

WHITHER THE WEATHER!

There was a programme on the television recently remarking on the climate changes that would occur if we lost the warmth of the Gulf Stream. This, it was said, could occur as a result of the melting of ice at the Pole diluting the salinity of the polar water and causing the Gulf Stream to cease to flow. Even on the East Coast we still benefit from it (just compare our winter temperatures with those across the North Sea) though we may not always feel that we do. The programme went on to demonstrate that if it was "turned off" we would return to the state of being in an ice age which although it happens every so often naturally, would this time have been accelerated by our own environmental misdeeds. Scary stuff. The programme made salutary thinking both as to how we are treating our planet despite our cleverness and what have we done for our future and that of our children? This programme came hard on the heels of a conversation with a friend during which we agreed we were both hoping for some snow this winter. We enjoy it both aesthetically and for the fun which can be had although we do appreciate it makes travelling and walking about, especially for the elderly, more difficult. Because of the unusually long, dry weather we have had this year we are apparently facing drought conditions next year and, if recent years are anything to go by, I doubt if we will see much snow this year, if any and certainly not a white Christmas as immortalised in song with Father Christmas dashing through the snow in his sleigh! Not of the proportions of the winter of 1963 when my childhood village under the South Downs in Sussex was cut off for well over a week. The blizzard conditions arriving shortly after Christmas made it the best ever winter from our point of view for tobogganing down the Downs, for the tremendous adventure to walk, pulling the sledge through thick snow, to the shops three miles away, for snuggling up to the fire after dark but best of all for missing the first few days of the return to school ...! And probably not of 1st January, 1979 when we were visiting relations in Sussex for New Year, having turned off the heating at home due to the mildness before we left. The weather turned cold swiftly, ferociously and unexpectedly overnight bringing snow. We dragged the children away from their snow games with their cousins and endured a tortuous journey home to Essex before things got worse. Our pipes had frozen with the subsequent mess of water coming through the ceiling in the children's bedroom as they thawed when the house warmed up. We battened down the hatches, kept ourselves warm and played in the snow.

So, quite apart from the fact that l believe a good hard winter kills of a lot of germs, i once again look forward, not to an ice age which is a bit OTT even for me, but to some 'proper' snow that will 'properly' cover the land, make a 'proper' snowman and 'proper' snowballs that disintegrate softly on hitting their target and maybe just cut us off from modern haste for a little while. GREAT BROMLEY PARISH COUNCIL

Report of the Great Bromley Parish Council meeting held on 4 December 2003 **Planning applications** The Council considered and agreed no objections to the following: Meyrick, Colchester Road, Great Bromley - proposed extension and conservatory. Field House, Parson's Hill, Great Bromley - proposed stables and conservatory.

The Poorlands Charity exists to assist the needy of Great Bromley. It is an amalgamation of parish trusts, including the Guild Hall which was founded over 500 years ago. The trust presently has investments valued at about $\pounds4000$ and an annual income of approximately $\pounds180$. At a recent meeting the trustees agreed to make grants of $\pounds40$ each to four needy people. If you know someone who could benefit from the trust's assistance then please get in touch with the Parish Clerk.

Highways and footpaths The County highways department has been busy recently surveying roads which need repairing. The defects have been marked and we are assured that work will start shortly. A number of footpaths have also been cleared and signposts and bridges etc renewed. Speeding continues to be a problem and a recent survey of the Harwich Road's 40 mph section reported that the average speed is 42 mph with some vehicles travelling at 60 mph. The police have been asked to take the necessary action. A temporary 40 mph limit has been introduced along the length of Parson's Hill (B1029) while repairs to the bridge over A120 are carried out.

Future meetings The next meeting of the Council will be at 7.30 pm on Thursday 8 January 2004 at the Village Hall Great Bromley.

GREAT BROMLEY VILLAGE HALL CHARITY TRUSTEES

The Village Hall Management Committee last met on Tuesday, 18th November with Peter Wenden as Chairman. We were pleased to welcome to the meeting, Pat Swanston as a co-opted member of the committee. Insurance cover for the Hall has been renewed, the cost of which has increased by some 10% this past year to nearly £2000. We also had outline information on the new Licensing Bill going through Parliament and its effect of the running of events at the Hall from 2005. The emergency lighting system at the Hall has been replaced and brought up to the current standard. Our old system was failing and was not worthy of any further repairs. We would like to thank our local contractor who carried out the work and also the contribution made by the Parish Council towards the cost involved.

On Saturday, 29th November we held the Christmas Fayre at the hall. Many people came along to support the event which had a slightly different format than in previous years, in aid of St Georges Church and the Village Hall. Some concerns were expressed, as several other local villages were also staging similar events on the day and our local school, the evening before. A big thank you to all the helpers and to Beryl Hurst who co-ordinated their efforts with £955.08p being raised to be divided equally between the Church and Hall. The next committee meeting is

on Tuesday, 20th January at 7.30pm in the Hall. May I, on behalf of the committee, wish you all a Happy and Prosperous year in 2004. *Bevan Willgress*

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NEWS FROM GREAT BENTLEY SURGERY

By the time this sees the light of day, Christmas will be all over bar the credit card bills. I hope you had a wonderful time and that Father Christmas delivered all that you had hoped for. I wonder who got the most useless present. We ought to have a competition for that. We have had a busy spell here at the surgery over the last few weeks. There seem to be a lot of coughs, colds and odd viruses around, some of them causing really unpleasant "flu" like symptoms. Sadly, there is usually absolutely nothing that the doctors can do to speed these illnesses on their way. I remember reading once that an untreated cold lasts two weeks whereas one that a doctor tries to cure goes in a fortnight!

Unfortunately. antibiotics simply don't work on viruses so there's no real point in coming in to see the doctor. The best things you can do if you have a cold or flu are to keep warm, take plenty of fluids and use over the counter pain killers if you need them. Your local pharmacist will give good advice on these. Oh, and try not to pass your germs on to other people! This is also the time of year when it's a good idea to keep a discreet eye on elderly neighbours and friends, especially those who live alone. If you do spot signs that someone is poorly or not coping well with the cold it's worth offering help. A lot of elderly people are very independent and try to manage on their own, so you have to be prepared to take "no" for an answer. You need to remember too. that the doctors have no right generally to go barging in to see anyone unless they or their carer request a visit, which is sometimes hard to explain to a well- meaning neighbour.

We have just learned that we will have an extra doctor around for six months from February to help us cope with Dr Steiner's absence. He is Dr Tobias Kaufmann, who is an experienced GP at present working at a practice in Colchester. He will be full time, so many of you will get to know him. We will also have an extra GP Registrar working here for six months in the New Year. More of her next month, but all in all, it does seem that our regular GPs might be under a little less pressure for the first half of next year. which will be a relief for them.

As a last thought for 2003, all of us here at the surgery wish all of you - patients or not - a very happy and healthy 2004. Let's hope that the weather is gentle with us. that post- Christmas credit card bills are bearable and that the bugs and germs keep their distance. *Hugh Cronin, Practice Manager*



KITCHEN CORNER

Another regional recipe this month, which you might like to try. **NORTHAMPTONSHIRE CHEESECAKES**

8 oz prepared shortcrust pastry ; 6 oz curd or cream cheese

2 oz butter; 2 eggs; 3 oz caster sugar; 4 oz currants

Finely grated rind of 1 lemon; A few drops of almond essence; Ground nutmeg Roll pastry on floured board and use to line 14-16 greased patty tins. Set oven 350F, 180C. In a bowl, beat cheese smooth. Put butter, eggs and sugar in a saucepan and heat gently, stirring till thickened but do not let boil. Remove from heat and stir in cheese, add currants, essence and lemon rind. Mix well, fill the pastry cases, sprinkle with a little nutmeg and bake 20-25 minutes till well risen and golden. Serve hot or cold. *Jill Frostick*

LITTLE BROMLEY A HUNDRED YEARS AGO

The village population has increased over the last two hundred years since the first Census was taken in 1801. It was the brain child of Charles Abbot, son of Dr Abbot, Rector of All Saints Parish, Colchester. Charles later became Lord Colchester, having been Speaker of The House of Commons. etc. The population figures are -1801 - 395; 1811 - 350; 1821 - 349; 1831 - 383; 1841 - 426; 1851 - 405; 1881 - 371; 1871-400; 1881 - 374; 1891 - 341; 1901-304 The Census taken on 1st April, 1911 is still not available on our computers but these details from it are interesting. Inhabited houses 78 Empty houses 12 Total 90 Houses with less than two rooms 57 Males in the village 161 Females 143 Total 304 In 1891 the total population was 341, therefore the decrease in numbers was 37. 


ST GEORGES CHURCH ROOF REPAIR

The Repair Committee started 2003 full of hope that by the end of the year the repairs to the Hammerbeam Roof and the North Parapet would be completed. Alas, now that we are involved with English Heritage. English Nature (and the nesting season of the bats!). specialists and builders, the wheels seem to turn ever more and more slowly. At the beginning of the year English Heritage offered us a grant of £35,000. This, added to the sums collected through nine years of fund-raising and the sums promised to us by other grant-making bodies, meant there was enough (just enough) money in the Fund to GO AHEAD. A condition of our accepting the grant from English Heritage was that further investigatory work should first be done on the stonework of the north parapet, towards which we have been offered a possible £16,000. You

will have noticed the scaffolding which appeared in the church in July of this year to enable the stone conservator to investigate the condition of the north parapet. His report and recommendations have been accepted by English Heritage: unfortunately, one recommendation is that all outside repairs should be delayed until April 2004, because some of the materials to be used are vulnerable to frost. We still hoped that the interior work might be done this autumn but the cost of erecting and removing scaffolding twice and the spreading out of the work makes this much more expensive than having all the work delayed until the spring of 2004, so sadly the committee has agreed to the latter.

We very much hope that English Heritage will increase our grant to meet the extra costs of the delayed work. We have also arranged two fund raising events to try to ensure that we will be able to pay all our costs when repairs eventually begin.

Please note the dates in your diaries. On Saturday, 13th March, 2004 Ian Ray and the Colchester institute Chamber Choir have agreed to give a concert in St George's Church. If it is as beautiful as the Christmas Concert they gave us two years ago, you should not miss it! On Saturday, 1st May, 2004 the Eastern Angles Theatre Company is bringing its new play "The Edge of the Land" to Great Bromley Village Hall. Supper as usual beforehand! We look forward to your support for these very enjoyable and worthwhile evenings. *Anne Clapham*



Dear Parishioner, The Christian Church is growing in numbers! That's the good news. The bad news is that in the West and in this country, the number of people in Church on a Sunday morning is declining. Wonderfully in these parishes over the past six years we have seen an increase in commitment. More adults have made public commitment to God and Jesus Christ than have died, but only just. To be open and honest too. we have seen less people coming to Church Sunday by Sunday because of the recent changes in service times and venues. Basically people who used to come every week now come once a fortnight. Yet we are a thriving Church even if we are only treading water numerically. Both Church buildings will see considerable investment in money terms for the present and future generations to worship in during this year. Our teenage group, the MAGI, and youngsters in the Sunday Church Club grow in numbers, involvement and commitment which is a source of great encouragement and blessing. Our adult groups, the Housechurches, continue to meet for fellowship and study in Christian living. Sunday by Sunday, day by day, praise is given to God here and people are attempting to live out their lives in His service. I say attempting quite deliberately, because as Christians we do not claim to have all the answers and be the ones who are good and holy. Indeed, most people come to Church because of an awareness of their shortcomings and failings and a desire to learn more about self; to try and do something about it in the context of something greater than humanity, the one we call God. Over the next few months I shall be holding fast track courses on being a Christian. If you feel you'd like to know more, without making any commitment, or could do with a refresher course to bring you up to speed and help you find a way back in. please get in touch with me. We have various clubs and organisations as well as sporting clubs. We have a school, a playgroup, a toddler group. We have a church.


However, in recent times the village has lost the youth groups that used to be run and also the pantomime has gone the way of the carnival. These have mainly ceased through lack of committee members, leaders or general support. Various one-off events were sadly cancelled last year for much the same reasons.

The latest and most disturbing loss comes next month when we sadly lose our Post Office Stores which Michael has run so efficiently the last few years. What does this say for our village and its future? The loss of any one organisation or amenity may of itself not appear significant but taken together they can radically change, or significantly erode, the glorious sense of community which we are privileged to share.

There are a number of interesting and exciting events advertised this month. Don't forget to mark their dates in your diary.

The sense of community can, of course, spread wider than one's village. Two recent national examples are the Golden Jubilee celebrations and the Rugby World Cup. There are other celebrations which are organised at a local level but which occur on a worldwide basis. George and I have just attended our second Burns evening. The most wonderful excuse for dressing up to spend an evening of laughter and conversation with friends. Also to enjoy the traditional sound of the bagpipes which begin the evening by piping everyone to their tables before the piper processes in front of the important people of the evening to the top table. There is the piping in of the haggis and the whisky before the eating of same followed finally by the speeches. There is "The Immortal Memory" about Burns with quotes from his poetry, some of which is incomprehensible to me but just the sound of the words is enough beauty. There are his songs to be heard and various toasts to be drunk. It is a wonderful way to spend an evening and a marvellous annual celebration.

The Welsh celebrate St David's Day on 1st March and the Irish, famously in New York but also elsewhere, St Patricks Day on 17th March. St Georges Day on 23rd April, which is also Shakespeare's birthday, passes almost unnoticed except in Stratford-upon-Avon. Although we have the May Bank Holiday about 10 days later why is it that in England we do not have a day of celebration of our national identity which in turn would strengthen local communities. The trouble is, being English myself, I am not sure whether I am allowed to ask whether the English are losing their sense of identity. *Leonie Henderson*



CLOSURE OF GREAT BROMLEY POST OFFICE AND STORES

It is with sadness and regret that I have to announce that the Great Bromley Post Office will close at 1.00pm on 19th March, 2004 and the Shop at 5.00pm on 22nd March, 2004. This has become necessary for several reasons:

1. The Shop has been up for sale for two years but with no buyer.

2. Trade has declined because not enough local people have been using it. Buying the occasional paper or milk is not enough to keep a shop open.

3. Some staff have recently left and it has not been viable to take on new employees because of the downturn in trade. This has resulted in me working even longer hours and having no time for my family, or a life in general.

4. Many of our Post Office customers who used to have their benefits paid at the Post Office have now decided to have it paid into a bank account. This has resulted in less business for the Post Office and as a result less use of the Shop.

I would like to thank most sincerely those customers who have supported the Shop over the years. I am sorry it has become necessary to close the business. I have given my all and unfortunately if a lot of the village do not use the shop I cannot force them to. The message you hear in rural communities is USE IT OR LOSE IT, and GREAT BROMLEY is no different from elsewhere. *Michael* 5th January, 2004

GREAT BROMLEY VILLAGE HALL CHARITY TRUSTEES

The Village Hall Management Committee were scheduled to meet on Tuesday, 20th January, just too late for the deadline for the Bromley Messenger. Several small items have been sorted out at the Hall recently such as broken toilet seats, door latches that won't latch, stop taps that don't turn off and satisfying the people who want to see whether their tie etc. is properly positioned. All these things take time and funds, but nevertheless have to be seen to. The new Licensing Bill, which has just been through Parliament, will mean changes to the way we obtain entertainment and alcohol licences. In future, to be handled by the local District Council with different provision on the number of occasions certain functions may be held. Also, being effective from this year is the Disabled Discrimination Act (1995). hence the ramped access and exits provided at the Hall in 2001. There is also a new Charities Act and Oil Storage Regulations in the pipeline not too far away! *Bevan Willgress*

KITCHEN CORNER

SOMERSET CHICKEN - another old country recipe. Severs [sic!] 4

4 chicken portions, 2 oz butter, 1 medium onion peeled and diced, 1 oz flour,

³/₄pt milk, ¹/₄ pt dry cider, 4 oz cheddar cheese grated, 1 tblsp English mustard, salt & pepper Set oven at 350 F, 180 C. Melt half butter in frying pan and lightly brown the chicken. Transfer to casserole dish and roast 1 hour till cooked through.

Sauce - Melt rest of butter and cook onion gently till soft and transparent but not browned. Stir in flour and cook 2 mins, then stir in milk and cider, bring to boil and stir till thickened. Remove from heat, add ³/₄ of the cheese, the mustard, salt and pepper. Pour over cooked chicken, sprinkle with rest of cheese and brown under a hot grill or in a hot oven. Serve with jacket potatoes and a green vegetable. *Jill Frostick*

GREAT BROMLEY PARISH COUNCIL

Report of the Great Bromley Parish Council meeting held on 8 January 2004 **PLANNING** The Council considered and agreed no objections to the following planning applications: Greenacre Cattery, Carrington Road 12 additional cat units & reception office. 2 Chase Cottages, Stone Road change to external wall finish.

The Council considered but could not support the following planning applications: 1 Chase Cottages, Stone Road front extension and new porch. A front extension would be inappropriate for this semi-detached house and would obstruct the View from the adjoining property.

Elm Bungalow, Harwich Road, demolition and building three replacement houses. Three bungalows would be an over-development of the site with inadequate off-road car parking spaces.

Tendring District Council has approved the following planning applications:

Bay Cottage, Chase Road East replacement porch.

Field House, Parson's Hill conservatory and stables (conditional on domestic/non-commercial use only).

Planning appeal The District Council has refused permission for a house to be built on a field at Primrose Farm, Hall Road. The Planning Inspectorate will hear the owners appeal in Great Bromley at 10.00 am on 15 June 2004. The Council will speak against the proposal and members of the public will be able to make representations either way.

Great Bromley Post Office The council noted with regret that the post office and shop would be closing in March 2004. This will be a great loss to the community and the Council acknowledges with thanks the significant contribution to village life made by the present subpostmaster and his predecessors. The council is seeking advice, from the Post Office, the Rural Community Council and other agencies, on possible options for maintaining these services. These will be discussed by the council at its February meeting, to which residents are invited.

Poorlands Charity Further to the report in last month's magazine the Trustees now confirm that they were in fact able to make only two grants in January. Funds are therefore still available to assist needy residents of Great Bromley - of any age or circumstances. Suggestions of potential applicants can be made at any time to the Parish Clerk.

Council's 2004/5 budget and precept The Council has set a precept of £12,500 that will be collected through the Council Tax. This is unchanged since 2001/2. Expenditure will be approximately £18,000 drawing partly on the Council's reserves, which presently stand at £13,000. The principal costs will be: general administration - £4250; running costs, including grass and hedge cutting - £3700 ; recreation equipment for young people - £5000, grants to community groups - £1300; a contribution towards the village hall's essential capital works and repairs - £2500.

Applications for community grants should be made to the Clerk. Contractors wishing to tender for grass and hedge cutting should also make themselves known to the Clerk.

Future meetings The next meeting of the Council will be at 7.30 pm on Thursday 12 February 2004 at the Village Hall Great Bromley. As always local residents are invited to attend. Ken Bromfield 10/1/04

GREAT BROMLEY HOUSING NEEDS

Last October the parish council, with the Rural Housing Trust, carried out a survey of Great Bromley's housing needs. Questionnaires were distributed to all of the village's households with over a third responding. Statistically this is a good result and provides sound evidence of housing need. 81% of those who responded wanted to see additional housing in village. Most felt that housing for young people was a priority, although there was support for both older people and families. The majority of these respondents preferred rented accommodation as opposed to housing for sale or shared ownership. 19% of respondents felt that no more houses should be built, as this would increase the size of the village. There are presently 12 councilowned and six housing association properties in Great Bromley. Turn-over has been low with only four of these becoming available in the past three years. in each case there has been considerable demand with typically a dozen applicants. 21 households in the survey indicated that they had either current or future housing needs - particularly for young people. Most of these required subsidised and rented housing, as the private market could not meet their needs. The report concluded that there is a need for 10 new affordable properties in Great Bromley and the Rural Housing Trust is willing in principle to provide these. The parish council at its next meeting will decide whether or not to support this development. If it does the next step will be to determine the precise number, type and location of the new properties. The ratio of rented to shared ownership will also have to be decided. A copy of the survey can be obtained through the Clerk. Residents are welcome to attend the parish council's discussion on 12 February.

PARISH COUNCILLORS' ALLOWANCES

Under the Local Authorities (Members' Allowances) Regulations 2003 parish councillors are entitled to attendance and travel allowances. Information on these allowances, which are set by an Independent Remuneration Panel (IRP), can be obtained from the Clerk or Tendring District Council. Great Bromley Parish Council has received the IRP's recommendations and has decided that its councillors, as community servants, should not receive attendance allowances. However, councillors may claim travel expenses for official duty visits to council approved meetings outside the parish, at the recommended rates of 40/24/20p per mile by car/motorcycle/cycle respectively. Records of the actual expenses paid to individual councillors can be obtained from the Clerk. The total amount of expenses paid will be published annually on 31 March. The above notice has been placed as a requirement of the 2003 Regulations etc Ken Bromfield, Clerk to Great Bromley Parish Council 1 February 2004.



WOMEN'S INSTITUTE

RECTOR EJECTED FROM OFFICE

John Candler, MA. (Jesus College, Cambridge), became Rector of Little Bromley on 28th November, 1656. Candler was ordained by Mr John Fairfax, who was a close friend of the foremost divine in London, Matthew Newcomen, Rector of Dedham. Newcomen was a scholar at Colchester Royal Grammar School. He was ejected from Dedham by the Act of Uniformity on St Bartholomew's Day, 1662, and went on to the English Church at Leyden. John Fairfax delivered Newcomen's funeral oration in 1669. Candler appears to have been in this circle.

Candler "Would not yield to anything that might be capable of being interpreted as casting a Reflection on is former Ordination" but was also ejected from Little Bromley in 1662 and his successor, Isaac Smithies, MA, was installed on 1st May, 1663.

Bishop Reynolds took notice that John Candler was "as good a Minister as he could make him" and told him he could go to preach the Gospel at Petto, (Pettaugh, Suffolk). John "read some of the Common Prayer and now and then wore the surplice but did not use all the ceremonies". He took up the Living of Pettaugh on 25th July, 1664. This suggests that he was quietly found another Living and was persuaded by Bishop Reynolds to conform. He was buried at Pettaugh on 29th December, 1676. Most ejected ministers preached a Fairwell Sermon but to the present there has not been found one given by John at Little Bromley. It is interesting to note that John's father, Matthias Candler, Vicar of Coddenham, Suffolk, was also ejected from that parish in 1652. *John Appleby*

GOOD HOUSEKEEPING

I read with concern the report of the Bromleys PCC meeting in the December magazine that a member of the congregation (yes, it was me - guilty!) had suggested that the PCC "stop giving money to charities". Now I certainly didn't suggest that we stop our normal fund raising efforts for charities. Throughout the year we have specific fund raisers for the Jerusalem Eye Hospital, Christian Aid, St Francis Hospital Katate, the Sisters of Mercy and many other activities, all of which I wholeheartedly support.

My simple suggestion was that since St George's is in such dire financial straits, the policy of automatically passing on 10% of the church's income - from the collection bag; covenanted income, donations in the box, coffee mornings, fetes, festivals and any other money coming inshould be temporarily under review until the situation improves. An enormous amount of time, effort and love goes into raising money both for the upkeep of the church itself and for the outside charities we support. If, in the end, we cannot afford to run our own church, how can we be there for others? Are we too much of a credit-based society to realise that we must meet our own housekeeping bills, first. before we can afford the luxury of giving our basic income away? I am considerably confused to find my suggestions so woefully misunderstood; with an evangelistic priest like Father Nicolas the recent Mission to the Benefice, our housechurches, Outreach, the Magi, the Shoe Box appeal, Churches Together, the mobile phone collections - the list is endless - how can we possibly be misinterpreted as being "self-centred and inward looking"? I think our neighbouring sister churches who have not adopted this policy would be much grieved to find themselves described in such harsh terms! Support outside charities most certainly - enthusiastically and generously - but keep our own house in order first! Caroline McShane

RODNEY TROTTER - RIP - 4th February, 2004

Rodney arrived at The Cross Inn on 30th August, 1999. He was a gift from the regulars at The Flag, Wivenhoe, who had decided that my passion for pigs should extend beyond the china/pottery collectables. On 31st August, 1999, Richard and I arrived at our new permanent residence here and were greeted by a little snout whiffling around the exit to a sty, closely followed by the rest of the stout little body, all adorned in pink bows. Much love at first sight, rolling around in the mud and tickling of tummy ensued. In all honesty, Richard was not quite as captivated as I was, but Rodney's strength of character soon won him over. The first year of our relationship with Rodney involved several escapes (one at 3.00am on Christmas morning!), major growth and arguments with sundry vets about whether or not his tusks had been removed at birth. I discovered I was right when he threw an out-of-character strop over the delay in my handing over a bunch of grapes and he took a swipe at my leg! As he matured, Rodney developed a repertoire of party tricks, which included dove-scaring, footballing, raspberry-stealing, log-rolling and, best of all, log-bonking - which he practised with great energy and tenacity, all the while with an expression of sublime satisfaction! Tusks notwithstanding, Rodney was sweet-natured, gentle, people-friendly and extremely chatty. Visitors were

enchanted to be able to hold a "conversation" with him and I eventually learned to make a double batch of Yorkshire puds for my Sunday lunchers - 2 for them, 2 for Rodney. His impeccable manners were displayed when accepting polos, ginger biscuits or other delicacies with the edge of his lips, never once injuring tiny fingers proffering goodies through the mesh of his pen. His happiest moments were spent lying in his wallow, with the sunshine washing over his huge pot belly; if some kindly soul would give him a good going over with the scrubbing brush - well, ecstasy!



Rodney died this morning, as peacefully and serenely as he had lived. He was a big old boy and his heart was weak, so he just went to sleep last night and didn't wake up again. The best way to go - especially for an animal classified as "livestock". His last meal comprised all the titbits he loved best, and when we found him, he was tucked up in his straw. no sign of distress or pain. his head resting on a straw pillow. So why am I writing an obituary for a pig? Quite simply because I loved him and I miss him and I am sad beyond telling. Rodney brought much happiness and tremendous pleasure not only into our lives, but also to those of his many visitors - especially the children who regularly came after school and during the holidays to give him treats. Rodney was therapeutic - so many times I've glanced from the kitchen window to see someone leaning over his pen to scratch his ears and have a word with him. or just lean on the fence to watch him and take time out of their busy day to enjoy his company. Yes, he was only a pig, but a pig of great character and personality. Rodney belonged to a "lesser" species but he asked for precious little and gave so much in return - there's a lesson there, somewhere - isn't there? *Brenda Perry*

Also added to the charge was that of taking away several parcels of hay from the haystack of Thomas Paisey of Great Bentley. Also at court was Thomas Parsey (before it was Paisey), the yeoman of Great Bentley. Thomas Mannock, Lord of the Manor, was not only on the Bench but also appeared as a witness. What happened? GARDENER'S CORNER FOR MARCH

It has been a very mild winter so far and everything is well advanced in growth. I have clematis which has four inch long shoots and buds on, so I hope we don't get a frost to kill them off. **LAWNS:** Cutting will be in full swing this month should we get a dry spell. Save the cuttings in a

black plastic bag to mulch your rose bushes and soft fruit i.e. gooseberries. blackcurrants and raspberries. **SHRUBS:** Prune hardy fuchsia to two inches from ground level. Shorten Buddleia main growth by half, back to a pair of new shoots. **ROSES:** Finish pruning by the end of the month **CHRYSANTHEMUMS**: Take cuttings of summer flowering types from new shoots on stools **DAHLIAS:** Start tubers into growth. Sow seeds late in the month in trays of compost - keep damp - cover with a sheet of newspaper and a piece of glass. *Frank Griffiths*

GREAT BROMLEY VILLAGE HALL CHARITY TRUSTEES

The Village Hall Management Committee met on Tuesday, 20th January. The meeting closed some half hour later than normal as many important items were discussed and acted upon. The Hall's financial situation was reviewed and was deemed to be satisfactory considering the large amount that has been spent on essential repairs, upgrading and maintenance of the Hall recently. We have been grateful for the assistance given us over the past three years by the Parish Council in these matters. Protective Multiple Earthing (PME) has been provided at the Hall, bringing our electrical system up to a good current standard- Also, our emergency lighting system is of the latest requirements, having been renewed last year. We are looking at the provision of an outdoor play area for Playgroup use in the summer months, also further work to improve the car parking area following up the project carried out last year. The stage area needs to be examined and improved.

Fund raising must, however, continue and we are looking at a musical evening organised by Beryl Hurst probably in May: more details next month. Our Christmas Fayre, which last November raised £955 to be shared between the Hall and the Church was well supported. This year we hope to hold another, probably in November, in aid of the Hall and the Women's Institute. However, we appreciate that several organisations in the village are trying to raise fund i.e. the Church, School, Playgroup, Cricket Club, Cheshire Home, Hamilton Lodge etc. and should all take care in positioning the date of our events.

The Rural Community Council of Essex, through their Village Halls Forum, have also been raising a petition to Downing Street to try and have more Lottery money earmarked for village halls, which currently are at a disadvantage.

The Council considered but objected to the following planning applications: Marks Farm, Frating Road - extension (objection on the grounds of over-development) Southview, Frating Road - extension and garage (objection on the grounds of over-development) Land between Fieldside and Ettone, Frating Road - three new properties (objection on the grounds of over-development). *Tendring District Council has approved the following planning applications:* Meyrick, Colchester Road - extension and conservatory. 2 Chase Cottages, Stone Road - change to external wall finish. Greenacre Cattery, Carrington Road - 12 additional cat units & office.

Tendring District Council has refused the following planning application: 1 Chase Cottages, Stone Road - front extension and new porch.

Highways, footpaths and parking We understand that the B1029 bridge over the A120 will not be repaired until August 2004. Until then the one-way traffic and temporary lights will continue to operate. The bridge is not expected to close whilst repairs are carried out. The application to have Footpath 25 diverted has been withdrawn. The Church Meadow car park is inevitably a

little slippery after prolonged rain so drivers are encouraged to exercise caution and manoeuvre on the limited gravelled surface where possible.

Environmental matters Following a suggestion by a resident the council is buying some mechanical "litter pickers" for volunteers who wish to collect litter from roadside verges. Please let the Clerk know if you would like to have one! Concern has been expressed at dog fouling at various locations in the village. We do have three dog bins and the council is placing collection bags at each of these to assist owners in clearing-up the mess. Otherwise be prepared to contemplate a fine of up to £1000!

Great Bromley Post Office The council was pleased to hear that new people will be taking over the post office and store from late-March. It wishes them every success with this important service to the community. The council encourages everyone to use these facilities where they can. Without adequate public support they will not survive.

Community grants The council has awarded community grants totalling £1180 to the following organisations: the Bromley Messenger, the Royal British Legion, St Georges church (for grass cutting), Tendring Citizens Advice Bureau, Hamilton Lodge and Foundry Court, Manningtree.

Affordable housing for Great Bromley In February's magazine we reported on the outcome of the Rural Housing Trust's survey of Great Bromley's housing needs. The council has considered this report and supports its recommendations that up to ten new affordable homes should be built in the village. These properties will need to be located on one or more sites outside but abutting the present housing settlement limits and near to existing amenities such as the school, shop, post office, pub, church etc. The council considered alternative locations in Great Bromley and agreed to recommend that these should be either near the existing Lakewood development or/and near the Meadow Close estate. When the Trust has identified suitable sites it will commission a further more detailed survey to determine the precise number and types of properties needed by the potential occupants. It will also agree the balance between rented and shared ownership homes.

NEWS FROM GREAT BENTLEY SURGERY THE HOLLIES, THE GREEN, GT BENTLEY

The main news this month is that, after a lot of thought and listening to comments from a number of patients. we have decided to adjust our "rules" for booking appointments. From 1st March, whilst keeping to our promise to offer everyone an appointment within 48 hours, we are going to be a bit more relaxed about allowing bookings further in advance. There will be a very limited number of slots that can be booked up to two weeks before the date. This should enable people who have a lot of other commitments to plan things more easily. Staff will also be allowed to book most of our other routine appointments up to 72 hours beforehand. We understand that the 48 hour rule had made things a bit complicated sometimes, especially for people who rely upon lifts from friends or community transport to get the surgery. This relaxation of restrictions should make life easier for them. Many thanks, incidentally, to everyone who offers constructive criticism or new ideas to help improve our systems. Comments and suggestions are always welcome, even if sometimes it isn't practical to act on them. Talking of criticism, we have heard recently that it is often difficult to get through to the surgery on the telephone on Monday mornings. Our capacity for taking telephone calls is limited, so it would help if patients would avoid ringing about non-urgent matters on Mondays. Mid-week is a lot quieter and you would get much quicker service. We still get a few people wanting to order prescriptions over the telephone, which also makes it harder to get through to make an appointment. Just a reminder that we don't take requests over the 'phone. We need them in writing or, of course you can put them through our door or in the box in the Waiting Room. The surgery is a brighter and more colourful place now, thanks to a few very kind people. You might have noticed the marvellous paintings on the corridor walls in the new part of the surgery They are all by members of the Great Bentley Art Club and to my untutored eye, they look remarkably good. It is amazing to find out that there are so many artistically talented people around the village. As will be seen from the notices in our Waiting Room, all the paintings are actually for sale. We no idea if any of them would constitute a good investment, but they would certainly make a terrific addition to anyone's wall. We also now have two superb tapestries in the building, both done by Brenda Burton. She has given them to the surgery in memory of her late husband, Bob, who died last year. Again, the talent and a remarkable degree of patience are obvious for all to see. The tapestries aren't for sale by the way. They are going to grace our walls permanently. NEWS FROM ARDLEIGH SURGERY THE SURGERY, DEDHAM ROAD, ARDLEIGH

New GP Registrar Dr Sajid Rahman, started work at the surgery at the beginning of February as our new GP Registrar. Sajid has been a doctor in Colchester General Hospital since 1999 and has worked in various departments including a year as a Specialist Registrar in Diabetes and Endocrine. He is married with one child. His wife is also a doctor and works as a Paediatrician in Colchester General Hospital. Dr Rahman will be with the Ardleigh practice for a year. **New GP Contract** The government has negotiated a new NHS contract with GPs which is being implemented as from 1 April 2004. The new contract will be with the practice rather than an individual GP. It will introduce a completely new way of funding general practice in that it will be practice based rather than dependent upon the number of GPs in a practice. The funding system will still be based on the list size of the practice, but, will be simpler and more flexible. The new contract will also reward practices for providing a quality service in terms of the monitoring of patients with chronic diseases and other 'good practice' indicators. The organisation of the 'out of hours' service will become the responsibility of the local Primary Care Trust rather than the practice. The PCT will be providing more information about these changes in the media in the coming months.

Reviewing the appointment system Ardleigh Surgery is reviewing the efficiency of its appointment system to see if the practice can improve access for patients. It is carrying out audits during March to investigate if the practice is consistently meeting the Government target of being able to offer an appointment to see a GP within 48 hours. It will also be carrying out a survey in the surgery to obtain patient views on their experience of the appointment system. The practice will also be carrying out a more general patient survey about the quality of its services later on in the year.


Dear Parishioner,

THE PERFECT LAWN?

Frank Griffiths last month told us that lawns should be mowed more regularly but an article in the newspaper reported recently on the subject of immaculate lawns. It seems that thanks to GM and the golf industry gardens are to have a GM makeover to make them easier to run - grass in lawns will grow slower and will only need mowing maybe twice a month, hedges and shrubs too will be slower growing making for easier maintenance, roses will bloom longer, other plants will be pollen free easing hay fever sufferers. There has even been advice as to how to rid lawns of worm casts. But how will this affect the delicate balance? Insects, especially bees. need pollen as indeed do birds and birds and animals feed on insects and worms and other parts of plants. Also where will that leave the amusement I have watching the goings-on in the garden? The muscovies at this time of year like nothing better than to patrol the garden for hidden insects and grubs. They spend ages kneading one spot in a sort of stamping dance before suddenly pouncing with their beaks and extracting, with a pleased waggle of their tail, some juicy item of livestock. The mossy areas of the lawn are most favoured and whilst removing the insects they remove quantities of moss at the same time which is a great help to us. Another aerator of the lawn throughout the winter is Talpa europaea (the mole) who, over the past three mild winters, has managed to tunnel through every square inch of garden. This winter they have concentrated their activities close to the kitchen, the bird table which is in danger of being dug up and around the sitting room. Our "lawn" rather resembles a bomb site than a smooth luxuriant grassy swathe. We have over the years tried various methods of mole prevention the latest being a sonic probe which is quite successful but since its range is limited to a 30' diameter we really need a large number to keep the entire garden clear; I have caught two moles in the past with gloved hands when they foolishly surfaced near where I have been working (or not as the case may be) before walking them some distance away to new territories although I am sure that were they tagged I should find them back in the garden at a later date. There was an occasion when a duck spotted a mole above ground and gave chase. Duck followed mole (both run fast!) across the garden until the mole dived underground leaving a bemused duck in its wake.

Green woodpeckers are a frequent visitor to the garden all year round probing the ground with their long beaks in search of ants etc. I am always pleased to see them although also wary for during the winter they are liable to bore into beehives depriving the bees of their winter stores. Starlings are a noisy visitor descending in flocks in search of leatherjackets - a gardener's friend indeed.

The biggest spring aerator spotted as the weather improves and the grass begins to grow is the last of the lawn wanderers. He is to be seen with shovel in hand wandering in a haphazard fashion across the green removing as he goes excess earth from the molehills to other areas of the garden before hammering the remains of the hills using the shovel before doing his own furious stamping dance just like the ducks, but which undoes their good works in the aerating line, in an attempt to level the ground in readiness for the lawn mower to be brought of its winter retirement. *Leonie Henderson*

YOUR HOUSE - MAYBE

From time to time I receive an enquiry about a house in Great Bromley. There are several ways of finding out about your house but there may not be much or any history attached to it. The deeds of the place may be useful although sometimes the older documents have been destroyed and only a short resume exists. I use the Census Returns from 1801 to 1901. The Electoral Register and Roll books also help. Estate maps, Land Tax returns, Wills and Auction and Sale

Catalogues may be available and Essex Record Office either at Chelmsford or Colchester may have one concerning your property. Essex Record Office also has an internet site called SEAX. Ordnance Survey maps, 1844-1895, should clearly record every property in the parish. Farm buildings were returned in The National Farm Survey, 1941-1943, and are at The Public Record Office. Crops and livestock are all listed. Local newspapers can have a wealth of information and are on microfiche and take hours of searching. Maybe there will be a nil result! If you want a text book I recommend "Tracing the history of your house - a guide to sources", published 1901 by the Public Record Office, author Nick Barrett. There are many others. *John Appleby*

Environmental matters The District Council has been asked to supply 10 flower tubs for the period June- September 2004, to be placed at the same locations as last year. The council has appointed contractors to undertake grass and hedge-cutting at the following sites: Church Meadow, Hare Green recreation ground, the closed cemetery and land adjacent to Brook Street. The council has also contributed towards the cost of maintaining St George's churchyard. Following complaints by local residents the county highways department is investigating the use of footpath 17 (between the Cheshire Home and the A120) by motorcycles.

Recreation Ground The council has been awarded a £1,000 grant under the Rural Activity Scheme. This will go towards the cost of a youth shelter and seats, which the council is purchasing for the recreation ground. The council has also arranged for more trees to be planted. Ruts have appeared in the field. Until these have been filled in care should be taken when walking on the uneven surface.

Community grants The council has awarded a community grant to the Tendring Local History Recorders.

Audit The external auditors report of the councils 2002/3 accounts has been received and considered satisfactory. A copy can be obtained from the clerk.

1 oz (25g) fresh parsley, finely chopped
1 pint (570ml) milk
Salt and pepper
Garnish: paprika
Bring stock to boil in large pan. add onion, celery and potato.
Simmer 10 minutes. Add corn and paprika, cook further 10
minutes on gentle heat. Stir in the parsley. In separate pan



GARDENER'S CORNER FOR APRIL

By the end of the month all roses should be pruned and fertilizer sprinkled around. Plant **GLADIOLI** corms in groups. Keep **CLEMATIS** shoots tied into their supports until they can cling on themselves. Where **SPRING BULBS** have become congested - as soon as the flowers have died down - dig up and separate and replant. DO NOT cut off the leaves. **ANNUAL FLOWER SEEDS** can be sown this month - sow in trays and prick out when they have two leaves. Sow **SWEET PEAS** as soon as they have three pairs of leaves pinch out - the growing tip, they will then produce side shoots. Take the strongest shoot and pinch out any other that has formed. For best results with show blooms grow up a single cane, pinching out all side shoots and cutting off tendrils. NOTE: be careful not to pinch out the flower buds as these grow out from a leaf axil the same as the side shoot. *Frank Griffiths*

"What the sea takes away from one part of the land, it returns to another. So trawlerman Isaac has told his nice Miriam. But sometimes the sea is greedy, as it was on the night of 31 January. 1953, mercilessly flooding the east coast of England. claiming over 300 lives and leaving 21,000 people homeless. In one of those eastern towns on the edge of the land, Miriam 's grandmother was swept away in her bed.

The sea figures prominently in Alan Franks' new play, its relentless, implacable pounding of the shores mirrored by the restlessness of the central figure Miriam. Her sad story is told in flashback and we begin as the older Miriam struggles to come to terms with her past. It is 1953,

and Miriam gets pregnant. The father gets a scholarship to Cambridge, disappearing from her life, to be seen again years later as a successful TV historian. She is shunted off to relatives in Kent for her confinement. Within days of the birth, Miriam's daughter, Miranda, is adopted by a couple from two villages away. Unable to cope, Miriam is caught in a downward spiral. Miriam is fictional, but Alan Franks has clearly been affected by the true stories he has unearthed of the many hundreds of "Miriams" who gave up their babies for adoption in the decades after the Second World War.

The production has sensitive direction from Ivan Cutting, a clever set by Rachel Downey, and a wonderful score by Roger Eno. There are faultless performances from Eleanor Harley and Anstey Thomas as the younger and older Miriam, Simon Bubb as the feckless father Billy and Patrick Knox as Billy's father. Highly recommended."

Dear Parishioner, Here at S Mary's and S George's we have a thriving teenage group who meet regularly in the Rectory for discussions on what it is to be a Christian. Recently the leaders and I chatted about taking them to see the new Mel Gibson film, based on the events of Maundy Thursday and Good Friday. Having read many reviews and how it is creating a media storm in the States it seems sensible to go as a group of Christians because it is going to have an impact here. My concerns were for the apparent levels of violence during the two hours, not for the youngsters, as most of them experience worse on the television, but for me! So it was with a sense of relief that I discovered it has an 18 certificate so they are all too young to take. Maybe I'll see it when it comes out on video and I can control my viewing of it! Don't get me wrong, I'm not trying to hide in a fairy tale picture of a blond haired, blue eyed Jesus suffering a rather antiseptic death. I have no illusions of what scourging was like, what having thorns forced onto one's head, carrying a cross bar through narrow busy streets. being nailed to a tree and left to die, probably from suffocation, must be like. It was brutal, it was violent. Death must have been longed for and come as a relief for Jesus himself and his loved ones who watched on. Yet we Christians call it "Good Friday"? Indeed we do because we look back on the events and see the ghastly violent experience of man's cruelty in the context of Jesus rising from the dead three days later. In the knowledge that it transformed ordinary people's lives to the extent that many of them were prepared to die themselves rather than say "no, it didn't happen". We look on the day and see our God making the ultimate sacrifice rather than fighting back, being extremely powerful in saying love is the only answer to humanity's problems. anything else or less will not do. I know this world can be cruel. I don't need to be reminded of that in a cinema, because Sunday by Sunday, day by day, my faith calls me to face it, accept it and in the strength of the Holy Spirit try as is humanly possible to rise above it and live, just as Jesus did. May God bless you this Holy Week and Easter and give you his loving presence to live life to the full in this world of ours. Fr Nicolas.

FUNKY FOOD

EASTER EGGS



Ingredients (makes 10 eggs)

175g (6oz) ground almonds 100g (4oz) honey 225g (8oz) icing sugar 1 egg white vellow food colouring chocolate vermicelli

Put the almonds into a bowl and add the honey. Mix them together so that you have a sticky paste. Divide it into ten piece. Leave them to one side. Put the icing sugar into another bow. Beat the egg white so it begins to get frothy. Add it to the icing sugar, together with a few drops of yellow food colouring. Mis well and divide it into ten pieces. Take a piece of the almond paste and flatten it in the palm of your hand. Put some of the icing sugar mixture on top and carefully mould the paste round it so that it covers the icing sugar. Make the paste into an egg shape and roll it in the chocolate vermicelli. When all the eggs are done wrap them separately in clingfilm.

CHOCOLATE FISH

In France it is traditional to exchange chocolate fish instead of eggs. Before making these fish you must make a mould.

You will need a strip of stiff drawing paper, about 2cm - 30cm. (Fig A) Fold the paper in half and then make two more folds in the doubled ends. (Fig B)





GREAT BROMLEY'S POST OFFICE

Having been asked for some details of the Great Bromley Post Office I am pleased to give these details.

William White's Directory of Essex, dated 1848 relates that Letters to the village come from Colchester which must mean there was a Post Office here. There were three Shopkeepers listed, Cornelius Byham, John Eagle and Daniel Sargent. It would appear that John Carrington, a farmer, was postmaster.

The Post Office Essex Directory of 1859 says, "Postal Orders are issued but not paid at the following - Great Bromley; Little Bromley." This was the same in 1901 when the Essex Almanac was printed.

John Carrington, Farmer, is definitely Postmaster in the 1855 and 1859 Kelly's Directory of Essex and this name is repeated in the 1863 edition of William Whites Directory. George Young, Senior, took over as Kelly records in the 1870 and 1878 volumes. Mrs Mary Young, his wife, took over in 1881 and was in command until 1912. Husband George became the postman. In 1882 George Young is registered as "Receiver of Post and letters arrive from Manningtree at 8.30 am; dispatched thereto at 5.45 pm. On Sundays, letters are dispatched at 10.30 am. The nearest Money Order Office is at Manningtree".

Her son George Young, Shopkeeper, was Sub-Postmaster from 1913 to 1939. Charles Deere, General Stores, was George's successor and served the community until __.

The Pillar Boxes at Hare Green, Balls Green and Bromley Cross were installed in 1912 and are still there today. The 1922 Kelly's Directory tells us "Post Office - George Young Sub-

Postmaster. Letters arrive from Colchester via Ardleigh. The nearest Money Order and Telegraph Offices are at Little Bromley and Elmstead, nearly 3 miles distant."

In 1937 Letters ex Colchester came via Ardleigh and the nearest Money Order Office was at Little Bromley.

Charles and Peggy Deere took over business in 1949 and were in office until 1981. The new Post Office and Stores was opened and serviced by Charles Pirie who has continued as postman.

In 1986 Barbara and the late Michael Hall became Sub- postmasters and Michael was renowned for his butchery department in the Stores. The last holder of the office of Sub- postmaster was Michael Beckett who began work in 1997. Unluckily this Post Office was scheduled, like several others in the district for closure and it finally closed at 5pm. on Wednesday, 24th March, 2004. It will be a great loss to the village and customers will have to either use that at Elmstead or Ardleigh. The old Post Office building, once occupied by Charles and Peggy Deere, is over 350 years old. The unusually shaped front door suggests its connections with the church and may have been the original rectory. Mrs Vera Newton was village post women for almost 20 years and retired 29th September, 1975 aged 63. She only asked for one day's leave in all her service and cycled some 5 miles per day. She had nine children and 18 grand-children. Photographs of some of the Post Office Staff are included in "Where the Broom Grows, Great Bromley in Old Photographs" by the writer. *John Appleby*

The going rate is about £1 per week but I have heard rumours of much higher delivery charges.

I would like to thank most sincerely everyone who supported the Post Office and Shop and wish you all the best for the future. There will be a Garage Sale on 1st May for the sale of the surplus shop stock at discounted prices. Tea and coffee will be on sale in aid of the Church Roof Fund. *Michael Beckett.*

Planning *The Council considered and agreed no objections to the following planning application:* Southview: Frating Road - extension and garage (resubmission following refusal of earlier application - see below)

Tendring District Council has approved the following planning applications: Land adjacent to Old Police House, Chase Road - new house and garage (approved with conditions). Spring Farm, Frating Road - Orange mobile phone pylon.

Tendring District Council has refused the following planning applications: Southview, Frating Road - extension and garage (earlier application). Arcan, Colchester Road - two storey extension and garage.

Annual Great Bromley Assembly

The parish council's Annual General Meeting will be held at the village Hall at 7.00pm on Thursday, 13th May. This will be followed at 7.30pm by the Annual Parish Assembly. Residents are welcome to attend either of these meetings. This is your opportunity to hear what the parish council has been doing on your behalf during the past 12 months and how it spent £12,500 of council taxpayers' money. The council will also be pleased to respond to any questions, complaints or suggestions from residents.

Hare Green Recreation Ground The council appreciates that the village has only limited facilities for young people. Therefore, with the help of external grants, it is installing further recreation equipment at the Hare Green playing field. There is now a ball wall and youth shelter, and a hard surface for skate boarding and ball games is planned. Trees have been planted and the grass and hedges are cut regularly. The play equipment for younger children is being enhanced so that it meets current safety standards. The council hopes that these new facilities for young people will help reduce the current incidents of vandalism at the playing field. These include damage to the existing equipment and the regular depositing of broken glass, (please contact Chris Phillips it you can assist with the identifying the culprits). The council would welcome any further ideas and offers of assistance with youth activities.

Motorcycles: the owner of the land being used as a motor cycle track has been warned that pedestrians must be Given safe and easy access to Footpath 17 at all times. Anyone experiencing difficulty in using this footpath is asked to report the matter to the Highways' Footpath Officer, Sally Battrum (tel: 01206 573353).

Mobile police station: the police now say that demand does not justify a mobile police station visiting Great Bromley. The station will however visit the following nearby sites:

Near Tokely Road, Frating: 1300-1400, 1st and 3rd Tuesdays monthly.

Village Hall, Ardleigh: 0900-1000, 2nd and 4th Tuesdays monthly.

GARDENER'S CORNER FOR MAY

Tomatoes: Why not plant some tomatoes in hanging baskets. The best type to grow are "Gardener's Delight", "Tumbler F1" and "Red Pendulina". TWO plants to a basket.

Beans: It you are growing Runner Beans up the canes try planting sweet peas here and there among them. The colourful flowers and scent will attract the bees which will then go on to the beans to give extra pollination. **Pruning:** Forsythla and ornamental currants should be pruned as the flowers have faded. You can use the prunings as cuttings. **Fuchsias:** Take cuttings - cut just below a leaf node, remove the bottom pair of leaves, fill a 3" pot with a gritty free-draining compost, insert cuttings around the edge of the pot, firm in and water. Place in a greenhouse or cold frame or failing that a kitchen window sill will do nicely. *Frank Griffiths*

The appearance of the stage has been under discussion and a working party has set about cleaning down the walls and ceiling. Fortunately, the main boiler for the heating and hot water system lasted until the Easter break period, but it was in a poor condition. THE UNITED PARISHES OF ARDLEIGH AND THE BROMLEYS

Dear Parishioner, When Patience Lyampali, 37, looks at her youngest daughter Gertrude, it is with something close to longing. Patience tested HIV positive two years ago and knows that her time with her six children is limited. She has no access to life prolonging anti-retroviral drugs. Patience lives in Chombela village, close to Zambia's capital, Lusaka. "We are short of food" she says, explaining that her husband died six years ago. "I cannot grow enough maize for my family. we struggle with such a tiny amount of food. School fees are a real problem for me. Because I am sick, I cannot go out to work." Life is a struggle but Vincent Mulenga, a volunteer who visits regularly with provisions and basic medicines provided by the Catholic Archdiocese of Lusaka, has made the time that she has left a little more bearable. He helps with housework and collects firewood. He also takes the time to sit down and talk. "We talk quite openly and freely" he says. "When Patience was first diagnosed, there was some separation from her neighbours. Now the stigma and fear are a little less, as people are more educated. Patience still needs to feel that she can speak to someone who understands without feeling bad. I am a peasant farmer myself. but i do this because I am a Christian and feel called to help."

An estimated 21 percent of adults are HIV-positive in Zambia where the healthcare system has deteriorated rapidly over the past few years. Volunteers like Vincent play a vital role in filling the gaps left by the lack of basic primary healthcare services. Supported by Christian Aid, the Catholic Association of Lusaka provides training for volunteers. They are unpaid but given support from qualified staff, free medical schemes and clothing to protect themselves during visit.
