EDITOR'S RAMBLINGS



It has been brought to my attention that Essex County Council, who is taking over responsibility for the issuing of concessionary bus

passes, is carrying out a public consultation to ascertain users' requirements and views. Clearly this is going to affect anyone who uses a bus pass as it may well affect the time of the pass' validity and its general usefulness. You are therefore encouraged to go to the website and complete the questionnaire so that your views are known. Further details can be found on page 29 (Gt Bromley PC also refer to the issue on page 9) including what you can do if you do not have access to the internet.

I often use my bus pass when in London and a trip there recently to view the Quilt Exhibition at the V & A saw us looking out for the differently, and beautifully, decorated elephants sited all over the capital to be spotted as you bussed or walked around. They were sold in aid of charity at the beginning of July. Instead of elephants try scarecrows! Now is the time to start thinking of a 'design' for your scarecrow in readiness for the harvest celebrations (see page 19). from its ever changing perches round the beds might ensure we get something. I am enjoying the slightly cooler temperatures and with the recent showers a respite from watering the vegetables each evening. Now is the exciting time in the veggie growing summer season

when the first potatoes, courgettes, beans, tomatoes etc are being picked although already I have a surplus of courgettes which, if left, quickly turn into marrows! Nothing



tastes better than freshly picked produce from one's garden making the hard work worthwhile.

I have been to two very successful events in the heat recently. One was Hampton Court Palace Flower Show and the other was the Tendring Show. Both were great fun and both were hot although the journey to the Tendring Show did not take three hours as it did to Hampton Court Palace (including a ferry boat from Kingston station to Hampton Court) and four hours to return (including a ferry crossing from the Palace to the opposite shore to catch a bus to Kingston, train to Waterloo, the drain to Liverpool Street and then train again to Manningtree).

The school holidays are upon us and for the first time ever I shall have grandchildren to stay for a few days so plans are afoot as to what we shall do. Probably planning our scarecrow ...!

Report of a parish council meeting held on 8th July 2010

Planning

The Council considered and had no objections to the following planning applications:

Land east of Hall Road – stationing of mobile home in connection with the free range poultry enterprise.

Primrose Farm, Hall Road – storage barn.

Tendring District Council has decided the following planning applications:

11 Meadow Close – Extension (approval). **Building at Strutts Farm, Parsons Hill** – enforcement notice requiring cessation of residential use by 24/6/11.

Westward House, Mary Lane North (Camp Road) – erection of detached dwelling following demolition of existing building (approval).

Funday

Although making money was not the primary objective of the Funday there was a net surplus of £1,094 (after costs of

£905) which has now been distributed equally between the following four beneficiaries: the church fabric fund, the village Hall, the cricket club and Hamilton Lodge.

£3,939 in cash was taken on the day and there was further income of £112. Altogether the voluntary stalls took £982 net

Buses

The public subsidy for the 105 bus will be continuing with an additional service being put in place (details to follow). However the bus pass for the over-60s and disabled is being reviewed with a possibility that it will either be discontinued or the times when it can be used curtailed. A consultation is in progress and residents can contribute their views by going to the county website (http://www.essex.gov.uk/) and search for 'bus pass consultation'. Responsibility for issuing bus passes is being transferred to Essex County Council in 2011.

The next meeting of the Council will be at 7.30 pm on Thursday 12th August 2010 at Great Bromley Village Hall.

GT BROMLEY WORKING GROUP REPORTS

WG 5 – Hazardous Roads

With the 2010 bird nesting season now coming to an end it is timely for landowners and householders to trim their roadside hedges and trees, where appropriate, to ensure that these are not presenting a hazard to road users and pedestrians. From a recent survey of roads in the village it is clear that most of the unsatisfactory areas identified in previous years have been rectified and the landowners concerned are thanked for their efforts to make our village a safer and tidier place in which to live. However some overgrowth still remains which will require attention in the coming weeks.

Given that the highway boundary varies in width from location to location, it is difficult to generalise as to how roadside hedges and trees should be cut back by landowners, but the following general guidance from Essex County Council may be helpful:

Roadside verges should have a clear minimum width of 450mm at all times from the road edge. This means that hedges should be cut back at least one metre from the road edge to allow for vegetative growth.

Hedges should be cut back regularly such that there is no overgrowth of metalled footways. This includes brambles during the growing season.

Trees overhanging the road should allow a minimum clearance of 5.1 metres above the road surface, including on the road edge/kerb line. There should be a minimum clearance of 2.4 metres above footways.

Where the highway boundary is more than 1 metre from the road edge, then hedges may need to be cut back more severely. A useful guide is the position of road signs, which are properly surveyed in when installed. If a road sign is obscured, then almost always the hedge is encroaching on highway property and should be cut back.

WG 5 volunteers will be visiting landowners and householders in the autumn to discuss those hedges and verges which are still considered to be a hazard. Further information/advice can be obtained from me – telephone 01206 250263

A second hot summer in a row has taken its toll on some of the village trees planted out in the last 4 years but losses so far are limited to about 65 trees and shrubs, thanks to copious watering by WG members and landowners.

WG 7 - Village Pond Restoration

The village pond is located opposite Pond Farm in Hall Road, just south of the Cross Inn. The 2006 village appraisal indicated that many parishioners would like to see the pond area tidied up and some of the excessive vegetation removed. WG 7 volunteers intend to undertake restoration work on the pond later this year, commencing in September with the removal of the unwanted and invasive non-native New Zealand pygmy weed (Crassula Helmsii) which is slowly strangling the pond and its associated wildlife. Work to clear

some of the Bulrushes and scrub will follow later in the year, as will restoration of the hedge above the pond on the western side. The



restoration plan has not been finalised yet so if there are any other ideas or suggestions from parishioners as to what they would like to see undertaken at this site they would be welcomed for consideration. A small number of volunteers submitted their names in connection with this project in 2007 but more volunteers are needed to undertake the work; if you would like to help then please contact me - telephone 01206 250263.

weeks

Time 2.30 p.m. and finishing at 4.15 p.m. (a fifteen minute tea break included)
The fee will be £44.00 per person

The course tutor has written the following about the course:

"Many empires have ruled what we now call Iraq. Hittites, Persians, Greeks, Moslems have all coveted this land. The Sumerians may have been the first to use writing 5,000 years ago and produced a wonderful corpus of literature still relevant today - "The battle-club does not find out his name, it just finds his flesh." They produced beautiful jewellery and artifacts and invented metal working and beer, yet they were no match for those more aggressive who swept through the open plains of the Fertile Crescent.

Some of the earliest wars took place here and it has been fought over repeatedly ever since; it arguably has the most fought over frontiers in the world. Our measurement of time, seconds and hours, our seven day week, times tables and a wonder of the ancient world come to us from the people who lived and worked, died and were buried in this area. Travel with Hammurabi, Nebuchadnezzer and Gilgamesh on a voyage of discovery through Ur, Babylon, Nineveh and Nimrud on a Journey Through Ancient Iraq."

The 10 week course is divided into ten headed subjects, which are, The Land between Two Rivers, Prehistoric Mesopotamia - Ubaid and Uruk, The Emergence of Writing - Cuneiform, Religious Belief, Ur, Old Babylonia, Assyria/Neo Babylonia, Parthia, The Moslem Conquest and Tribal Conflict.

There will be a half term on 28th October 2010 and the last week of the course is on 2nd December 2010.

THE DOCTORS' SURGERY NEWS

Calling all HGV, PSV and taxi drivers – and anyone else who needs an annual medical done at the surgery to enable them to continue working or pursue a particular hobby.

Over the last few years it has become more and more difficult to fit these medicals into the doctors' schedules, especially during holiday times. As you will all realise, the medicals are **not** done as part of NHS services, but as a private arrangement. When appointments are short, sick people who are being seen as part of our NHS duties must take priority – for obvious reasons. It is sometimes impossible to fit people in for half-hour, private service medicals at short notice. As a last resort, it used to be possible to get your medical done at The Oaks Hospital in Colchester, but I understand that they no longer do them at all

Everyone who needs an annual medical is fully aware of when it is due. The same date comes around every year. Please, if you need an occupational or hobby-related medical, make sure that you book it well in advance. Don't wait until a few days before it is due, otherwise we might have to turn you away, and if that has consequences for work, holiday plans or whatever, I'm afraid that is your problem. It is no good getting stroppy with, and trying to browbeat, the receptionists, as has happened a couple of times recently, if they can't give you the appointment that you need. If surgery time is already completely full up with sick people, then you should have made arrangements much sooner for what is a private, non-NHS, chargeable service.

On a more positive, brighter note, another of the new-ish services that we can now offer is working well and we would like to get more patients taking advantage of it. It is called "Repeat Dispensing", and allows people who are stable on their regular medication to request more that one monthly prescription at a time. The prescriptions are then held by your pharmacy of choice and can be dispensed more quickly when you give them notice that new supplies of medication are needed without having to post, deliver or e-mail a monthly request to the surgery.

Unfortunately, the system really is only suitable for patients who don't have regular changes to

their medication or the dose taken. However, in many cases, provided the doctor is happy, we are able to issue enough prescriptions to cover three months – sometimes even more – which cuts down on an often irritating chore of getting an order to the surgery. It sometimes also means that the pharmacy can give you more than one month's medication at a time, which can be handy if, for example, you are going away on holiday.

One thing that I have to mention at this point is that the system is not a way of avoiding or reducing prescription charges. We are still told to prescribe most medicines in 28 day batches, and if you pay for your prescriptions, you will still incur a charge for each 28 days' worth of every item which you need. Regrettably, this is a government tax which neither we, nor your pharmacy, can waive or vary. However, the system certainly helps to make life a little easier.

If you feel that you might fit the criteria mentioned and would find Repeat Dispensing helpful, please let us know next time you are in the surgery or need to order your medication. One of the doctors can then consider it for you. There is a very simple form to fill in to get things started – it's as easy as that.

We are now heading into the holiday season and you might be glad to know that we have arranged some extra help to take the pressure off appointments on some of the days when doctors are away.

A lot of you will remember Dr Nambi, who spent six months here as a registrar not long ago. He will be doing a couple of days a week for us throughout August. Similarly, another former registrar, Dr Jatoi, will be helping us out in September and October when Dr Hunt is off on another of his extended trips. More of that one another month.

It will be great to see both of them here again as they are now, of course, fully qualified GPs who are extremely good at their job – we know that because we helped train them!

IN THE GARDEN IN AUGUST

If you have a greenhouse or cold frame do not let them stand idle during the autumn and winter months.



In the cold frame plant spring cabbage and cauliflower.

In the greenhouse border **sow** winter lettuce and winter radish. Why not try out of season vegetables in the greenhouse border such as beetroot, carrots and turnips.

Main crop **onions** should be planted this month to stand over winter, then transplanted to the permanent bed in spring for pulling from June or July. If you planted **shallots** then this is the

month to harvest them. They can be stored or pickled.

During this very hot weather it is better to leave cutting the **lawns** until we get some rain and the grass has recovered (as it will).

Keep dahlias well watered, like potatoes they need a lot of water.

Towards the end of the month propagate **lilies** from bulblets.

Take semi-hard cuttings of **heathers** with a heal.

Raspberries - cut down the canes that have fruited to ground level and tie in new growth.

Our current read is *Her Fearful Symmetry* by Audrey Niffenegger. I chose this book because I loved *The Time Travellers Wife* by Audrey Niffenegger and wanted to see what her other books are like.

The story follows two, more than identical twins, that have no interest outside their suburban home, until they

"Her Fearful Symmetry" is a delicious and deadly twenty-first-century ghost story about Niffenegger's familiar themes of love, loss and identity. It is certain to cement her standing as one of the most singular and remarkable novelists of our time."

Books we have just completed

We have just completed *The Secret Scripture* by Sebastian Barry. It may seem like each month we read a book that we all liked, and what can I say? But this was another book that we all enjoyed. The interlocking characters and complex relationships mean that we think rereading this book would be beneficial, to further weave the stands of

story together. That is not to say that it was an indigestible read but rather that by the last page you want to further know the characters, and what befalls them, by reading it all over again. The heartbreak and confusion of the main character made it a "very interesting and moving read" with the gradual unveiling of the 100 year olds complex life. The story is crafted to unfurl gradually and develops character and especially atmosphere very well. We also found it revealing of Ireland throughout the 1930s. Another read that I think we would all recommend.

Small Wars by Sadie Jones was another good read, and we all agreed that it was very readable and entertaining. It was thought that The Outcast (another novel by Sadie Jones) was more enjoyable. We all found it very moving and it got us thinking about other wars and our current understanding of post traumatic stress.

We realised how different war time life must have been before this was an accepted condition and the heartbreak that could come hand in hand with this going undiagnosed.

The writing really drew you in and we found that some of the detailing was so intense that the horrific imagery (and sometimes even the described smells) haunted you for days after. The story started slowly so you could really get to know the characters, the pace increased and then there was action with each turn of the page. Although I personally enjoyed this read I think that the characters are actually quite forgettable in themselves, but maybe that means that Sadie Jones has achieved a high degree of realism!

WARNING FOR RESIDENTS OVER CHIMNEY SCAM

This has not happened in Chelmsford yet, but best to be forewarned.

Essex County Council Trading Standards is warning householders in Basildon and Benfleet that doorstep rogue traders are currently operating in the area.

Trading Standards has received reports from residents about a trader currently seeking business by knocking on doors and telling residents that their chimney looks 'dodgy'. The trader has also been observed kicking a chimney to damage it, and then informing the householder that it is dangerous and about to fall through the roof.

The trader quotes an excessive price for repairs at first, and then offers a discount as they are not charging VAT.

Trading Standards is following up complaints received about the activity of this trader and is advising residents not to deal with doorstep traders to avoid having unnecessary work carried out.

The representative for the County Council says: "... If you are looking to have work carried out on your home, you can use the Buy with Confidence Scheme to find a reputable trader, or ask friends, family or neighbours for recommendations. Get all quotes in

writing with full traceable addresses, don't pay more than a small deposit up front and ask to check the work the trader has done for other customers."

If you have been the target of a doorstep rogue trader and would like advice, please call the Trading Standards service at Consumer Direct on 08454 040506. If you require work, to be carried out on your property, use one of our Buy with Confidence Trading Standards approved traders. "We are, as is most of the nation, suffering catalytic converter thefts from vehicles on a regular basis. They are stolen for the scrap value of the metal inside them. Following are a few tips you might like to consider particularly if you leave your vehicle in a remote location." says Tony Ellis

Theft Prevention for Catalytic Converters

The catalytic converter is an emission-controlling device that is a part of the exhaust system of many automobiles and trucks. It uses a platinum-iridium catalyst to oxidize pollutants before they can be released into the air, and it converts carbon monoxide into carbon dioxide. The platinum on the converter makes it a valuable device and theft is a common concern. Protecting your catalytic converter from theft needs to be a priority.

Protecting the Car

A thief can't get to your catalytic converter if he can't get to your car . Keep your car stored in a garage if you have one available. If not, park in well-lit areas at night and try to park close to buildings once the sun goes down. If your car is isolated, it makes it easier for

a thief to crawl under the car and saw the converter off, which can be done in seconds. Avoid parking too close to stairwells in parking garages since these make for easy escape routes for thieves.

Securing the Converter

Some converters are only attached to the car exhaust using bolts, and this can make them even easier to remove. Have an auto shop weld the converter in place to make it more difficult for a thief to remove. Alarm devices, which are sensitive to vibration, can also be secured to the undercarriage of the car. When the car vibrates as the converter is being removed, the alarm goes off, A sensor can also be triggered if an unauthorized person slides under the vehicle. Another option is called a "cage clamp" which is basically a cage device that locks in around the converter to make it more difficult to remove. The cage can be cut through, but it takes more time and effort than most thieves. will want when there are other easier targets nearby.

Additional Tips

If you have multiple vehicles, use your vehicle that has the lowest clearance

underneath to block the vehicle with the higher clearance. SUVs and trucks are popular targets because the chassis are higher up and the thief can slide under the vehicle easier. Blocking that access with a lower-riding car makes that more difficult. Install additional security lighting in your driveway or around your garage. Monitor the news to be aware of any recent trends or increase in converter theft. Google alerts can help you do this easily. If you live in an area with high crime or if there has been a rash of thefts, consider installing a security fence around vour driveway. One way of recovering a stolen converter is to etch a serial number on it. It won't prevent theft. but you can report the number to police if it does get stolen and they can trace it through local metal buyers

Essex County Council will be responsible for issuing your concessionary bus pass from 1 April 2011 and would like to know your opinions about your bus pass. For more information and to request a survey please call 0845 743 0430 or visit any library or council office in Essex. You can also complete the consultation online at www.essex.gov.uk/buspass

"... For all applicants the County Council is required to provide a minimum offer of free travel on bus services between 0930 and 11 on weekdays and at all times at weekends and on bank holidays.

At present all districts offer a 0900 start,

2400 finish Monday to Friday, all-day travel Saturday and Sunday and a companion pass, extending the free travel offer for those unable to travel without a companion so that the companion also travels free. Some district councils also offer additional services, such as a limited value of taxi tokens in place of a pass, but these are not offered by all authorities.

We are therefore asking you what you find most useful about your pass at the moment so that we can make an informed decision about what the County Council offers from 1 April 2011. ..."

THE RECTORY, GREAT BROMLEY

Dear Friends.

Very often the best experiences in life are all over too quickly. Those times when we experience real beauty, wonder, joy, peace and love just do not seem to last long enough. Try as we may we cannot prolong them; but the memory of them can often keep us going when life seems hard going, dull and boring.

On August 6th the church keeps the feast of the Transfiguration of Our Lord: we recall that time when Jesus went up Mount Tabor to pray accompanied only by his closest friends, Peter, James and John ... 'And while he was praying the appearance of his face changed and his clothes became dazzling white. Two men were talking with him, Moses and Elijah'. (Luke 9v28)

For those three privileged friends it was a deeply moving and beautiful experience – so wonderful that they naturally wanted to prolong it. Peter says: 'Master, how good it is that we are here. Shall we make three shelters – one for you, one for Moses and one for Elijah?' But it was not to be: they had to return to the plain below where there was work to be done, in particular a distressed epileptic boy needed to be healed.

Bishop Leslie Brown writes in 'The King and the Kingdom' –

"Peter had to learn the lesson, which Jesus had known from the beginning, that the divine glory was not something to be grasped and retained for yourself. If you have a great spiritual experience, it will probably be of short duration, and you have to find God's reality not only on the mountain top, but in the hot and dusty plain as well... the contrast between the peace of the mountain and the anger and noise of the crowd and the poor child was very great. God was there too, however, and his glory was shown in

the compassion and love of Jesus as truly as in the shining glory on the mountain".

Thank God for all those times when you felt you were 'on the mountain top', when you felt especially close to him and aware of his glory and beauty and love; treasure these times in your heart and you will, I hope, find that they will strengthen and sustain you when you have to tread your own personal 'via crucis' (way of the cross) ... just as the Transfiguration of Jesus must have helped those close friends of his to walk along that path that was to lead to Calvary.

Father in heaven, whose Son Jesus Christ was wonderfully transfigured before chosen witnesses upon the holy mountain, and spoke of the exodus he would accomplish at Jerusalem:

Give us strength so to hear his voice and bear his cross that in the world to come we may see him as he is;

Who is alive and reign with you in the unity of the Holy Spirit, one God, now and for ever.

(Collect for the Transfiguration)
