**Recipe for Fairy Cakes** 

4oz (100g) soft butter of soft margarine
40z (100g) castor sugar
40z (100g) self raising flour
2 eggs which have been beaten together

At the Easter Sessions, 1650, William Pepper of Great Bromley, labourer, was charged with stealing there - 2lb of butter, worth 2d.; a piece of pork, worth 3d.; a piece of beef worth 2d.; a pitcher value of half penny; and milk worth a half penny also, from Thomas Toddy. He confessed and was whipped soundly.

# WOMEN'S INSTITUTE

### Great Bromley Women's Institute

Four our April 2009 meeting, John Harris from Blenheim Nurseries came to talk and give us some tips on making hanging baskets. He brought along a large selection of baskets in various colours and shapes, together with suitable linings, composts and, of course, plants.

According to the plants you wish to grow, there are several basket linings to choose from, such as coconut fibre, moss, felt and



papier-mâché. A plastic saucer can be placed in the bottom of the liner with water gel added.

There are many annual plants suitable: Lobelia, verbena,

helichrysum and pansies, also many foliage plants. Geraniums love the sun but only when the danger of frost has gone. All should do well when planted from early May. Water once per week with a feed mixed in - Organic, Tomorite and many others.

Finally, John spoke about the composts that are used now. They can be different mixes because of the problem of peat bogs being over used; the suppliers of peat or peat mixtures are looking at alternatives.

In the village hall at 7.30pm on Wednesday, 6th May, which is our Resolutions Meeting, our speaker is Beatrice Last, telling us about 'Coloured Glass'.

Do you have good ideas to help regenerate your rural community?

Residents and organisations are being offered an exciting new opportunity to play a part in regenerating the rural areas of Tendring.

They are being strongly encouraged to take up the chance to come forward with ideas and initiatives which could be included in a major delivery plan.

A special meeting is being set up to get the ball rolling and anyone interested in getting involved is urged to make the effort to go along.

The informal meeting has been organised by INTend, the trading name of Tendring District Council's regeneration company.

It is keen to hear thoughts and ideas about schemes and how they can be delivered in the rural parts of the District.

David Lines, Chairman of INTend, said this is a real chance for people to play a role in the future of their communities.

"Whilst INTend has a delivery plan that sets out the key objectives of delivering and building upon projects and programmes already approved, it is also keen to identify new opportunities that meet the vision of the company," he said. "To help make this happen we are very keen to work with investors, communities and groups to investigate, develop and evaluate new initiatives that may well lead to them being included in a future delivery plan."

INTend has created an Area Board dedicated to the rural area, which includes Brightlingsea and all the villages in the middle of the district.

This board is keen to hear your views first hand and the aim of the meeting is to give community leaders (the town and parish councils), other local groups and organisations, as well as individuals, the opportunity to bring forward views, ideas and projects that can benefit their area.

The meeting is being held in Brightlingsea on Monday April 20 at 7pm in the Community Centre.

"Everyone – and I mean everyone – is welcome to come along and tell us what they think should be considered in the area they live in," added Mr Lines.

"We really want to hear from them and we will listen to what they have to say. We do not have the monopoly on good ideas and you could come up with something that could make a real difference to your community."

# KITCHEN CORNER

Warmer weather is coming, so time to think about salads. Healthy raw foods to make us feel good!

Here are some of my favourite ideas.

### Carrot with mustard seeds

Finely grate some carrots, put a tablespoonful of black mustard seeds in a dry saucepan and toss over a moderate heat till lightly toasted and popping. Mix with the carrot.

### **Celery and apple**

Mix chopped celery and unpeeled red apple, add some walnuts, pumpkin and sunflower seeds, and bind with mayonnaise.

### **Beetroot and orange**

Lay alternate slices of cooked beetroot and fresh orange on a plate and dress with some vinaigrette.

**Cooked rice** mixed with sweetcorn or peas or sliced beans etc.

### Honey salad dressing

Toast 1 tbs sesame seeds in dry pan till lightly coloured.

Mix together in a bowl:

2tsp honey

2 tbs fresh

lemon juice

3 tbs olive oil 1 tbs light soy



sauce

Salt and pepper

Add the seeds and whisk thoroughly till thick, pour into a jar.

Following the recent resignation of Mrs Brenda Perry, Mr Alan Thomas of Balls Green has been co-opted as a member of the council. The council acknowledges with grateful thanks the contribution made by Mrs Perry during her six years as a councillor.

This is particularly important if there is any suggestion of resurrecting proposals for large-scale industrial development and housing in the village - which were rejected following the public enquiry into the current local plan. # **GARDENING TIPS FOR MAY**

### Flowers

Dahlias can be planted at the end of the month when hopefully frost is unlikely, also tuberous and fibrous begonias which have started into growth. Freesias grown from seed can be placed in a shady position at the end of the month.

### Shrubs

April flowering shrubs can be pruned, especially clematis, and those flowering in early May including forsythia, Kerria and berberis. Rhododendrums, azaleas and lilacs should be dead-headed as soon as the blooms are finished.



Grass cutting

should be in full swing from now onwards, cutting every five days or so.

# For flowering next spring

biennials can be sown

this month, e.g. wallflowers, Sweet Williams, Canterbury bells and antirrhinums. Pansy and polyanthus are also treated in this way.

### Fruit

I don't know if we can regard rhubarb as a fruit or vegetable but this is another plant that is very easy to grow and gives value for money. Rhubarb is a very hungry plant and needs plenty of manure, a good layer each spring will give excellent results. Gooseberries are another soft fruit which should have a place in the garden, freezes very well, the only draw back being the gooseberry sawfly. So if you intend to grow one or two bushes have a sprayer handy

greengrocer's shop and asks for a "pound of potatoes". The greengrocer says "I'm sorry, dear, they're kilos now". "Alright", says the old lady, "I'll have a pound of kilos." and spray at the first sign of the small black and yellow caterpillar.

### Vegetables

Main crop potatoes can be planted now. If your early potatoes are showing through draw the soil up to just cover the leaves; a sprinkling of 'growmore' fertilizer will work wonders.

When the lettuce, carrot, radish and beetroot seedlings are still small now is the time to thin out plants to leave about 3" between each plant.

# **DID YOU KNOW?**

As from 1st April 2009, Gas Safe Register is the new name and the official stamp for gas safety in Great Britain, <u>REPLACING</u> the CORGI gas registration scheme Anyone carrying out work on gas <u>MUST</u> be registered with Gas Safe Register. If not, they are breaking the law and putting you and your family at risk.

Only a Gas Safe Registered Engineer is legally allowed to install gas appliances, boilers, hobs, ovens or fires in your home or workplace.

You must only use a gas safe registered engineer for any type of gas work, including installation, maintenance and servicing.

The campaign to make the public aware of this important change started in Mid March with a series of ads in every free weekly newspaper, in England, Scotland and Wales. The campaign will shift to the national press with ads in a whole range of newspapers during April. TV viewers will see spots on various channels in Mid April. There will also be advertising on perimeter signs at Rugby League grounds and at cricket grounds during Twenty 20 series.

Finding a Gas Safe registered engineer is simple. From 1 April, you will be able to find an engineer in your area online – at www.gassaferegister.co.uk – or by calling 0800 408 5500. Most Gas Safe Registered tradesman will also display the bright yellow and black logo on their vehicles and advertising will be updated as new directories are produced.

Registered engineers will be identified with the new yellow Gas Safe Register logo, and every engineer will carry a Gas Safe Register ID card with their own unique licence number. This card also displays the types of gas work which the engineer is legally allowed to carry out. So before you have any gas work done in your home, make sure you check the card.



So remember there is only one gas safety register that you need to use. Look for the yellow Gas Safe Register triangle not the orange CORGI registration badge.

# Make a Dog Card

### **Dear Friends**

It is clear from the Gospels that our Lord in his teaching often used the ordinary material of life in his day to be the vehicle of his message. We too, can gain valuable insights from the stuff of our everyday lives which are not specifically religious.

I remember a play of many years ago. It was called, "The Chalk Garden", and was based, as I recall, on the observation that the keen gardener, having acquired a plot on chalky soil, suddenly wants nothing so much as to grow lime-haters, such as camellia and rhododendrons. Conversely, when presented with a garden on acid soil, the dearest wish is to grow chalk loving alpines! The play worked out the idea that people, like plants need the right environment in order to flourish.

When you read this the Lenten season will be behind us and we will most definitely have celebrated the Resurrection and we shall be well into the Easter season. During Lent we will have taken the opportunity to "plough the soil of the heart" as one of the Desert Fathers put it, and to make it more productive of the fruits of righteousness. The right soil, the right balance of sun and rainfall, the right fertiliser – all these elements must be supplied if thriving of the planting is to be achieved. What does this mean for our lives in God? I am resisting using the phrase 'religious life' as though that were a separate compartment.

For in the garden the spring management is crucial to the success of the summer performance.

Amid all the gimmicks of the modern garden 'makeover' traditional husbandry still rules. I believe the same is true of our religious practices. We all know what they are – prayer and study, regular worship in church; penitence and the discipline of prayer fasting and almsgiving. All wearily familiar, perhaps, and yet the ways we use to cultivate the soil in and everdeepening relationship with God.

All this means, of course, a certain denial of self, a handing over to God of our time and energy, a certain taking up of our cross – thus the gain of Lent spills over into the rest of the year and our lives. The cross firmly planted in the good soil can now blossom into Easter joy.

Indeed I wish you all the joy of this Easter season.
