of our expenses this year the Parochial Church Council will have to spend: £944 on grass cutting in Great Bromley and £824 in Little Bromley

£2,184 on Insurance

 \pounds 1,003 on heating and lighting

 \pounds 13,677 on the contribution to central Church funds

£1,878 on costs of the priestly ministry.

Due to a lot of hard work by the Repair Committee and generosity through the years by many of you, we think we are almost there with the work to repair the roof. We have just received a quote to upgrade the sound system of $\pounds1,100$ to provide basic loo and meeting facilities circa 50,000:

ONE MAN'S WEED IS ANOTHER MAN'S FLOWER

At 4.15 am on 31st May I was up and wandering down the lane to get a better view of the sunrise on the horizon as my view is partially blocked by trees. I wanted to see the annular eclipse which won't occur again for another 80 odd years and well past my sell-by date! I was disappointed as although it was a beautiful bright, balmy morning there was too much cloud around to see the sun. However I was rewarded by the song of the birds filling the countryside around me with the most glorious sound as they chatted away to each other in the dawn hours. It reinforced my thinking of how lucky we are in Great Bromley to be able to have the bonus of the countryside with some good sized towns nearby and with no light pollution we can see the glory of the heavens by night. The lanes as I write are looking lovely with the wild flowers blooming all, along the verges where they have not been cut by the Council. I decided to look more closely and I list below the ones I easily found by the roadside. Wild flowers are a controversial subject - in the garden they are regarded as a weed, in the field as detrimental to the yield of a crop, by the road as a safety hazard but in a meadow as being beautiful. All but the most tenacious are disappearing due to agricultural methods and the desire by gardeners not to have a "weed" in sight. Wild flowers attract insects and therefore birds and other small mammals who feed from them. They are the modest, unshowy cousins of a lot of big blousy blooms so beloved these days and yet without them our countryside would be so much the poorer. But, except in nature reserves, we do not try to look after them. We remove them, we spray them, we cut them back in their prime before they can seed and then we bemoan their lack. I counted 55 varieties of wild flower around the verges in my part of Great Bromley. None of these was a "rare" species but even these are finding it hard to survive and none grow in abundance. I wonder how many will be left by the next annular eclipse? Common sorrel, Broad leaved dock, Fat Hen, Greater Stitchwort, Lesser Stitchwort, Red Campion, White Campion, Creeping buttercup, Field poppy, Hedge mustard, Shepherds Purse, Blackberry, Dog rose, Field rose, Broom, Gorse, Vetch, White clover, Herb Robert, Cut leaved crane's bill, Common mallow, White bryony, Rose bay willowherb, Cow parsley, Hogweed, Goosegrass, Bindweed, Green Alkanet, Red Deadnettle, White Deadnettle, Hedge Woundwort, Foxglove, Common Field Speedwell, Toadflax, Elder, Yarrow, Scentless mayweed, Pineapple. mayweed, Mugwort, Groundsel, Goatsbeard, Field sow thistle, Smooth sow thistle, Spiny milk thistle, Lesser Burdock, Dandelion, Hawkweed, Cat's ear, Bittersweet, Greater plantain, Ribwort plantain, Bracken, Wild sage, Stinging nettle and Common Figwort (one plant only). KITCHEN CORNER

LIGHT GINGERBREAD This is the favourite gingerbread recipe in our family. Not so sticky as the traditional type. You can slice and butter it if liked, especially for packed lunch boxes. 220g plain flour 2 teaSp baking powder 2 tbsp golden syrup 3 heaped teasp ground ginger 2 tbsp black treacle 1 teasp cinnamon 2 tbsp dark brown sugar 2 tblsp ground almonds 2 eggs, beaten 110g butter 1 teasp bicarbonate soda 90 ml warm milk

175 g chopped stem ginger in syrup 4 tablsp raisins Butter and line 20 cm loaf tin. Sieve flour, baking powder and

Butter and line 20 cm loaf tin. Sieve flour, baking powder and spices, stir in almonds. Melt butter, syrup, treacle, sugar in a pan then stir in flour etc. Mix well but gently. Remove from heat, stir in eggs. add ginger, raisins and bicarbonate of soda dissolved in milk. Pour into tin and bake 45-50 minutes at 180C/350F/Gas Mk 4. *Jill Frostick*

With regard to my foreword to the magazine last month I have pleasure in publishing clarification of the situation by Major James Heaney, Chairman of Great Bromley Parish Council.

May I have the opportunity to comment on your remarks, (in the June 2003 magazine), about the dearth of information about prospective councillors at our recent parish council elections? First, all candidates who stood for election were not obliged to inform the parish council beforehand. Of course, councillors knew which of their colleagues intended to stand, but only just before the closing date for nominations in one or two cases. Even if there had been time to put a notice in your magazine about the candidates, (and there was not), the parish council would not have been allowed to do so under the electoral rules. Candidates who might have wished to inform the electorate about their suitability for office would have had to do so under their own arrangements and at their own expense. With regard to the district and county elections the situation is different in that the political parties arrange the publicity for their candidates and meet their expenses. Independents, of course, have to fend for themselves. The Parish Clerk was given the names of all the candidates for election to the parish council by the Electoral Office at Tendring District Council the lists were posted on the notice-boards throughout the village three weeks before the election. BE SOMEONE WHO CARES

Essex County Council launched this year's foster carer recruitment campaign during Foster Care Fortnight (12-23 May 2003). The campaign "Be someone who cares" is aimed at dispelling myths about the types of people that can become foster carers. Many people who would make excellent foster carers sometimes don't come forward because they think they will be turned down. Fostering is not just for couples with children of their own. Single people, those without children and people whose children have grown up and left home are also needed. Carers can

be working full time or not working at all. There is no upper age limit to becoming a foster carer as long as you are in good health.

Phil Miller, a foster carer from Colchester, said "As a disabled person I initially thought it might be difficult for me to become a foster carer due to other people's attitudes. However, after calling the Essex Adoption and Fostering information line and talking through the issues with a Social worker, I realised it would not be the battle I had thought it might be. I expect that many disabled people will probably think they can't foster, but I am proof that they can. All they need to do is pick up the phone and call the freephone number. As far as I'm concerned, fostering is definitely one of the most rewarding things I have ever done.',

Essex County Council are looking for more carers in your area to be able to offer a local service to local children, to increase their chances of returning home and enabling them to maintain links with friends, family and school. Foster carers look after children of all ages from babies to teenagers. There is a particular need for carers who can look alter children aged 8 years and above, children who need long-term placements, children with disabilities, and for brothers and sisters who may need to stay together. Foster carers provide a variety of care ranging from a few days each month, to a few weeks or months and sometimes longer.

Essex County Council offers support and training to foster carers and there are also fee paid schemes with very competitive rates and training opportunities. All carers receive an allowance that meets the costs of looking after a child. CHILDREN'S CORNER LADYBIRD MOBILE


Ladybird, ladybird, fly away home ...

You will need

Card Thin black sugar paper Black felt-tipped pen Bubble wrap 2 strong & wide non-bendy drinking straws

Brass paper fastener Hole punch

Red sugar paper Thread Scissors Glue stick



1. Draw a ladybird shape on to card (a wide oval about 10cm long). Use this as a template to draw 4 ladybird shapes in black paper and four in red.

2. On the red shapes draw in the black head and spots.

3. Cut 4 ovals of bubble wrap a bit smaller than the ladybird shapes. Clue over the "wrong" side of each shape, place the bubble wrap in the middle and sandwich the shapes together.

4. Punch a hole in the top of each ladybird. Next, cut a length of thread that is three times as long as the straw.

5. Pass the thread down the length of one straw and a tie a ladybird to each end.

6. Cut another piece of thread that is four times as long as a straw and pass this through the remaining straw. Tie a ladybird on to each end as before.

7. Using a pin or a needle, pierce a hole in the centre of each of the straws.

8. Push the paper fastener through the holes so that the straws are joined in a cross shape. Bend the end of the fastener into a loop - wrap it round a pencil to do this - then tie on a hanging loop of thread.

9. Before hanging, make sure the ladybirds are balanced.

THE UNITED PARISHES OF ARDLEIGH AND THE BROMLEYS

Dear Parishioner, In the five years I've lived here I haven't yet visited Colchester castle and museum, or the zoo! Yet I know they are fascinating, fun places that draw visitors from all over the country. I don't think I'm unusual in this, often it's easy to take for granted people who we see regularly or places on our doorstep. It's easy too to be negative, or run down places or people we know. This came to my mind during the recent Ofsted inspection of S Mary's school. Here were four complete strangers coming in to find out everything they could about the place, and you can't get more thorough than an Ofsted inspector! And what did they find? Actually as I write it's still confidential, but look at the evidence yourself, and while we're at it include St George's school too.

Ardleigh and Bromley children have a good reputation for arriving at secondary schools with a good knowledge base and attitude. A high percentage of children live outside of the catchment

areas. That means parents choose to drive here because they judge the schools to be the best in the area. I'm not a great fan of the regular testing and even less of the league tables (when 1 child can represent 15% of the figures statistically they are very dubious) but the schools are up there holding their own. Both schools have this year been given government achievement awards for raising standards. Both are well equipped, friendly places where all the staff know all the children, and both children and staff enjoy being there, well most of the time!

All of this, and there's more, but I'm not sure if you'd pick it up from village people or even at the school gate. It'll be the negatives and moans, some of which are seven, eight years old! Surely by now we all know the incredible time and devotion it takes being a teacher. They're all in at 8am and seldom leave before 5pm, often taking work home; weekends and the "holidays" are often spent in planning and preparation. In other words it's a normal busy job!

Michael Moore writes in *Stupid White Men* - "Teachers, thank you so much for devoting your life to my Child. Is there ANYTHING I can do to help YOU? Is there ANYTHING you need? I am here for you. Why? Because you are helping my child - MY BABY- learn and grow. Not only will you be largely responsible for her ability to make a living, but your influence will greatly affect how she views the world, what she knows about other people in this world, and how she will feel about herself. I want her to believe she can attempt anything that no doors are closed and that no dreams are too distant. I am entrusting the most valuable person in my life to you for seven hours each day. You, are thus, one of the most important people in my life! Thank you!" I don't have a child, but I want to say thank you teachers because these are the ones who are going to be running the world when I'm looking for retirement! I expect that making a decision about where to educate a child is one of the more difficult ones parents have to make. We are most fortunate in these parishes in our schools, let us celebrate that and let it be known. *Fr Nicolas*

WHERE DO YOU MEET?

There is much space given on the news and in local papers when facilities to an area close down - usually through lack of use by the very people they are there to serve. Great Bromley. despite being a small village, is luckier than most and boasts a school. a church. three pubs, a village hall, a mobile library and a Post Office Stores. Little Bromley has a pub but no longer has its Post Office Stores and more recently in our neighbouring village Frating its PO/Stores closed through lack of support.

The village hall hosts a wide variety of events throughout the year, some in aid of its own funds. It is also used for the benefit of other local organisations as well as being a venue for meetings for large companies - who hasn't seen the amazing gaggle of gas vans? - as well as for culture in the form of concerts, drama etc. The hall is constantly being refurbished and up-dated with the new Millennium Room adding to its impressive facilities.

A mobile library visits both villages every Thursday - Great Bromley Back Lane 9.20 - 9.30am. Chase Road 9.35-9.45am and Little Bromley Shop Road 9.55- 10.05am. The length of time it stops apparently reflects the number of users so I assume there cannot be many but what a shame if we were to lose it. Colchester Library are offering to help set up a reading group (see page 5) within Gt Bromley. We should not turn the offer down so do make an effort and contact them.

The Post Office Stores is another focal meeting point as well as being essential. it is a convenience store which caters amply for our day to day living needs. offers a paper delivery service as well as a wide range of magazines in the shop. has stationery items and some luxury items such as CDs etc. A dry cleaning service is also offered. PLUS it has the Post Office. The Post Office has recently introduced new functions which are an important facility for rural communities. They now offer an automated banking service for customers with an Alliance 8; Leicester. Barclays and Lloyds TSB current account, or who have a basic bank account (with Abbey National, Bank of Ireland, Bank of Scotland, Clydesdale Bank, Co-operative Bank, First Trust, Halifax, HSBC, Lloyds TSB. Nationwide. NatWest, Northern Bank, Royal Bank of Scotland. Ulster Bank and Yorkshire Bank) or a new Post Office card account. With all these accounts using bank cards and a PIN system cash can be withdrawn over the counter. The PO is also able to take debit cards for payment of stamps. BT bills, DVLA and TV licences with other products soon to be joining this list. Government pensions, benefits (such as child allowance etc.) and some tax credits can be paid into one of the above bank accounts or the new Post Office card account for withdrawal over the counter.

We have all these wonderful facilities in our midst. We do not need to go miles to Colchester, Manningtree, or wherever unnecessarily. USE THEM OR LOSE THEM! *Leonie Henderson*

Referral letters are being saved on the computer and since February we have been receiving some pathology results from the hospital electronically via the NHSnet. The next phase starting later this year will be the scanning of letters received from the hospital on to the computer which are then attached to the individual patent medical record. *Fred Merrin, Practice Manager*

SAFER JOURNEYS TO SCHOOL

The response to the survey was very good - 44 parents and 19 residents. There were lots of written, very credible comments as well. These have all been collated and debated. All the measures are to be implemented, except the footprints, subject to the required statutory procedures where these are relevant. We shall never be able to satisfy everyone in these circumstances; the work aims to be completed by the beginning of the autumn term. The philosophy of the Essex scheme is not only to reduce indiscriminate parking, thereby causing potential for an accident, and the awareness of the 30mph speed limit but also to encourage parents to share cars, and for children to walk or bike to school in order to reduce pollution. This process will be ongoing with certain aspects of safer journeys becoming part of the policy and curriculum at the school

WEA ARDLEIGH BRANCH

The course for the Autumn Term 2003 will be "Mohammed, Charlemagne and the Birth of Europe." The tutor will be Mr Christopher Thompson who is an experienced W.E.A. and Open University lecturer and who regularly teaches, in our area, courses on local history, early modern history and European history. This exciting course. looks at the end of the world of Classical Antiquity in the fifth and sixth centuries AD. when the barbarian invasions of Western Europe overwhelmed the late-Roman Empire. We shall look at the survival of Byzantium in the East and its long-running wars with Persia. The rise of Islam, which partly severed the connections between the northern and southern shores of the Mediterranean, in the seventh century will be a major point of focus. The religious complexities of the period between 400 and 800 AD. and the emergence of the Catholic Church as the dominant body in Western Europe will be examined. Then we shall look at the emergence of new kingdoms like those of the Franks and Lombards as well as those of the Angles, Saxons and Jutes in the British Isles. Finally, we shall look at the foundation of the Holy Roman Empire and its role in the creation of a new Europe.

KITCHEN CORNER STUFFED COURGETTES

6 large courgettes ; 1 onion, chopped; 2 cloves garlic, chopped ; 5 tbsp olive oil 8oz (220g) high quality sausage meat ; 4oz (110g) fresh brown or white breadcrumbs 1½ oz (45g) pine kernels; 1½ oz (45g) currants ; 1 level teasp ground cinnamon; 1 level teasp cumin; 2 tbsp chopped parsley; 1 egg, beaten; 3 tbsp tomato puree; 1½ tbsp castor sugar; 1 tbsp red or white wine vinegar; 7 ½ fl oz (220 ml) water Salt and pepper

Cut courgettes in half lengthwise.

Remove centre leaving sturdy shells for stuffing.

Sprinkle insides with salt and turn upside down to drain.

Chop up the insides. Fry onion, garlic, courgette innards in 2 tbsp olive oil until tender and translucent without browning.

Mix thoroughly with sausage meat, - breadcrumbs, pine kernels, currants, spices, parsley, salt and pepper. Add enough egg to bind without becoming sloppy.

Fill courgette shells with the mixture, mounding it slightly. Arrange snugly in oiled ovenproof dish. Mix tomato puree with sugar, vinegar and water and pour around. Drizzle remaining oil over the top.

Bake 190C/357F/Gas Mk 5 for 40-45 minutes, basting occasionally with juices till shells are tender. Serve hot, warm or cold.

Report of a Great Bromley Parish Council meeting held on 17th July, 2003

PLANNING DECISIONS Tendring District Council has approved the following planning applications: "Sept Annee", Back Lane East: construction of pitched roofs over existing extension and garage and canopy roof.

Hazels Ltd. Harwich Road: retention of portacabin for office use until 30 June 2005 RAF tower, Hillyards Road: additional panel and dish antenna.

Tendring District Council has refused the following planning application: Barn adjacent to Portlands, Harwich Rd renewal of temporary living accommodation.

PLANNING APPLICATIONS The Council considered and agreed no objections to the following planning applications: 1 Alma Cottages, Briar Road: Conservatory. 3 Manor Cottages, Mary Lane South: Two storey extension. Park Farm. Hillyards Road: Amend eaves height (of an agricultural building), close access and new planting.

The Council considered and notified the District Council of its objections to the following planning applications: 2 Hall Cottages. Hall Road: To increase width of existing road access; Primrose Farm, Hall Road: Outline planning for a new farm manager's dwelling.

Highways Officers of the Essex County Council Highways Department will attend the Council meeting on 11 September and answer questions. The Council shares residents' concern at motorists exceeding speed limits throughout the village and which sometimes lead to accidents. The Council continues to press the police and county highways department to take appropriate action to ensure the safety of pedestrians and road users. The Council believes that, following its representations to the district council, highways cleaning is improving.

Hare Green recreation field A timber "ball wall" will be installed shortly. The Royal Society for the Prevention of Accidents has carried out a safety inspection of the playground equipment and reported some minor defects. The Council has instructed a specialist contractor to undertake remedial work.

Future meetings The next two meeting of the Council will be at 7.30 pm on 14 August and 11 September 2003 at the Village Hall. - *KB* 18/07/03

GREAT BROMLEY VILLAGE HALL CHARITY TRUSTEES

So how do we have a village hall and cricket ground? Way back in the 1920s the Hall was built by and on land of Percy Crossman. His son, Douglas Peter Crossman, in 1946 conveyed the land and buildings to be held on charitable trusts for the benefit of the inhabitants of Great Bromley, in memory of his father. In 1966, a Deed of Appointment was drawn up and in 1967 a Trust Deed was established whereas the Parish Council became the "Custodian Trustee" and the "Committee of Management" are the administering trustees. Later in 1967, a Deed of Rectification amended the wording of part of the Trust Deed. It is the 1967 Trust Deed as amended that is followed today and we are a charity registered with the Charity Commission. The Village Hall has no endowments, all income must come from lettings, fund raising, grants, donations and the like. We are fortunate in having many regular booking throughout the year. However the Committee has to fund raise and we are very appreciative of other supporters who raise money and donate to us. In the last couple of years the Parish Council has also helped us with the cost of some repairs and upgrades carried out at the Hall, for which we are very grateful.

Our income for the last financial year was about £13,700 and from that we have to meet all day to day running costs, repairs, insurance together with upgrading the premises to meet modern day standards and expectations We need to meet health, safety and statutory requirements for the licensing of the premises for public entertainment, we also pay a fee to the Performing Right Society. The committee at their meeting in June, after reviewing the Hall Hire Charges, decided an increase from 1st September, 2003 was necessary (the first for two years!)

THE PCC OF THE BROMLEYS

The PCC met on 19th June and discussed the following issues:-

Finance Report The financial position is deteriorating with the consequent result that there is a deficit compared to budget of £223. £230 has been received from Little Bromley Parish Council towards the cost of grass cutting. The recent Gift Day produced a very disappointing result of £180. However, further monies are still being received. It was suggested that more publicity be given to encourage people to complete Standing Orders and that we publish running costs so that everyone is aware of how monies are Spent.

Maintenance Plan There is a requirement for the Repair Committee to have a Maintenance Plan and a draft document was considered and, subject to minor change, adopted by the PCC. It was agreed that a notice should be pinned to the notice board stating that the First Aid Box is located under the Tower.

Fabric There are on-going problems with sub-standard work carried out in repairing the West Window and the Diocesan Legal Adviser is to be approached for guidance. Plaster has fallen from the inside wall near the north east corner of the north aisle and around the priest's door. The Conservator will be asked to take a look when he comes as part of the investigation work that is shortly to take place in connection with the next stage of roof repairs.

Scaffolding, to enable the investigation work to be carried out. is due to be erected on 7th July. It is unclear as to how long it will be required albeit it will need to be removed before weddings take place in late August.

Room and Toilet Facilities A meeting took place in the Church on 5th June between Church representatives, the Architect and members of the Diocesan Advisory Committee (DAC), There was general agreement with the proposed siting of the room and toilet. albeit some modifications to the layout were suggested. It was agreed that a further meeting should be held to include a representative from English Heritage, and the DAC will include the project on the agenda for their next meeting.

Tendring Show A church tent will be at the Tendring Show. Other churches within both St. Osyth and Harwich Deaneries will also be taking part. There is to be a service of celebration on 11th July at 6.30pm to 7.15pm at the Show Ground.

Fete Mike and Mary Raper have offered to host a fete on Saturday 9th August from 11.00am to 2.30pm, the proceeds to be split equally between St. George's and St. Mary's. Ardleigh PCC has offered to organise a bookstall, a Trade Craft stall and tombola. Ideas are being sought as to other attractions.

Flower Festival A meeting was held on 5th June to discuss arrangements for the Flower Festival.

Youth Services There is to be a Youth Service at 6.30pm at Lawford Church on Sunday 21st June and St. Georges is hosting a further such service at 6.30pm on 20th July.



Archdeacon's Report - Ministry The PCC discussed issues contained in the Archdeacon's Report albeit it is difficult to make recommendations for future ministry without knowing what is happening throughout the remainder of the Deanery.

Next Meeting The next meeting will be held on Tuesday 2nd September 2003 at 7.30pm in the Rectory.

Dear Parishioner

It used to be said that the C of E went on holiday during August and after the last few weeks publicity I think that may be a good idea. It is never good when family matters are aired in public and not very edifying when its Christians doing the arguing. Part of the issue with the C of E is that the media quite rightly say if you still wish to be The Church of the land then we've a right to publish what is going on. In all of this Canon Jeffery John, who appears to be the only one to come out of the debacle with his integrity intact, deserves our prayer and praise. The Church of England in her latest teaching on sexuality upholds Marriage as the rightful place for sex, as a consequence of a man and woman living faithfully together for life. and as a result of which children may be born and nurtured. For gay and lesbian people who do not feel called to abstain from sex, the Church encourages them to lifelong, full. and loving partnerships. The Church then places the discipline on her gay and lesbian clergy to be celibate, ie abstain from sexual relationships.

To all her members the Church calls for love and compassion, for an end to prejudice, particularly homophobia, and encourages congregations to be welcoming and supportive of all people regardless of their sexuality and state of life. Canon John's crime seems to have been that he has challenged the discipline of the Church as being inconsistent, but he has declared (more than any other candidate has ever been required to do) that he is celibate and observes the disciplines of the Church. Indeed those who have spoken out against homosexuality are the ones not in line with the Church of England's teaching. We preach that all fall short of the perfection that is God, but thankfully he understands that and is forgiving. All he asks in return of those who receive his unconditional love is that we love Him, ourselves and our brothers and sisters. On August 15th we celebrate that when Mary died she was taken straight up into heaven as a Sign to all humanity that their destiny can be heaven too. That is the Christian hope which the congregations here try to live and demonstrate. May we be blessed in that, may you be blessed in your: response to Love as well. *Fr Nicolas*.

BALMY DAYS

At the back of my childhood home in Sussex was a 50 acre field. At harvest time as children in the early 1950s we played amongst the stooks as they awaited collection. Later we built bale houses which became more complicated as we got older. Such joys are all very transient like sand castles by the sea. Haystacks were built by our back gate and from a willow tree in our garden elder sister taught me to climb up and onto the stacks. She used to jump from one to another but I wasn't big enough. My mother was furious when she discovered these antics. The school summer holidays and the summer recesses both in Parliament and the Courts were all timed to enable as many people as possible to take part in the harvest. The land owners returned to their estates and large numbers of those living in cities left the bright lights to work in the country for hop and fruit picking, where they could breathe the fresh air and see the sky in all its glory by day and by night the only light to spoil their view of the stars being the "village lantern" depending upon her fullness. As a consequence most city dwellers had a greater contact and understanding of the countryside than they appear to have today.

Harvest is a wonderful time. It is the fruition of one's labours with the added satisfaction of having seen the full cycle of seasons. The fields transform from green to golden. The combine harvester is now master of all as it majestically sweeps the field and the horses and thresher of my memories are relegated to museums. There is that distinctive smell of warm, cut straw on hot sunny days. The butterflies and damsel and dragonflies are in abundance - this year more so than most - and there have been small clouds of them in our garden and paddocks along with the lazy late summer sound of grasshoppers and crickets. The fruit is ripening on trees and in the hedgerow and Nature's bounty is waiting to be collected to see us through the cold months of the year. *Leonie Henderson*

THE EAST WINDOW AT ST GEORGE'S

Maybe some day there will be a picture of an older East window which was installed before that given by the Graham family. The Revd Wm. Hall Graham was Rector of Gt Bromley, 1837-1858. His widow, Helen, and Arthur Etaugh Graham, his son, put in an East Window which was received and dedicated on 10th October, 1867. There was a brass plate to record the fact. On 25th September, 1944 the blast from a nearby German Flying Bomb smashed the window. In 1953 The Bishop of Barking dedicated the present East Window. It was designed by the Nicholson Stained Glass Studios, London and in July 1953 The War Damage Commission paid £906 2s. 6d. towards it. The inscription reads: "In remembrance of William Hall Graham, 20 years Rector of this parish, a window was placed here in 1867. Destroyed by a German bomb on September 25th, 1944 and replaced by the present window in 1953". It is clear why we see St Helena with St George - Helen was the devoted wife of Mr Graham. *John Appleby*

The course for the Autumn Term 2003 will be "Mohammed, Charlemagne and the Birth of Europe" The tutor will be Mr Christopher Thompson who is an experienced W.E.A. and Open University lecturer and who regularly teaches, in our area, courses on local history, early modern history and European history.

This exciting course looks at the end of the world of Classical Antiquity in the fifth and sixth centuries AD. when the barbarian invasions of Western Europe overwhelmed the late Roman Empire. We shall look at the survival of Byzantium in the East and its long-running wars with Persia. The rise of Islam, which partly severed the connections between the northern and southern shores of the Mediterranean, in the seventh century will be a major point of focus. The religious complexities of the period between 400 and 800 AD. and the emergence of the Catholic Church as the dominant body in Western Europe will be examined. Then we shall look at the emergence of new kingdoms like those of the Franks and Lombards as well as those of the Angles, Saxons and Jutes in the British Isles. Finally, we shall look at the foundation of the Holy Roman Empire and its role in the creation of a new Europe.

KITCHEN CORNER **REDCURRANT BUNS**

This recipe makes 10 muffins or 16-18 small buns. Use greased bun tins or paper cases. 6oz.-170g plain flour; 2 teaSp baking powder; 5oz/140g caster sugar; 2 eggs, separated; 8 tblsp sunflower oil; 6 tblsp milk; Juice and zest of half a lemon; 6oz/170 g prepared redcurrants; Creme fraiche, icing sugar, sprigs of currants to decorate.

Heat oven to 180C/350F, Gas Mark 6. Sift Hour and baking powder into a bowl. Mix sugar, egg yolks, oil, milk, juice and zest of lemon together and stir into the flour. Whisk egg whites till stiff then fold into the mixture. Stir in the redcurrants and drop the mixture into the bun or muffin tins. Bake 15-20 minutes. Cool on a wire rack, then dollop on a spoonful of creme fraiche and a few redcurrants. Dust with icing sugar before serving. I think this recipe would work well with other fruits such as blueberries. I am going to try it with blackberries. Jill Frostick

The Rector last month in his letter addressed the serious divisions within the Church of England which have been brought to light by the Canon John saga. I was surprised to read this letter as having worshipped in Great Bromley since coming here 25 years ago I had not seen such views on Christian teaching expressed before: views which appear to me to be inconsistent with what is in the bible.

When Peter and I came to Harris Farm (now Lilleys Farm) in 1953 Great Bromley was a great village. The Carnival was run every year by Derek and Jean Wright and a willing committee. Sadly when much loved Jean and Derek died, so gradually did the Carnival. Report of the Great Bromley Parish Council meeting held on 14 August 2003 12 **Roads and rights of way** Essex County Highways Department is responsible for maintaining our local roads, footpaths and bridle ways. The departments district manager and maintenance engineer will be attending the next parish council meeting at 7.30 pm on Thursday 10 September at the village hall. Residents are welcome to come along and put their questions, views and complaints.

Planning decisions Tendring District Council has approved the following planning applications: **1 Alma Cottages, Briar Road:** Conservatory. **2 Hall Cottages, Hall Road**: To increase width of existing access. **Michaelmas House, Rectory Road**: removal of condition concerning agricultural related occupancy from existing planning permission.

Tendring District Council has refused the following planning applications: **Pond Farm, Hall Road**: illuminated signs. **Pond Farm, Hall Road**: variation of condition of planning permission relating to colour of joinery.

Planning applications The Council considered and agreed no objections to the following planning applications: **Byeways, Mary Lane North**: Single storey kitchen extension The Council considered and agreed to defer its decision on the following planning application until further information on the background has been provided by the district council: **Gresham's Farm, Harwich Road**: renewal of permission for continued use of mobile home.

Highways Because of the concerns with speeding the county Highways Department has agreed to undertake a Speed survey in the area of the Harwich/Frating Roads intersection and report its findings to the canned. The county Highways Department is expected to install a hard surfaced footway along the north side of Brook Street between the post office and telephone box.

Hare Green recreation field The Council will be applying for grants towards the cost of purchasing a youth shelter, seats and a hard playing surface for young people.

The environment The district council is considering employing private investigators to gain evidence of fly-tipping so that prosecutions could be brought. it was hoped that this will act as a deterrent.

Future meetings The next meeting of the Council will be at 7.30 pm on Thursday 11 September 2003 at the Village Hall.

CHURCH FINANCE REPORT

"Annual income twenty pounds, annual expenditure nineteen nineteen six, result happiness. Annual income twenty pounds, annual expenditure twenty pounds ought and six, result misery." According to the above quotation, like Mr. Micawber the Bromleys PCC should be miserable but we are still making plans "in case anything turns up." The following tables indicate the main categories of income and expenditure:

We have many successes of which we can be proud:

- Parish Share (family purse) has been paid in full for the past 3 years
- Funds are available to finance the roof repairs
- 17 people have signed up for Gift Aid allowing us to claim an extra 28p for every pound donated
- Planned giving by standing order increased by 49% in 2002
- Over £7,000 has been given to charity in the past 3 years following a PCC resolution to donate 10% of income

On the negative side, however:

- The general fund has shrunk by $\pounds 6,000$ in the past 3 years and is projected to reduce by a further $\pounds 1,000$ by the end of 2003
- Collections during services have fallen in the past year
- Parish share is forecast to rise by 6.9% (nearly £1,000) in 2004
- A potential £1,500 was lost in 2002 when donations were not Gift Aided
- Approximately £50,000 is needed to bring S George's Church into the 21st century by providing a meeting room and toilet.

The overriding financial message is that The Bromleys reserves are being eroded purely by the day to day running of the Church. income needs to increase by £1,000 annually simply to break even, before we even start to think about enhancements or further major repairs to the building. *Hilary Powell Treasurer, PCC of The Bromleys*

Dear Parishioner,

I write this as I'm still a little sleep deprived from the recent Youth Camp at Walsingham or to give it its proper title "Youth Pilgrimage". That's not to get people to sign up before they realise that it means sleeping in a tent, but to acknowledge that Walsingham is a place of pilgrimage and that this week is specially designed for teenagers. So there was the usual sporting, dancing, creative, workshops, a trip to the local pool, a disco and (horror of horrors) a karaoke evening. All intermingled with times of prayer and praise, of great noise and great peace, of walking the holy mile barefoot, of talking and listening. All in all our youngsters did us proud by entering into the whole experience in an open and remarkably mature way and so coming away with a sense of joy at being a pilgrim.

For this I'm full of thanksgiving. Actually I enjoy the few days myself, though I do need more sleep, hot water and privacy than is on offer. I get an enormous amount from them, and I know that it isn't easy admitting in the playground that you are a Christian.

Thankfulness too that when I was a teenager adults took time off work to take me away on Scout and Church Camps. Memories too of the men and women who week by week were at the Scout hut, youth club, who invited me and my friends into their homes after Church. They gave me space and encouragement to grow and find out who I was, and yes what God wanted me to do.

This is the time for celebrating the harvest. For some of you there will be a sense of satisfaction that the harvest is in. I expect for most of us actual harvesting is a mystery, unless you can count the weekly trip to Tesco as "gathering in". So we need to find different ways of being thankful and expressing that as a community. Sunday by Sunday day by day I seek to do this here in offerings of worship to God by the pilgrims here. Thank yous for past experiences, past people, and places may be a good way to start. May God bless you. *Fr Nicolas*.

JUST WORDS!

My use of the word "stooks" last month was questioned so I looked it up in the dictionary to find the definition. It was defined as "a group of sheaves, set up in a field" - which they were, supporting each other usually in sets of three, looking like wigwams. It was inside these that we used to try to secrete ourselves with less success as we grew. With the dictionary still open I looked up sheaf: "a bundle of stalks of corn, bound side by side"; haystack: "a large pile of hay built in the open air of regular form and finished off with a pointed or ridged top"; hayrick: "stack of hay, regularly built and thatched". My Dictionary of Nursery Rhymes tells me that in the rhyme of Little Boy Blue the boy who looks after the sheep was asleep under a haycock - "a conical heap of hay in a field". It also tells me that Little Boy Blue was a reference to Cardinal Wolsey, the son of an Ipswich butcher, who as a boy probably looked after his father's livestock. All these words are now rarely used as newer more modern words come into daily parlance. The words "computer" and "calculator" featured in my old school dictionary as a person who either computed or calculated rather than having the additional meaning of a particular machine. Other words have had their meanings altered through their association with other ideas which sometimes renders them unusable in their original form.

There has been much fuss recently over apostrophes and spellings and I must confess that I am in the camp of those who abhor their misuse along with pronunciations of words that have altered as they return here from across the Atlantic. Grammar, spellings, punctuation, figures of speech all make our language easy to read and understand as well as more precise, colourful and fun if perhaps more difficult to learn in the beginning. How dull if we ignored it - we might as well just grunt!

However does all this matter when I receive, just as I am about to send this to Natalie to proofread, an email headed "Rscheearh". It goes: "Aoccdrnig to a rscheearch at an Elingsh uinervtisy, it deosnt mttaer in waht oredr the ltteers in a wrod are, the olny iprmoetnt tihng is taht the frist and lsat ltteer is at the rghit pclae. The rset can be a toatl mses and you can sitll raed it wouthit porbelm. Tihs is becuseae we do not raed ervey lteter by it slef but the wrod as a wlohe." What hope have I left? Loneie Hdnreeosn

ARDLEIGH SURGERY THE SURGERY, DEDHAM ROAD, ARDLEIGH

It is influenza vaccination time again! The Department of Health recommends patients should have vaccination against influenza if they are aged over 65 or at particular risk if they have one of the following medical conditions; heart disease, diabetes, respiratory disease including asthma, renal disease or are immunocompromised. Patients are reminded to contact their doctors surgery to book into a flu clinic held during October. We will also be offering vaccination against pneumonococcal infection for patients aged over 80 in accordance with advice from the Chief Medical Officer.

Ardleigh Surgery will be holding vaccination clinics for patients on Thursday 2, 9, 23 October and 6 November at 2pm and Saturday morning 18 October. Please make an appointment with the receptionist to attend a clinic or to see a practice nurse at some other time

Doctors and staff can now enjoy a proper weekend every week. Saturdays mornings have always been for emergencies only - at least that was the intention. Primecare's doctors are, of course, all fully qualified and experienced. So, as anything urgent enough to need attention outside normal surgery hours can perfectly well be dealt with by any doctor, out of hours care should be just as good as if our own GPs were providing it. However, any new system can have teething troubles so if you experience any problems please let us know so that we can put them right. If you need urgent, out of hours attention on Saturdays - or any other day - please ring Primecare on 0845 601 8802.

We are already making appointments for the flu jab clinics which start soon, and if you haven't booked yours yet, now is the time! Also this year, anyone aged 80 or over is entitled to a jab against pneumonia. Just like the flu jab, it's NOT a live vaccine, so it can't give you pneumonia. It could save a very nasty illness though and most people only ever need to have it once. Why not book to have the two together if you qualify?

By the time you read this the extension will be well and truly finished, the builders will be gone and we'll probably be missing their company. We already have the doctors' car park back and the new consulting rooms should be furnished, equipped and in use by 22nd September. We think it's looking great, but your comments, positive or negative, would be appreciated. What on earth shall we do next?

KITCHEN CORNER

Pear Tart

285g/10 oz. shortcrust pastry

675 g / 1¹/₂ lb pears - ripe but not mushy ; Juice of 1 lemon

225g/8 oz whipping cream; 2 eggs + 1 yolk ; 85g/3 oz caster sugar

Roll out pastry to line 9-10" /23cm flan tin with sides at least 1"/2.5cm high. Prick base, put in foil/beans/rice to stop middle rising up. Bake blind 12 minutes in a hot oven. Remove foil etc. Peel, core and slice pears and lay in to pastry, sprinkle with lemon juice to prevent discolouring. Mix cream with eggs, yolk and sugar. Pour over tart and return to oven. Reduce heat to 190C/375F 20-25 minutes until cream is just set. Cool 10 minutes before serving, or allow to get completely cold. *Jill Frostick*

GARDENER'S CORNER FOR OCTOBER

Shrubs: It is not too late to take cuttings of lavender. The cuttings should be about 3" long, insert into a mixture of sharp sand and compost then place in a cold frame, keep cool and away from the hot sun. **Roses:** Start to prune climbing and ramblers at the end of the month, the cuttings can be used to strike new plants. Plant where you want them to remain permanently as this will avoid disturbing them once they have rooted. **Perennials:** These can be divided and replanted this month. **Dahlias:** As soon as they have finished flowering cut down the stems, dig them up and store in boxes in a frost free place. **Bulbs:** If you are going to pot up hyacinths for Christmas flowering make sure you buy the "PREPARED" bulbs. **House Plants:** Reduce feeding of all house plants. *Frank Griffiths*





Light a candle or leave a written prayer. Reflect for a while, thank God for blessings, bask in His presence and know that He loves you.

OH WHAT A LOVELY WAR!

The Mercury Theatre described "OH WHAT A LOVELY WAR" as a "Stylish piece of musical theatre promising to entertain. affect, amuse and confront. Joan Littlewoods' play brims with song, dance and joy and overflows with the tragedy of war." The Essex County Standard, headline on page 25 on 3.10.03 announced "OH WHAT A LOVELY SHOW."

It was indeed all that the two accounts described but oh, so much more too. Our emotions were certainly taken on the roller coaster promised as the light hearted singing gave way to scenes and sounds of bombing, shooting and sights of actors' bodies strewn around the stage and 'trenches'. The reality of the horror of the First World War was presented in contrast to the bursts of enthusiastic singing from the talented group. We were thankful for the relief of the old songs and, for me, they stemmed the flow of tears as the story unfolded.

The audience was very mixed. Rows of students rocked in their seats and hooted with laughter as the sergeant major put the 'la-de-dahs' through their paces using walking sticks as rifles. Their laughter also rang out when the several actors realistically depicted the wounded and the blinded soldiers as they struggled up the steps between the filled seats. A voice, deep inside me wanted to call out, "Don't laugh, to those who experienced the war this was a nightmare." Although he never talked about it my father was part of that war and it could not have, ever, been described as lovely. In 1914, at the age of 16, along with many other idealistic young men, to help King and Country he took the shilling that, I am told. was offered to those who volunteered to face the enemy. In 1918, at the age of 20, he returned home having been gassed in the trenches. He could have applied for a pension but that would have prevented him from going back to work and without work there was no future for him. My memory is of a father who constantly suffered long bouts of choking coughing and was unable to work for at least three months of every year. His life ended painfully at the age of 52. His wife, our mother, was 48. He was one of the lucky ones?

At the end of the spectacular performance at the Mercury red poppy petals fluttered on to the stage. Silence was kept. A young man once said to me that he felt that Remembrance Day should not be celebrated as the two world wars happened so long ago and what was the use of dragging it out year after year? Humanity has still not learned to live in peace, families feud and there is gang warfare. Wars do not usually suddenly erupt. Perhaps we should start in our homes, schools and work places as aren't we all brothers and sisters under our many shades of skin and our varying religions? Let us keep on remembering the thousands upon thousands who were killed or injured, the thousands more who starved, regardless of on which side they fought.

The newspaper was right in declaring it a lovely show but it never was and never could have been a lovely war. Buy your poppy and wear it with pride. Carry on remembering, please. *Olive Sparling*

NEWS FROM THE DOCTORS SURGERY

GREAT BENTLEY SURGERY THE HOLLIES, THE GREEN, GT BENTLEY It's amazing how suddenly we've gone from glorious late summer to chilly autumn. The doctors are packing away their mobile air-conditioning units and fumbling with the thermostats on their radiators. The staff have that pinched, hunched look about them and are pulling on their woolly jumpers. Our 'Enry's back on telly selling flu jabs and even the Christmas adverts are being rolled out again! At least the new heating system is working well and we won't have to worry about running out of oil this year. Whilst on the subject of heating, we've got some leaflets in the surgery entitled "Tendring Warmth" issued by the Tendring Home Improvement Agency. They tell you how to get information on grants or other sources of funding to help with home insulation and heating. It's definitely worth picking one up if you or somebody you know might struggle to keep warm this winter. Incidentally, we have available dozens of different leaflets on a wide variety of health and social issues. If you need information about a health matter, or perhaps want the name and address of a particular patient support group, we've probably got it, either on display or tucked away in our new store room. Do ask if you need help finding something.

As I hope you know, we are always on the look out for ways to improve access to the doctors for those who really need to see them. For this reason, our nurses and other staff often undertake special training courses to enable them to deal expertly with more complicated matters. A recent development is that our senior nurses, Jan and Jayne, have both now completed and passed their Diagnostics course (congratulations!) and can look after many more minor ailments such as sore throats, ear or tummy aches, eye infections - even children with temperatures. We also now have Healthcare Assistants who are specially trained to take blood pressures, remove stitches and check dressings amongst other things. As a result, when you request an appointment these days, the receptionist should ask for some basic information about the reason for your visit. This isn't nosiness! It's a genuine effort to get you in with the right person and to keep waiting times to a minimum, so please help us by giving us a rough idea of why you need to come in. *Hugh Cronin, Practice Manager*

Report of the Great Bromley Parish Council meeting held on 16 October 2003

Planning applications The Council considered and agreed no objections to the following planning applications:

Nettle Croft, Chapel Lane - first floor extension.

Michaelmas House, Rectory Road - change of use: from agricultural/caravan site to residential curtilage.

The Council considered and agreed to object to the following application which it believed would lead to overdevelopment of the site and contravention of an existing condition of planning approval: Coppice View (the Caravan) Carrington Road: garden store and car port.

Tendring District Council has approved the following planning applications:

Byeways, Mary Lane North: single-storey kitchen extension.

3 Manor Cottages, Mary Lane South: two-storey extension.

Park Farm, Hillyards Road: barn eaves height. new planting and access.

Gresham's farm, Harwich Road: renewal of temporary mobile home.

Tendring District Council has refused the following planning applications:

Primrose Farm, Hall Road: farm manager's dwelling.

Marks Farm, Frating Road: single storey extension.

Highways Following its presentation at September's meeting the County Highways Department has provided a detailed written response to the issues raised by the council and local residents. Further information can be obtained from the Clerk. The bridge over the A120 at Parson's Hill (81029) was badly damaged by a vehicle in July. Repairs will be undertaken in early 2004 but, until then, a single lane with traffic lights will be operated.

Rural Community Council of Essex The Council is now a member of the Rural Community Council which can provide advice and assistance with a wide range of community projects. **Village Hall** The District Council will be assuming responsibility for licensing premises and will consult the parish council on applications. The council considered and raised no objections to the village hall's application to renew its public entertainment licence. The Council agreed a

grant of $\pounds 2,500$ to the village hall for the renewal of emergency lighting.

Environment The council has agreed in principle to apply for a grant from the district council towards the cost of trees to be planted at the Hare Green recreation field.

Onyx now clears weekly the council's litter and dog bins. Please let the Clerk know if this is not being done. Councillors have cleared away broken glass deposited near the Hare Green play equipment and which was clearly dangerous.

Future meetings The next meeting of the Council will be at 7.30 pm on Thursday 13 November 2003 at the Village Hall Great Bromley.

H B Newman MA, William Orman Church Warden, Thomas George Parish Clerk" It appears that Thomas George could read, as he was a scholar at the first School in Little Bromley.

KITCHEN CORNER

By special request, another vegetarian dish this month. This idea is from Sarah Brown's "Vegetarian Kitchen".

RED DRAGON PIE Serves 4

4 0z (110g) aduki beans 2 oz (50g) wheat grain or rice 2 pts (1.1 ltr) water for boiling 2 pts (1.1 ltr) water for soaking 1 tbsp oil 1 onion, peeled and finely chopped 8 oz (225g) diced carrots 1-2 tbsp soy sauce, 2 tbsp tomato puree, 1 teasp mixed herbs, Salt & pepper 1/2 pt (275ml) aduki bean stock



11b (450g) peeled potatoes

1 oz butter

Wash beans and rice and soak overnight (or steep 1 hour in boiling water). Drain, rinse and bring to the boil in fresh water. Cook 50 mins till soft, drain but reserve the stock. Heat oil in pan and fry onion 5 mins, add carrots and cook 2-3 mins, then add cooked grains and beans. Add stock, puree, herbs and soy sauce and simmer 20-30 mins, season to taste and add more liquid to make a moist mixture.

Put in to a greased 3 pt (1.5 litre) casserole. Boil potatoes till soft then mash with butter, season well and spread over the bean mixture. Bake 35- 40 mins till potato is crisp and browned. 350F, 180C.

CONKER MAD

All of a sudden I had to have one. I turned back and picked one up but the one beside it was a slightly different shape and I then wanted that one too. They nestled in my hand glowing in the sun fresh out of their protective prickly cases and I wanted the others as well. I found myself gathering them all up until I had every last one in my arms. I realised I had been there for a few minutes and would have to hurry to work. What to do with my booty? It must have been a ridiculous sight for all those serious looking people passing by on their way to wherever to see a be-suited mature woman (no child by her side any more as an excuse) to be doing such an exercise, crouching there gathering up conkers in a possessed sort of way. Having gathered them I simply couldn't continue on my way with them in my arms. Nor could I leave them behind so they went into my handbag which then wouldn't close!

I rejoiced to myself that I had gathered this horde and when I secretly looked at them jostling together for space oh how beautiful they looked. However there was no-one with whom I could share their glory. How do you tell anyone of these fabulous objects in your possession? I was supposed to have grown out of collecting conkers years ago. I would dearly have loved to string some of the really big ones and have conker fights (with all the attendant concerns of whether best to bake, pickle in vinegar or use fresh!) - but who to fight with? Children would look askance if I challenged them to a fight - and anyway do they still have conker fights or is it deemed too dangerous for the playground? - and I would be too embarrassed to challenge an adult to pit their conkers against mine. So I have my cache by the back door which are already becoming dull coloured. Eventually I shall cast them round the countryside in suitable places and hope perhaps one will germinate and create a tree to give joy to future generations. Dear Parishioner, I'm told very few of you read this letter, something for which last month I am grateful for! You may or may not find them amusing, but lumped together as a letter they made odd reading. I apologise to those of you who were offended, those of you who were confused, two of the last things I would wish to do. Later on in the month I found myself amazingly helping a friend with a new e-mail system. Two hours later we had still only managed to send one, and that twice! The two incidents made me think about how sometimes communication between people can be very difficult, even with or sometimes because of, modern technology. So maybe my attempts at communicating with God, praying, aren't as hopeless as I sometimes think. Day by day I try to set aside time to be still, quiet and reflective in Church. Those who have died cannot communicate with us, however much we desire it to be so. in fact trying to communicate with the departed can be unhealthy and destructive, especially for the young or vulnerable. Well, this carol has a hidden meaning. During the 16th century Catholics were not allowed to practise their faith in England, and so, in order to teach their children the basic doctrines, they made up nonsense songs so as not to arouse the suspicions of those non-Catholics around them.

The meaning of The Twelve Days of Christmas:

A partridge in a pear tree - Jesus on the cross

Two turtle doves - the Old and New Testaments

Three French hens - French hens were expensive in the 1500s and so they symbolised the three gifts brought by the Wise Men. They also depicted the three virtues - Faith, Hope and Charity. Four calling birds - The Gospels: Matthew, Mark, Luke and John.

Five gold rings - the first five books of the Old Testament, known as the Law.

Seven swans a-swimming - the seven gifts of the Holy Spirit (Romans 12:6-8)

Eight maids a-milking - these refer to the eight blessings referred to in Matthew 5:3-10 (Blessed are the poor...)

Nine ladies dancing - the nine fruits of the Spirit (Galatians 5:22-23)

Ten lords a-leaping - the Ten Commandments

Eleven pipers piping - the eleven faithful apostles.

Twelve drummers drumming - the Apostles Creed ("I believe in God the Father, Maker of heaven and earth ...")


a) To raise the standard of living of rural women and families through education, training and community development projects.

KITCHEN CORNER

The game season is here again, so a recipe to try for pheasant. This comes from Warwickshire. **WARWICKSHIRE PHEASANT CASSEROLE**

A brace of pheasant, prepared

- A knob of butter
- 4 rashers back bacon, chopped
- 1 tbsp flour salt & black pepper
- ³⁄₄ pt chicken stock
- 2 onions. peeled & chopped
- 1 carrot, peeled & sliced
- 4-6 shallots, peeled & left whole
- Bouquet garni (bay leaf. 2 sprigs parsley, sprig thyme tied with string)

 $^{1\!\!/_{\!\!2}}$ pt red wine, 2 tbsp brandy

6 0z button mushrooms

Melt butter in frying pan and quickly brown pheasant on all sides. Remove to a casserole dish, fry bacon in residual butter, then stir in flour and seasoning. Pour in stock. stirring well. Add vegetables and bring to the boil. Pour over pheasant and add the herbs. Pour wine over, cover and cook $2\frac{1}{2}$ -3 hours very moderate oven, 325F. Remove herbs, add mushrooms and brandy and cook another 30 minutes. Serve with creamed potatoes and a green vegetable. *Jill Frostick*

CHILDREN'S CORNER (ADULT SUPERVISION NEEDED)

WOVEN BAGS for the CHRISTMAS TREE

Simple to make and ideal for holding small gifts or sweets

You will need Craft knife/scissors Strong, coloured paper, or laminate giftwrap to cartridge paper for the container base Contrast papers (prepared to equal weight) for weaving Clear craft glue

- 1. To make the base, follow the diagram. Cut a rectangle 16 x 7.5 cm from paper. Draw a live 6mm all round inside the outline. Within this, measure and mark lines 1cm apart. Cut along the lines with a craft knife. Fold the paper in half across its width.
- 2. Cut 6 strips of contrast paper, each 1cm wide, and long enough to wrap round the bag with a generous overlap. With the base folded, weave one strip across next to the fold line. Continue weaving across the back. Weave in the ends securely into the inside and outside of the bag. Trim the excess strip so that the ends do not show on the outside. Continue weaving in the same way with 4 more strips.


Handle

THE PCC or THE BROMLEYS

The PCC met on 20:5 October and discussed the following issues:- The Parish is predicted to be in deficit at the year end. A member of the congregation suggested that the PCC should stop giving money to charities until the financial deficit is cleared. It was pointed out that a fundamental principle of the Church of England is that it is a missionary church and, if we were to adopt that approach, we would be in danger of becoming totally self-centred and inward looking. The Parish Share for 2004 is currently under discussion, throughout the Deanery. The Benefice of Ardleigh and the Bromleys is likely to see an annual increase of 2%, making a total payable for the year of £30,966. It has been suggested that a Fundraising Co-ordinator be appointed and the PCC would support the creation of such a post.

Access Audit An 'Access Audit' carried out at the request of English Heritage has been received. There are no material matters that require action.

Churches Together in Manningtree Father Nicolas attended a meeting of Churches Together. The annual Christmas card, showing Services to be held throughout the Manningtree area, will also incorporate Services at Ardleigh and the Bromleys and supplies of the card will be made available for distribution throughout both Parishes.

Worship - Parish Eucharist Various matters were discussed. Since combining the two Churches: numbers at the 10.30am Services have increased. It was therefore suggested that a second area be identified for administering communion.
