Report of a parish council meeting held on 11 June 2009

Planning

The Council considered the following planning applications:

Talisman Coachlines, Harwich Road – variation of condition 5 of approval 01/00751/FUL to allow up to 20 coaches to operate from this site, (no objections), Application for Lawful Development Certificate for existing use of land corner

Certificate for existing use of land corner of Frating/Brundells Roads for leisure, recreation and siting of a caravan and shed, (objections).

Westward House, Camp Road/Mary Lane North – application to allow removal of 18 trees/tree stumps, (no comment).

Tendring District Council has decided the following planning applications: Bush Farm, Hall Road – demolition of existing agricultural/domestic buildings and erection of replacements.

Land south of Harwich Road – erection of agricultural storage building and workshop.

GARDENING TIPS FOR JULY

Someone once told me that in this country we don't have a climate we only have weather; with the last few days into the start of June we have had climate, let's hope it continues!

The drawback is we have to keep using the watering can: hanging baskets, pots and tubs need watering every day.

Flowers

flowering.

For large blooms on your chrysanthemums reduce the stems to six and begin disbudding. Tie in the young shoots of dahlias, if long stems are required for cutting, disbud some of the shoots, leaving only the strong terminal buds.

Keep removing the faded flower heads of annuals to encourage them to keep

Dwarf and intermediate bearded irises may be divided early in the month.

Tall varieties may be divided at the end of the month. Water until divisions are established.

Vegetables

Earth up brussel sprouts to stop them being rocked by the wind.

Late globe beetroot, carrots, lettuces and radish can be planted this month.

Plant out autumn and winter cabbages.

Harvest when ready dwarf beans, broad

beans, early runner beans, summer cabbages, carrots and cauliflowers. When digging up first and second early potatoes leave them on top of the ground to dry off, then store in large paper bags. DO NOT store in plastic sacks, the potatoes will soon rot.

Tomatoes should have their first trusses of flowers now so keep them well watered and when the first fruit are set start feeding once a week. Any of the well known tomato fertiliser will do.

Fruit

The blackberries and loganberries will be ripening this month; it goes without saying they must be protected from the birds. Gooseberries are the first soft fruit to ripen and freeze very well. We are still using gooseberries that we froze last year.

FROM THE PAST

PROVISION OF WATER IN 1933

In those days some houses depended on wells and some were lucky enough to have a pump. The Guildhall tenants had a pump but it was replaced in 1933 by Parsons and Son of Manningtree, telephone number 1933.

Parsons were Building Contractors, House Decorators, Sanitary Engineers. The Guildhall lead pump had failed. It was replaced with a new 3½" one. The wooden casing was painted. Sides were in pine, the front and back in match-boarding, also there were new irons needed and a 12' suction pipe and make good the gulley—all at the cost of £7 8s 0d.



Parsons also were proud to completely furnish funerals.

No doubt Joslin's of High Street, Colchester provided the pump and its fittings.

KITCHEN CORNER

Rolled Paylova

4 egg whites

8 tbs castor sugar

1 teasp cornflour

2 teasp vinegar

coconut or flaked almonds

1/2pint Whipping cream.

1 small tin sliced peaches, drained.

Beat egg whites till stiff. Continue beating and add cornflour, vinegar and 6 tbs castor sugar. Beat till stiff and glossy. Fold in rest of sugar.

Spread mixture evenly onto Swiss roll tin which has been lined, greased and sprinkled with water. Sprinkle with the coconut or flaked almonds, and bake at 350oF/180oC for 15 mins. Sprinkle a piece of greaseproof paper with castor sugar and turn out the pavlova. Gently

peel off the paper and cool for 10 -15 mins. Spread with whipped cream and peach slices, roll up lengthwise. Wrap in a teatowel and chill in fridge for at least 2 hours before serving.

Other fruits could be used such as sliced strawberries or raspberries.


CARPET BOWLS



The course tutor has written the following about the course:

Are you impressed by the landscape's immense variety - and would like to know how it achieved its appearance? In this course we seek explanations by studying the processes which have shaped scenery ranging from the volcanic eruption reported on the news, to the river we see on our local country stroll. To start with, we look at the grand scale - the pattern of continents and oceans. mountain ranges, earthquakes and volcanoes. Our attention then turns to landforms such as those found in the British Isles, and how they were shaped by rivers, glaciers and the sea acting on a variety of rocks. These themes are examined through many explanatory diagrams and illustrated by photographic evidence, including a "pictorial visit" to one of our most attractive stretches of holiday coastline. Course members will be offered the chance of a guided visit to the Earth Galleries (formerly Geological museum) in South Kensington.

We have had a very busy start to our last half term at playgroup.

We would like to say a big **Thank You** to Gayle Cowdery who has been treasurer of the committee for 4 years and we welcome Carole Davidson into her new position, we hope she will enjoy her time with us, along with her grandson Arthur who has recently joined playgroup too.

The children have been very busy working on our theme mini beasts ready for our display at the Tendring Hundred show on the 11th of July. Don't forget to come along to the educational tent to see all the children's hard work including our

own version of 'The Snail' by the artist Matisse. We are also pleased to announce the children will be taking part in the Barnardo's Toddle on Wednesday 1st of July raising money for a very worthwhile charity.

We are also hosting a playgroup coffee morning on Monday the 20th July 2009 between 10am and midday at the village hall, where you can come along with the children and have some fun. There will be face painting, bouncy castle, refreshments and various stalls. Entrance is £2 per child with a maximum of £5. Please come along - we would love to see you.

NATURE'S DIARY

I thought I would start a new column of the wildlife with which we are so fortunate to share our surroundings. I am not an authority so if any of you have any input and would like to share it, maybe even with photographs, please do send it to me.

I felt this month I should start with the butterflies. Last year was not good for butterflies (and insects in general) but this year so far things are better. Look out this month for the Large, Small and Green Veined White butterflies, the Brimstone, Red Admiral, Peacock, Comma, Speckled Wood, Meadow Brown, Small Heath, Holly Blue and Essex Skipper. The Painted Lady has come over in large numbers from the continent this year but I have (for the second or third year running) yet to see a Small Tortoiseshell.

Look out also for Shield Bugs which are small flattish beetles. The Hawthorn and Green Shield Bugs are easy to identify and there are others such as the Coreus marginatus that you will also find in your gardens plus others which are a bit smaller. Damselflies and dragonflies are now about. There are blue-tailed and common blue damselflies in Great Bromlev which are easy to see and identify - don't forget the male and female are often different colours. Damselflies often perch on leaves and tall grass in the sunshine. The dragonflies - hawkers and darters are more difficult to identify as they constantly patrol looking for prey. If you see one land in a certain place before flying off again, be patient as they often return to the same place which is used as a lookout.

This spring I had the largest mass of toad and frogspawn I have even seen in the pond but I am not sure how many survived the hungry beaks which seek them out. However the garden is full of toads and frogs of all different sizes from fully mature to half size ones and hopefully some of this year's tadpoles will be joining them. There is a toad by our back door which we have

to be careful not to step on at night when we take out the dog last thing.

Keep an eye open for the buzzards towards

Lt Bromley and listen out for the tawny owlets who are out of their nest - there appear to be three - and 'squeaking' each evening in the trees for their parents' attention. They 'squeak' for about 6 weeks when it all suddenly stops, when I presume they are old enough to forage for their own food. To my delight the other day I saw a barn owl flying gracefully along by the side of the road at hedge height at 8.00am up towards New House Farm looking absolutely beautiful.

THE RECTORY, GREAT BROMLEY

Dear Friends,

Generally most people are superstitious to some degree or another. By a superstition I mean a belief for practice which is irrational and which usually results from ignorance or fear. Of course there are many examples of superstitious beliefs or practices. There is a belief that bad luck will strike the person in front of whom a black cat passes. Then there is the belief that tracedy will befall a person who walks under a ladder, and that you shouldn't cross people on the stairs. Good luck charms such as horseshoes. coins, lockets and other religious medals are kept or worn to ward off evil or bring good fortune. We have often heard that one magpie will bring sorrow and two will bring joy! And then of course there is the belief that everyone born at certain times of the year are categorised under star signs.

In general, superstitious beliefs and practices are most common in situations involving a high degree of risk, chance and uncertainty, and during times of personal or social stress or crisis, when events seem to be beyond human control. However what is or is not superstitious is relative. One person's belief's can be another's superstitions.

All religious beliefs and practices may be considered superstition by unbelievers and we as Christians have to be very careful of what we believe.

Lots of practices which surrounded baptism, were superstitious. Instead of baptism being a sign of God's grace and goodness, some people said that it was also a necessary practice to prevent you going to hell. So babies who died without baptism were refused burial in consecrated ground.

There are still many practices surrounding Holy Communion which are utterly superstitious. There is the idea you have to be confirmed, and the fact that you should only take Holy Communion once a day.

None of these are found in the pages of scripture and yet they have found their way into the teaching of parts of the church and the faith of some Christians for many years.

This brings us to the big question of what is faith. The Christian faith is about answering the question – who is Jesus to you? Few people can seriously doubt that Jesus existed because there is too much evidence from the Bible and from historical records. But the big question is - who do you say he was? For many people Jesus was a good man or prophet. For other people Jesus was a misguided man who ended up like many others who said dangerous things. Christians believe that Jesus is the Son of God, and from that one belief we can look at Jesus and see what God is like. Christian faith starts from Christ – Jesus Christ – and trust in him is all we need.

This is not superstition, because although I would agree that for many the idea of Jesus is irrational there are many things which are irrational but true. Belief in Jesus does require faith but not everything which we do not understand is superstition or rubbish. We have to look carefully at what is superstitious rubbish and not true, and what is true even though it may require faith to believe it because we do not have absolute proof. Christian faith is something for which we have no proof and yet from the humble acknowledgement of who Jesus is, faith can grow in an amazing and remarkable way, almost imperceptibly. What Jesus is saying is that there is no excuse for anybody not to believe. We don't have to swallow a theological textbook and sign up to thousands of beliefs and practices - we are called to simply trust in Jesus and who he

From those humble beginnings the truth can grow and take root in our lives. Our faith might have humble beginnings and yet it cannot be dismissed, it has a destiny. Our faith might be small and insignificant and yet God can transform our meagre faith into

the size of our faith that matters but the quality of the person in whom we place our faith -Jesus. There are things we might get wrong along the way, ideas which might creep in and which we have to clear out every now and then. This is because we are Fr. Robert a people on the way, not a people who have arrived. Faith is learning to live with the questions we cannot answer, in the light of

something beyond our expectations. It is not the answers we have. The kingdom has started but it has not yet arrived. There is so much for all of us to learn and yet we know that we can trust the one holds our grain of faith securely in his hand.
