## IN THE GARDEN IN AUGUST

The update on the **fig tree** is that it now has six small figs as yet not enough to sell to Tesco!

**Dahlias** are now coming into bloom. Pinch out side shoots to get long stems and bigger flowers.

Keep picking **runner beans**, do not let them go to seed until the end of the growing season, then save the seed beans for next year.

Plant out **spring cabbage** 6-9" apart. Cabbage should be ready for cutting from April to June the following year, then take out every other one to use as spring greens with the rest being left to grow on as cabbages.



**Tomatoes** that are coming to the end of their growing time can still be ripened. In a cardboard box place a layer of shredded newspaper then a layer of tomatoes, more shredded paper and so on. The tomatoes may not ripen to a red colour but will turn orange and can be used in soups or fried with breakfast egg and bacon etc. Another method is to dig up the plants and hang upside down in a shed or greenhouse.

### Report of a parish council meeting held on 12 August 2010

### Planning The Council considered the following planning applications:

**1 Boulton Cottages, Frating** Road – two storey extension and detached garage (no objections).

#### **Fieldside, Frating Road** – lawful development certificate in recognition of existing use for motor vehicle repairs (application not supported).

Land East of Hall Road – appeal against Tendring District Council's refusal to permit a further free-range egg unit near an existing dwelling (objections).

## Tendring District Council has approved the following planning applications:

**7 Fairfield Close** – various single and two storey extensions.

Primrose Farm – storage barn. Industrial site, Parsons Hill – demolition of existing commercial buildings and the erection of one detached dwelling and garages (application withdrawn).

**Bush Farm, Hall Road:** (i) Demolition of existing dwelling and its replacement; (ii) Demolition of existing agricultural/domestic buildings and replacement with office/stores/garaging/games room.

The Willows, Frating Road – retention of greenhouse.

## The Planning Inspectorate has dismissed the following appeal:

Land on the corner of Brundells and Frating Roads – appeal against Tendring District Council's refusal to grant a certificate of lawful development in recognition of existing use of the site for leisure, recreation and a caravan and shed.

### **Financial matters**

The Audit Commission's external auditor has approved the council's 2009/10 accounts as being satisfactory. The annual return is now available for inspection and a copy will be displayed on the main (school) parish notice board.

### Big rubbish collection day

There will be a big rubbish collection day next month with the date and collection points notified in October's *Messenger*.

### Broadband

The council acknowledges the importance of a good broadband

connection for village residents, particularly those in business or working from a home base. However it also accepts that the speed and quality of the



service via the normal BT landline is wholly inadequate. The council is looking at alternative ways of delivering economically a better broadband service. Please see the consultation notice elsewhere in this magazine. (See page 11)

### Speedwatch

The council is hoping to initiate a speedwatch scheme for the village drawing on those volunteers who have already been trained. Please contact the clerk if you are interested in being involved.

## RURAL BROADBAND

Many will be aware of the poor provision of reliable broadband services in Great

Bromley. Those who are fortunate enough to have a broadband service often suffer from slow speeds and poor reliability and of course many are unable to get broadband at all. There are a couple of wireless broadband providers available but they can be prohibitively expensive. The lack of a viable business case and relatively poor infrastructure in the area makes the prospect of a greatly improved service from the main providers unlikely in the short to medium term. therefore commenced a project to identify a suitable method of providing affordable and reliable fast broadband services to the village. A number of communities in the East of England have organised their own broadband and initial enquiries are certainly very promising. It is likely that at some point a survey will be carried out to ascertain the level of interest in the village, as potential suppliers will need assurances that it is worth their while to implement the necessary infrastructure.

Updates on progress will appear here in the coming months.

## NATURE DIARY

Sitting over breakfast at a campsite in north Wales on a (one of the few!) sunny morning I was looking towards Snowdon shrouded in cloud when my attention was caught by the movement of a bird of prey. Out came the binoculars and there to my surprise and joy I saw the unmistakable colouring and shape of a Red Kite as it soared over a particular patch of ground. A wonderful, memorable sight and not one which was repeated though I looked and watched in vain.

Another first for me and one repeated many times during our time there was to see Stonechats in the heath-y area behind the huge sand dunes along the coast along with another, as yet unidentified, bird in the same area. In this unspoilt habitat could also be seen the pretty red coloured common darter dragonflies and 'blue' (unidentified) butterflies. Wild thyme, lady's bedstraw (once used for stuffing mattresses), meadowsweet, yellow rattle, eyebright and thistles being settled upon for their seeds by juvenile goldfinches could also be seen. The whole area was a place to loiter and watching all things living - if only there had been a little



less wind and rain and a little more sun!

Back here at home the house martins and their young are wheeling and chatting overhead in the sky readying themselves, along with the swallows, for their long journey back to Africa. There are big blue dragonflies, which don't seem to rest and allow me close inspection, patrolling the garden, with small tortoiseshell, red admiral, comma, peacock, the 'brown' and 'white' butterflies all enjoying the buddleia and other late summer plants. I also have a wasp problem and one nest has been found. The conkers on the horse chestnut trees will soon be ready to be fought with by adults and children alike while the hips of rose and hawthorn are reddening and the blackberries are ripening ready for picking and storage.

Time 2.30 p.m. and finishing at 4.15 p.m. (a fifteen minute tea break included) The fee will be £44.00 per person

The course tutor has written the following about the course:

"Many empires have ruled what we now call Iraq. Hittites, Persians, Greeks, Moslems have all coveted this land. The Sumerians may have been the first to use writing 5,000 years ago and produced a wonderful corpus of literature still relevant today - "The battle-club does not find out his name, it just finds his flesh." They produced beautiful jewellery and artifacts and invented metal working and beer, yet they were no match for those more aggressive who swept through the open plains of the Fertile Crescent. Some of the earliest wars took place here and it has been fought over repeatedly ever since; it arguably has the most fought over frontiers in the world. Our measurement of time, seconds and hours, our seven day week, times tables and a wonder of the ancient world come to us from the people who lived and worked, died and were buried in this area. Travel with Hammurabi, Nebuchenezzer and Gilgamesh on a voyage of discovery through Ur, Babylon, Nineveh and Nimrud on a Journey Through Ancient Iraq."

The 10 week course is divided into ten headed subjects, which are, The Land between Two Rivers, Prehistoric Mesopotania - Ubaid and Uruk, The Emergence of Writing - Cuneiform, Religious Belief, Ur, Old Babylonia, Assyria/Neo Babylonia, Parthia, The Moslem Conquest and Tribal Conflict.

There will be a half term on 28th October 2010 and the last week of the course is on 2nd December 2010.

## KITCHEN CORNER

### SMOKED TROUT and COBNUT PATE

This is one of Michael Barry's recipes. September is the time to enjoy fresh nuts at their best.

### Ingredients:

4 oz (100g) shelled fresh cobnutsunshelled weight about 200g If not available use hazelnuts instead.

### 1 tbsp parsley

12oz (350g) hot-smoked trout fillets. 3 tbsp fromage frais 2 tbsp melted butter Seasoning.

### Method:

Chop nuts finely, also the parsley. In a processor or liquidiser, put the skinned trout, fromage frais, melted butter, seasoning and half the nuts and



blend till smooth.

Mix the rest of the source of



a soufflé dish, or line a small loaf tin with oiled greaseproof paper. Pour in half the mixture, then a layer of the nut and parsley mix followed by remaining trout mix. Smooth down firmly, cover with clingfilm and refrigerate for at least 4 hours.

Serve with hot French bread or toast, or thin crispbread

## **Ardleigh Surgery**

### Influenza vaccinations

It is influenza clinic time again !

The Department of Health recommends patients should have vaccination against influenza if they are aged over 65 or at particular risk if they have one of the following medical conditions; heart disease, diabetes, respiratory disease including asthma, renal disease or who are immunocompromised.

Flu clinics will be held on Thursday afternoons weekly starting on the 4 October and ending in November.

Please telephone the surgery to book into one of those clinics. We encourage patients to attend these clinics rather than use valuable normal appointment slots unless you are attending the doctor or nurse for some other reason.

At least we will not have the additional workload involving separate injections for swine flu this year!

### New GP Trainee

A new GP Trainee, Dr Nicola Cullum, starts her training year with the Ardleigh practice on the 4 August. Dr Cullum was previously on placement at a surgery in Clacton from Colchester General Hospital.

Dr Ayisha Sajid, our former GP Trainee, is now on maternity leave and is hoping to obtain a position in a practice next year.

### NHS Health checks

General practices will be writing to patients aged 50 - 74 who do not have existing heart disease, diabetes, hypertension, stroke, kidney disease inviting them for a NHS Health Check over the next five years. The check is to assess patient's risk of developing these medical conditions and to offer advice on how to reduce the risk and stay healthy. Please take up this invitation when you receive it. The check will include taking your family history, blood pressure and a simple blood test to check your cholesterol level. We are inviting patients on a somewhat random basis so do not worry if you do not receive your invitation for sometime. If you are concerned that you may be at risk, please contact the surgery to request a Health Check at any time before you receive your invitation.

She also has experience already of working in a GP surgery, having spent the last few months training part-time under Dr Cheung (whom many of you will remember from his time here as a Registrar), at Mill Road Surgery in Colchester.

Dr Hilton is originally from Ilford and qualified at St Bartholomew's and The London Medical School. She now lives in Colchester and intends to stay in the area when she finishes her GP training, which is good news. Too often, when they have finished their Registrar year, young GPs move away from the area. I don't know what we – and you – do to scare them away.

Dr Hunt is heading off on another of his motor bike ultra-rides shortly. He had been thinking of heading for Kathmandu via various middle-eastern and Asian political hotspots, but eventually thought better of it and opted for a few weeks travelling down through South America.

While he is away, Dr Hunt's work will be covered by Dr Jatoi, another ex-Registrar whom you might remember, and Dr Bhatti, who needs no introduction, so hopefully his absence isn't going to make it any harder to get an appointment.

On more routine matters, we still get the occasional request for the doctors to see people with toothache, dental abscesses etc, so I just wanted to remind everyone that they don't deal with dental problems. Dentistry is a very particular and different skill and the experts are, unsurprisingly, the dentists who have spent at least five years training to look after your teeth, gums and mouth. If you do have a dental problem, please don't waste any time contacting the surgery, please ring your dentist directly.

If you aren't registered with a dentist and can't find one who will help, the person to contact is a lady called Clare McInerney. She is the Liaison Officer at the Primary Care Trust who has special responsibility for dentists and her telephone number is 01206 286882. (If you have made a record of similar information in the past, please note that the name and number have recently changed.)

Urgent dental care outside normal hours can still be accessed by ringing Harmoni on 0845 602 5238. They will be able to give you contact details for a duty NHS dentist who will look after you at NHS rates.

A resident in South London has reported a possible scam taking place in his locality.

A man claiming to represent 'Neighbourhood Watch Support' telephoned to say that a Neighbourhood Watch brochure was going out to all the local residents. The caller was encouraging local businesses to advertise in this brochure. The resident agreed to place an advertisement and later received a further phone call from a company calling itself 'Business Community Support Multimedia'. The caller took some details over the phone.

At a later date the resident received a letter with a 'proof' for the advertisement. Apart from the name of the business and the contact phone number, every detail was incorrect. The accompanying letter said that unless any amendments were received within five days (by phone, email or fax) they would assume that the details were correct and place the advert. The resident tried several times to contact the company by email and phone but to no avail, finding his emails unanswered and his phone calls cut off. Luckily he had not vet paid any money for the advertisement. We would like to make it clear that there is no such organisation as 'Neighbourhood Watch Support' and the Neighbourhood & Home Watch Network does not produce any such local brochures nor contract Business Community Support Multimedia to do so.

They take your money and they often even print a few copies of whatever publication they say they represent, but they never print in any numbers and they don't circulate the publication either. If you fall for it your money goes straight into their pocket. I don't expect for one minute that they will send you anything but, if they do, please let me know and I will call to collect it. ### Beware of Scam call over Council Tax


Residents across Tendring are being warned not to give out bank details over the phone to anyone offering a Council Tax refund.

It is also suggested that anyone who takes a scam call of this nature reports it to the police.

#### **Telephone scam**

A call is received from a 'representative' of BT, who says that he is disconnecting the line because of an unpaid bill. He demands immediate payment of £31.00, or £118.00 to reconnect at a later date. The caller offers to demonstrate that he was from BT and says to hang up and try phoning someone - he would disconnect the phone to prevent this. The phone seems to go dead - no engaged tone, nothing - until he phones again. The fact that the phone does go off would probably convince some people it's real, so please let as many friends & family aware of this. The number he gives is in fact not a BT number which should be 0800 800152 0800 800152 which takes you through to BT Business. The cutting off of the line is very simple , he stays on the line with the mute button on and you can't dial out - but he can hear you trying. (This is because the person who initiates a call is the one to terminate it). When you stop trying he cuts off and immediately calls back.

You should report such phone calls to the police.
