LEST WE FORGET

Over the centuries thousands of men - and many women - have given their lives fighting for our country. They fought for various causes, some just and possibly some not so just, as well as in defence of their country, monarchy and ultimately their family.

The Act of Remembrance as we know it today began after the First World War and although it symbolically remembers those who fought and fell in the two World Wars, it now encompasses other conflicts so that we can remember those who died in them as well. Some people suggest that Remembrance Sunday should be brought to a halt - we have remembered long enough. How can that be when our men and women in the Armed Services are to this day being required by our leaders, whether we agree with them or not, to risk their lives in our name? We should honour them and remember them on 11th November and on Remembrance Sunday each year.

The world now is affected by terrorism and the fear of it. The current mess that is Iraq has almost certainly been brought about through the 'war' on terror; war increasingly involves civilians as well as soldiers. There is little hand to hand fighting as in previous wars; it is now conducted more and more from the air and by missiles from the sea and the land

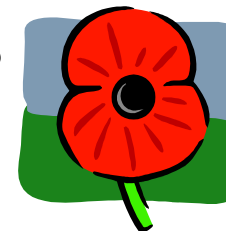
- all very remote. Space may one day be used - what a horrible thought.

My nephew, aged 18, joined the Life Guards this year. He is now a fully paid up member of the fighting force of our country. One person who learned of his career decision told me that his parents should have prevented him from joining the army. How do parents prevent their adult children from doing something they have been determined to do for many years? In any event how far do parents' rights go in this regard and when do they end? Indeed if everyone was persuaded against joining the Forces our country would be left defenceless. Both my great uncle who died on the first day of the Somme and my father who was the sole survivor of a crash in the Stirling bomber he was in would have been proud of him, as we all should be of anyone serving our country.

So let us wear our poppy with pride and not forget on Remembrance Day the men and women who have sacrificed their lives that we and our descendants might have a better place in which to live.

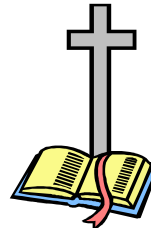

She was a faithful member of the Friendship Club, the WI and the Pantomime Group being closely involved in the costume department and also acting as the official Prompter. With Stan they both took on the responsibility of being caretakers of the Village Hall spending a great deal of time and effort in their care of it. Loving children as she did, it is no surprise that she spent time in St George's School helping children with their reading.

As well as her village interests, Margery was deeply involved in the life of St. George's Church. Over the years she was an enthusiastic member of the Church Choir as well as being a Flower Arranger and Sacristan responsible for dressing the Altar, washing the Altar linen and caring for the choir robes. With all her other interests Margery found time to be a member of the Parochial Church Council and for a time was the Church Treasurer. Both she and Stan were very much involved in the work of the Seven Rivers Home from the time it opened taking great pleasure in talking to, and helping, the residents whenever she could. It was therefore fitting that Margery was able to spend her last weeks being cared for herself by the staff of the Home.

Many of us will have happy memories of a lovely lady who did not spare herself in her activities in the village and church, as well as being a caring homemaker and a devoted wife, mother and grandmother.

PARISH COUNCIL NEWS

GREAT BROMLEY PARISH COUNCIL

Report of the Great Bromley Parish Council meeting held on 14 October 2004

PLANNING

The Council considered and agreed no objections to the following planning applications:

Manheim Car Auctions, Colchester Road, Frating – additional building works and remodelling of existing site.

The Hollies, Colchester Road – kitchen extension.

Land between Fieldside and Etton, Frating Road – two new bungalows.

The Council considered but objected to the following planning applications:

Old Courthouse Inn, Harwich Road – removal of an existing condition of planning approval to allow use of residential accommodation separate and independent of the public house.

Old Courthouse Inn, Harwich Road – increase width of vehicular access from the B1029 by 2.5 m.

Tendring District Council has approved the following planning applications:

Old Police House, Chase Rd – conservatory plus changes to garage/store.

Tendring District Council has refused the following planning applications:

Barn adjacent to Portlands, Harwich Road – erection of cart lodge.

Site previously known as 'Baldwins', Frating Rd – two new detached houses & garages.

Motorcycles

The county highways enforcement officer is investigating the obstruction of the footpath. The landowner has been asked by the district council to submit a fresh application for planning approval, as the original one did not provide enough information on the proposal. The district council's development committee is therefore unlikely to consider the new application before December or January. The county council has made strong representations against approval.

NEXT MEETING

The next meeting of the Council will be at 7.30 pm on Thursday 11 November 2004 at the Village Hall Great Bromley.

Tendring replacement local plan: potential private development sites

The district council has forwarded three proposals by private developers to the parish council for its views and those of the local community. These are at the following sites:

- > 70 ha of land between Hare Green, Balls Green and Frating ('Oasis' site) for employment, community and residential purposes, including a minimum of 1000 new houses, (reference 6543).
- > 0.67 ha of land at the Cheshire Home for either conversion or 20 new houses, (reference 7852).
- > 1.38 ha of land behind the council houses on Harwich Road for 41 new houses, (reference 2378).

The parish council will discuss these proposals at its next meeting on 11 November and when it will agree its initial response to the district council. Local residents are invited to attend and make their views known. The schemes can be scrutinised at the Tendring District Council's Weeley offices by quoting the references above.

MALAWI

Last year I went to beautiful Malawi (*The Messenger*, May 2003) staying with my niece who is an acupuncturist and her husband, a Professor of Medicine and a paediatric surgeon, in the busy Blantyre Hospital. From there I was able, together with their 4 delightful children, to see life at grass roots level where they live in a mixed and equal society. In a small way I was able to be involved in some aid which is much needed in this poor country.

I recently received the following letter from my niece:-
 "It concerns a coloured Malaysian family whose daughters went to the same school as my girls. Nearly 3 years ago things fell apart for them within the space of a few months. Guy lost his house, job, and then his health. He died two years ago leaving his wife Sheila homeless and without any

means of support whatsoever, with three very bright daughters to educate.

A group of friends have worked together to help them in what ways we can; for instance, a family from Italy who lost their child has agreed to support Adele throughout her schooling, and little Emma's primary school fees have also been taken care of. We have helped with their monthly bills, and Sheila has found a slightly better paid job.

However, their living conditions are appalling; they live, two families in a rickety, one bedroomed house (They survived without electricity for about 6 months, unable to be connected before they settled the previous tenants bill; the girls all had to do their homework by



candlelight). We friends all agree that they must once more have a house of their own; we have found possible sites for building and are looking at small houses to buy. A local building contractor will do any renovations for free.

For this we need quite a lot more help. Perhaps some of you who have experienced the wonders of Malawi would like, through your church, work, or other connections, help to raise funds. £1000 has been promised, but we need more.

This is a lovely family, destitute and without support, with bright children capable of going far - one is talking of studying medicine, which she will luckily be able to do here through the College of Medicine. If wished, donors could have updates on the children's progress from us, and indeed photographs and even exchange of letters with the Stokes family".

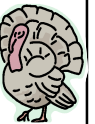

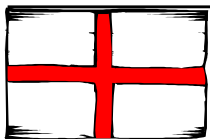

FOLLOW THE FIREWORKS CODE

When buying fireworks, make sure they comply with BS 7114 and are clearly marked for their intended use "Indoor, Garden or Display"

- ⇒ Keep fireworks in a sealed box or tin
- ⇒ Use them one at a time, replacing the lid immediately
- ⇒ **NEVER** put fireworks in your pocket
- ⇒ Read the instructions carefully, using a torch or hand lamp **NEVER** use a naked flame
- ⇒ Light fireworks at arms length using a taper or a firework lighter

- ⇒ Stand well back and **NEVER** return to a firework after it has been lit, it could explode in your face
- ⇒ Ensure that all children with fireworks are well supervised
- ⇒ **NEVER** throw fireworks
- ⇒ Keep all pets and animals indoors
- ⇒ Take care of sparklers, wear gloves to hold them and dispose of sparklers in a bucket of water as soon as they are finished



GARDENER'S CORNER FOR NOVEMBER

If you have pots and tubs outdoors lift them off the ground by placing pieces of wood or stone underneath to allow drainage during this very wet weather we have been having. Also if we have a prolonged frosty period take pots and tubs under cover (if the pot freezes it will crack if it is a clay one).



LAWNS:

After the last cut of the year apply fertilizer.

SHRUBS:

You can still take hardwood cuttings.

ROSES:

Prune climbing roses, use some of the prunings as cuttings

CHRYSANTHEMUMS:

Stools should now be boxed under cover, lightly cover with old potting compost but make sure they have some ventilation to stop mildew..



BULBS:

Plant tulip bulbs. Any bulbs you have planted for Christmas flowering bring indoors.

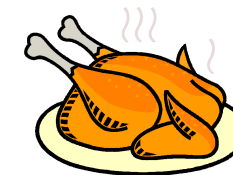

KITCHEN CORNER

CHICKEN WITH LEMON

This is a good way with roasting a chicken that I saw on one of the TV cookery programmes and have used many times since.

Place the chicken on a rack in a roasting tin. Sprinkle with paprika and some crushed bay leaves. Squeeze over the juice of half a lemon then put the shell inside the bird, with salt and pepper inside and out. Pour ½ pt of water into the tin, and roast 1 hour in a hot oven.



Dish up the bird and thicken the juices with a little cornflour.

Potatoes to accompany this:-

Finley slice the potatoes, and put into a dish rubbed over with garlic. Dot with butter, add salt and pepper, then add 5 fl oz (¼ pt) single cream. Bake ½ - ¾ hour.




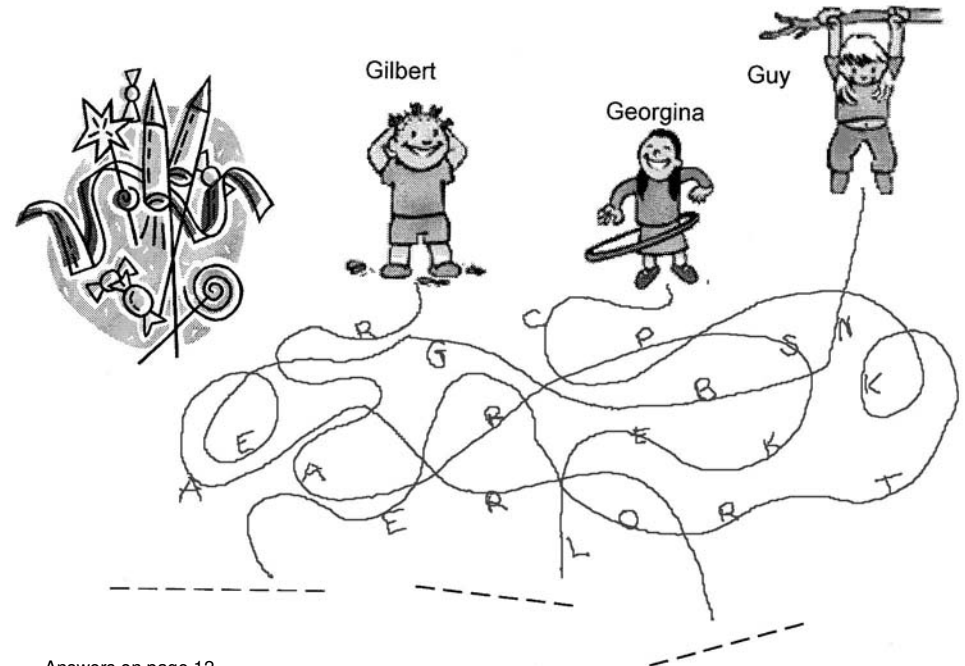

1. Set the oven to Gas Mark 4, 180°C. Sieve 160g plain flour into a mixing bowl and stir in 50g caster sugar.
2. Add 125g softened butter, cut up into small chunks, and rub it into the flour and sugar until the mixture looks like breadcrumbs.  the
3. Add a few drops of milk, then use your hands to form mixture into a dough.
4. Divide the dough into three equal pieces and add a drop of different food colouring to each one. Knead the colours in well, then roll the balls out into 15cm squares.  few
5. Brush the top of each square with milk and place one square on top of the other. Roll them up into a tube, then cut the roll into 16 slices.
6. Lay the biscuits on a baking tray. Pop them in the oven for 15-20 minutes.

Share the road - it won't kill you

Pedestrians

Sometimes, getting somewhere can be a total nightmare. Some people seem to think they have more right to use the roads and pavements than others - but all of use are just trying to get somewhere. If we were a bit more courteous and patient, getting around would be a much better and safer experience.

Pavements are for People, not parking

The pavement is an extension of the road, and there are many users, parents with toddlers/or pushing pushchairs, wheelchair and scooter users, visually impaired, people with hearing loss and the elderly - all have the right to **Share the Road**.

Motorists

- ▶ Parking on the pavement causes an obstruction and can force someone onto the road - putting them in danger.
- ▶ A wheelchair user needs a clear metre to pass a parked car
- ▶ Children and the elderly are vulnerable - do not force them into the road.
- ▶ Visually impaired and those with hearing loss need space too
- ▶ Remember that parking on pavements can cause an obstruction and can mask pedestrians from passing traffic

Pavement users

- ▶ When passing anyone else, make sure that you allow as much room as possible
- ▶ If you use a wheelchair or scooter, be considerate. Everyone has the right to use the pavement safely - never allow your vehicle to intimidate others.
- ▶ Remain alert to the needs of others
- ▶ Be prepared for the unexpected.

Share the road is an Essex County Council campaign targeting all road users. It aims to reduce accidents by encouraging everyone who uses the road and pavement to be more thoughtful and considerate.

GREAT BENTLEY SURGERY

THE HOLLIES, THE GREEN, GT BENTLEY

First job this month is to apologise to anyone who has been affected by the fiasco over flu jabs - especially those whose appointments have already had to be cancelled twice. It wasn't our fault. Honestly!

I have no doubt that most people will know from the media that one company's vaccine was refused a licence this year, leaving a national shortfall of 2.4 million doses. Yes - as luck would have it, it was the company we had ordered from. I can't be too hard on them as they have supplied us reliably for 10 years that I know of. They have never previously let us down, even when other companies had similar problems to those they are experiencing this year. It has still been a terrible nuisance though.

We will, we are promised by a different company, receive full supplies from early November onwards, so please bear with us and we'll get everyone's jabs done as soon as we can.

I thought that some of you might be interested in a new service that we are piloting in conjunction with The Green Pharmacy, courtesy of funding from the Primary Care Trust (PCT). Joe Knatt, the Superintendent Pharmacist, is going to be offering patients aged 75 or over who are taking four or more items of medication monthly, an in-depth review of what they are taking, what it does for them and when they take it.

The reviews will be by invitation only, and will usually take place on Thursdays in a private consulting room at the Pharmacy. However, if anyone who is asked to take part cannot get to the pharmacy, Mr Knatt is quite willing to see

them at home.

The good news is that the review doesn't cost anything, (the PCT is paying as we are piloting it at their request) and it doesn't involve a medical examination. The doctors are really pleased about the scheme because, as a pharmacist, Mr Knatt is the real expert on the best time and way to take medication as well as on how different drugs can interact together.

If you are offered a review, please do take advantage of the opportunity.

We'll be welcoming a new nurse to the surgery on 1st November. She is Judy Woraker, who joins us from a practice in Colchester where she has been working for ten years. She has a special interest in asthma, so will be an ideal replacement for Jayne Brown. She also has excellent experience in Family Planning and Women's Health.

Jan Williamson, our Nurse Practitioner is rather spooked by similarities between her and Judy. They both have the same initials; they trained at the same time, and not only are their children the same ages, but they are too ... (no, I'm not telling unless I get the right offer!)

Whilst on the subject of nurses, I'm delighted to say that Bonnie Beard has just been upgraded in recognition of all the extra work that she has been taking on lately.

Bonnie has been with us for almost two years now and her role has developed far further than we had originally anticipated, mainly because of her great enthusiasm. Her upgrading is well deserved.

Jan, Bonnie and Judy should make up an excellent and experienced nursing team. They will provide ideal back-up for the GPs and help to keep the pressure off them as the practice seems to get ever bigger and busier.
